

- 1. Students will submit all assignments by the deadline

Midterm	100 points
For your midterm, you will read and reflect upon three research articles based on	
influential studies in psychology. This will be due on Sunday, October 13, 2024.	
Final Project Media Submission	5 points
You will have to submit your choice of movie and psychological disorder for your	
final project by Friday, November 1, 2024. This gives me enough time to give you	
feedback and make sure you are on the right track before you start on your final.	
Final Project	100 points
Your final project will ask you to compare how different psychological disorders	
are portrayed in the media and understood by the general population. This	
project will be due online on Monday, December 2, 2024.	
Reflection Paper	25 points
In this class, you will write one reflection paper detailing what you have learned	
about the field of psychology and how you will use this information in the future.	
This assignment will be due on Friday, December 6, 2024.

Extra credit will be given sporadically and without notice throughout the course.	
Point values will vary depending on the assignment.
