Valencia College No Show Policy

Catalog Course Description

Students explore a range of communication concepts and topics from interpersonal communication, to small group, to public speaking. Students develop skills to put the communication principles to work.

Learning Outcomes

- Students will articulate the role of perception as it influences the definition of self and others.
- Students will demonstrate interpersonal competence with effective verbal and nonverbal skills.
- Students will manage and/or resolve circumstances of interpersonal conflict.
- Students will deliver an informative extemporaneous speech.
- Students will demonstrate small group dynamics and act appropriately.
- Students will observe ethical responsibilities of both senders and receivers in a communication transaction.

Course Overview

The course will be presented in a weekly format with deadlines on Tuesdays (of course, you may choose to submit your work earlier). This includes Assignments, Quizzes, and Initial Posts for Discussions. Responses to Discussions are due two days later on Thursdays. Although each week starts on a Monday, I will open access the Friday before - to give you the option to work ahead. For example, access to Week 2 (which officially starts Monday, January 16) will be available to you Friday, January 13. I look forward to facilitating this course and trust the readings, videos, and class discussions will provide you with the opportunity to further develop and sharpen your communication skills.

[Please Note: The deadline for the last week of class - Week 15 - is Tuesday, April 25.]

Course Communication

Although we are back on campus (in a limited capacity), we continue to practice social distancing. While I will not be holding official student engagement hours in a face-to-face setting, please reach out to me through E-mail here on Canvas. We can also set up a Zoom call.

Assignment Grading: You can expect Assignments/ Discussions to be graded within a week after the deadline. The Speech assignment may take 1 - 2 weeks.

Textbook and Required Materials

- Textbook: The textbook we are using is titled Communication in the Real World: An Introduction to Communication Studies published by the University of Minnesota. It is a free textbook. We will not be reading the entire textbook. Instead, specific section(s) will be assigned each week.
- Digital Video Camera/ Laptop/ Smart Phone for recording your practice and the speech.
- **Create a Youtube account** for uploading your recorded speech. It is strongly recommended you create an account specifically for uploading videos related to Valencia courses.

Our college is continuing to waive the audience requirement for speech courses this semester. Instead of gathering five people for an audience, you will record your speech with a setup of chairs, present to the "audience", upload your speech link in a discussion. Your peers will view and respond (they will also serve as an audience).

Additional information about recording your speech will be provided when we begin preparing for this assignment.

Course Policies

In this course, you will experience a variety of learning activities to help you meet the course learning outcomes. To have the most meaningful learning experience, I believe your experiences matter and it's important to connect what we learn to your day-to-day experience. This means active participation, timely submission of assignments, and ongoing dialogue are necessary for you to be successful.

Attendance Policy

This is an online course, available 24/7, managed through Canvas. You must have access to the Internet to complete the course requirements. The expectation is for you to log in to the course website on Canvas throughout the week to keep up with readings, assignments, discussions and quizzes.

If you are unable to participate in the course due to illness or family emergency, please communicate with me as soon as possible so we can look into the best course of action. In the case of a prolonged online absence of one week or more, you and I will meet (Zoom) to discuss options and determine your ability to continue in the course.

No-Show Policy

If you do not log in to the course during the first week and complete the **Orientation/ Syllabus Quiz** by Tuesday, January 17, you will be withdrawn from the class as a "[No Show](#)". Class attendance is required for online classes; students who are not actively participating in an online class and/or do not submit the required attendance activity or assignment by the scheduled due date must be withdrawn by the instructor at the end of the first week as a "No Show". If you are withdrawn as a "No Show," you will be financially responsible for the class and a final grade of "WN" will appear on your transcript for the course.

Withdrawal Policy

Assignments, Discussion Boards, and Quizzes

Each week, you will have access to a variety of materials and assignments to help you master the course objectives and share your learning with classmates. Completing the work is required for successful completion of the course. Your full participation is expected.

Assignments

There are **12 Assignments** (360 points total). Each Assignment is worth 30 points.

Discussions

There are **11 Discussions** (330 points total). Each Discussion is worth 30 points. You must first work on your posting (the Initial Post) which should be well thought out and include points for your classmates to ponder. After your Initial Post to the Discussion Board (by Creating a Thread), return to the Discussion Board and read at least 5 of your classmates' postings. Then, reply to a minimum of 2 classmates by the due date (which is usually one day after the deadline for your Initial Post.) Your reply must be more than a simple "I agree or disagree" statement and should move the conversation forward. Responses to each of your peers should be at least 150 words. Review the **Discussion Netiquette** to practice good online interaction.

Quizzes

The **Syllabus Quiz** is 30 points.

The **4 Reading Quizzes** (including the Final Quiz) is worth 30 points each (120 points total.) Each quiz will typically have short-answer questions and/ or multiple choice/ true/false. You will have 30 minutes to complete the quiz in one sitting. If you run into issues – including "the Internet crashed", "Canvas logged me out halfway", and "I ran out of time" – please email me. We can make arrangements for you to take a paper version of the quiz at the Testing Center with no penalty (only the first time). This must take place within a week of the quiz deadline. Repeat issues with future quizzes will not be considered. **There is no make up for the Final Quiz.**

Speech Assignment

There is one informative speech assignment, using **extemporaneous delivery**. It is worth 160 points. Speech must be **original work** produced by you. A **plagiarized speech will result in a "0"** and college policies for Academic Dishonesty will apply. Your speech must be recorded electronically, uploaded to (**unlisted**), and the link properly submitted with your assignment. You are responsible for recording your speech in a

“professional” **indoor** setting with proper lighting and free from distractions for all present (such as noise, music, games, cell phones, TV). If you do not have access to a digital video camera, you may record your speech with a smart phone **provided the recording is very clear**. A recording that is not clear, has a noisy background or is edited will result in a "0".

Audience Requirement - Valencia College is continuing to waive audience requirements in all online speech classes this semester. I'll have more specifics on a set up of five empty chairs to serve as a live audience when we start preparing your speech. Your speech recording will be posted in a Discussion and viewed by peers in the course.

Late speech submissions - A penalty of 20% will be deducted from your speech grade for each calendar day your submission is late.

Late Work

Penalties for late work will apply and are reflected in assignment/ discussion instructions. As mentioned above, if you foresee an extended absence, consider working ahead to meet deadlines. In unexpected situations, please reach out to me early. Any extensions beyond the late deadlines will be considered only if students provide written documentation of a medical emergency or ongoing medical condition. This must be presented within 48 hours of the missed work (no handwritten doctors' notes, please).

Grade Appeals

You may request a conference with me (within one week from the date the grade is posted) to discuss/appeal an assignment or speech grade. Instead, your speech will be post in a Discussion and viewed/ commented on by peers.
