About this course

Course Outcomes

- Students will be able to articulate the role of perception as it influences the definition of self and others.
- Students will demonstrate effective verbal and nonverbal communication skills for successful interpersonal communication.
- 3. Students will demonstrate interpersonal communication competence.
- Students will be able to manage and/or resolve circumstances of interpersonal conflict.
- 5. Students will deliver extemporaneous speech(es).
- 6. Students will demonstrate small group dynamics and act appropriately.

Course Design

Course Description

Students explore a range of communication concepts and topics from interpersonal communication, to small group communication, to public speaking.

Students develop skills to put the communication principles to work.

Important policies and procedures

Have you decided to miss class? To drop the class?

No show policy: you must attend the first week of classes to avoid being dropped as a no-show.

You may be withdrawn for excessive tardiness and/or absences (more than two occurrences) without appropriate documentation of an emergency. But hopefully, you will engage yourself fully in this class and not want to miss a minute!

Are you proud of your work?

How will I earn my grade?

The course is divided into three major segments with each segment culminating in a major project/assignment.

Segment 1: Perception and Process

Dates: September 2, 9, 16, 23, 30

Major assignment: Film Analysis Paper (value = up to 100 points)

Segment 2: Communication Skills

Dates: October 7, 14, 21, 28, November 4

Major assignment: Awareness Speech (value = up to 100 points)

Segment 3: Relationships

Dates: November 11, 18, December 2, 9, 16

Major assignment: "So What" Paper (value = up to 100 points)

Grading Scale

90-100 = A

Exemplary performance, greatly exceeds course requirements

80 - 89 = B

Advanced performance, exceeds requirements, substantial creativity and effort

70 - 79 = C

Average performance—meets the minimum requirements of the course

60-69 = D

Deficient performance—meets some course requirements but deficient in others

Below 59 = F

Poor performance—deficient in most or all requirements
