UNITED STATES HISTORY 1877 TO PRESENT

Survey of United States history from the Gilded Age to the present, emphasizing political, social, and economic developments. Examines such topics as expansion, Populist and Progressive movements, Great Depression, the World Wars, reform and dissent in the 1960's and the Vietnam conflict.

AMH 2020 Course Outcomes:

1. Students will be able to recall the principal persons, places, and events from the chronological framework of this course. Identify key figures in United States history from Reconstruction to the present day. Label the significant places in United States history from Reconstruction to the present day. Explain the major events in United States history from

Reconstruction to the present day. Recognize the interconnectedness of world history, geography, and governmental politics as it relates to United States history from Reconstruction to the present.

- 2. Students will be able to synthesize the thematic historical influences that shaped the modern history of the United States. Identify different approaches and perspectives of historical inquiry. Identify the various influences within a historical event. Distinguish how each influence impacted a historical event. Integrates the various influences on the historical event.
- 3. Students will be able to explain the impact of the individual, regardless of societal rank, as participants in the making of history. Identify individuals who played significant roles bringing on or impacting historic events. Detect how individuals impacted an event(s) or time period. Demonstrate their personal role as historian in everyday life
- 4. Students will be able to assess the role that diversity plays in the shaping of the modern history of the United States. Identify the diverse groups/subgroups involved in a specific historical event or time period. Differentiate the experiences various groups/subgroups had during or due to an event(s) or time period. Detect how diverse groups/subgroups impacted an event(s) or time period. Explain opposing views of others from diverse cultures and backgrounds.
- 5. Students will be able to detect the lessons, patterns or characteristics from historical events to better understand present day happenings. Identify outcomes from historical events. Compare historical events to present day happenings. Trace the antecedents of current events. Describe different global viewpoints or perspectives.
- 6. Students will be able to interpret historical events by using appropriate historical methods. Recognize various historical research methods. Differentiate between primary and secondary sources. Use historical sources and evidence.

Course Organization: Activities and Assessments:

Class information will be posted in the online course calendar for all required work. A hard copy calendar is attached to this syllabus.

Virtual Classroom Participation/Expectation:

In order to perform well in an online environment, students need to be vigilant. Each week I will provide required work. It will be found in the online class calendar and announcement area. A class calendar is also included with the syllabus. I expect all students to regularly [twice weekly minimum] check the online class and student e-mails to remain abreast of work [sometimes there are adjustments] and important updates. Remember that the online environment requires more student responsibility, being less dependent on the professor.

Procedure
