# **Course Description**

Survey of ancient, medieval, and early modern western civilization with an emphasis on political, social, and economic development. Examines the ancient world, classical antiquity, the Middle Ages, the Renaissance, the Reformation and the age of religious wars, the origins of the modern state, and other topics. Gordon Rule course in which the student is required to demonstrate college-level writing skills through multiple writing assignments. Minimum grade of C required if EUH 2000 is used to satisfy Gordon Rule requirements.

- II. Students will synthesize the thematic historical influences that shaped the early history of Western Civilization
- III. Students will illustrate the impact of the individual, regardless of socioeconomic position, as participants in the making of history.
- IV. Students will describe how diversity influenced the early history of Western Civilization.
- V. Students will connect lessons, patterns, or characteristics from historical events to current events.
- VI. Students will interpret historical events by using appropriate historical methods
- VII. Students will demonstrate college-level writing skills.

### **Course Organization**

Canvas will used in this course for submitting assignments and course communication. Students must regularly sign in to Canvas and check their Valencia email to successfully complete this course. Checking both daily is highly recommended.

# **Course Policies**

### Grading Policy

### Attendance

Thi is an online course, available 24/7, managed through Canvas. You must have regular access to the Internet (available on all Valencia campuses) to complete the course requirements. Your online attendance will be checked each week based on your participation in the course and submission of coursework. You will be counted as present in this class for the week as long as you complete one of the week's required assignments on time.

### Drop/Refund Deadline

#### Withdrawal Policy

#### Late Work Policy

#### **On Late Assignments**

Late work will be accepted only if students provide official written documentation indicating that they have experienced an <u>unforeseen medical emergency</u> or ongoing medical condition that is submitted on the first day of the student's return to the course. What constitutes an emergency or an "ongoing medical condition" is at the sole discretion of the instructor. If you do not meet this criteria, no late work will be accepted.

All assignments must be submitted by the stipulated deadline date unless prior arrangement with the professor has been established. Late submission of work, without this prior arrangement (and barring a true, well-documented and unforeseeable emergency) will not be accepted and a zero score will be allocated. This means it is very important to keep up with all work in this class.

#### **On Examinations**

This same policy applies to the Midterm Examination. If you miss the Midterm Exam and believe that you have a true, well-documented and unforeseeable emergency, you must contact the instructor to request a make-up and provide him with the documentation within 24 hours of the missed exam. Failure to do so will result in an automatic zero grade on the exam.

<u>The Final Examination cannot be made up late nor can extensions be provided</u>. The Final Exam is mandatory. You must complete it in order to successfully complete this course.
