Catalog Description

An integrated reading and writing course designed for students scoring 83 or below on the reading portion of the PERT exam and/or scoring 89 or below on the writing portion of the PERT exam. The course will focus on reading comprehension, vocabulary skills, grammar, and paragraph development. In addition, the course will address the connection between reading and writing through reading response activities.

No Show Policy

Students who do not attend (face-to-face class) or complete an assignment in Module 1 (online class) during the first week of class will be dropped from the course and listed as a "no show". If you are withdrawn as a "no show," you will be financially responsible for the class and a final grade of "WN" will appear on your transcript for the course.

Attendance Policy

Regular attendance is an important part of the learning process. You are expected to attend all weekly on campus class sessions (face-to-face class) or actively participate in online Discussions (online class), log-in to Canvas throughout the week to check course mail and announcements, and complete module assignments by the weekly deadlines.

Extenuating circumstances such as religious observances, jury duty, participation in extracurricular activities in which students are official representatives of the college, and active military obligations are recognized as excused absences and must be excused (POLICY: 6Hx28:4-07); however, you must notify me two weeks in advance, so we can determine how to best help you move forward based on how long you will be absent from the course. If you are unable to participate in the course for other reasons, e.g. illness, family emergency, scheduling conflicts, etc., please communicate with me as soon as possible. To accommodate such unexpected events, students will be granted the equivalent of one "free" absence per four weeks of class (i.e. 2 absences in an 8-week semester or 4 absences in a 16-week semester). Any additional absences, for any reason other than the excused absences listed above, will result in a 5% reduction of the student's course grade. In the case of a prolonged absence of one week or more, continuation in the course will be determined on a case-by-case basis through discussion between you and your professor.

Late Work Policy

All work must be completed by the specified deadlines.

- In the event of absence, students are still responsible for turning in all assigned work.
 - o If the absence is known about beforehand, work should be turned in early.
 - o For unplanned absences, late penalties will apply.
- Late work will be accepted up to one week after the published due date with a 5% penalty for each day late.
- No work will be accepted more than seven days after the due date. After this period, a grade of 0 will be applied.

Computer/Technology Issues

- Even though computers and word-processing software are marvelous time- and energy-saving devices, they can and do cause problems. Please be aware that a broken or ill-functioning computer, or the inability to retrieve, produce, or submit your assignments from a computer will not be accepted as a valid excuse for late submission of assignments.
- Internet issues, with the exception of known outages of Valencia College servers or Canvas functions, also will not be accepted as a valid excuse for late submission of assignments.

Academic Honesty Policy

- All forms of academic dishonesty are prohibited at Valencia College. Academic
 dishonesty includes, but is not limited to, acts or attempted acts of plagiarism, cheating,
 furnishing false information, forgery, alteration or misuse of documents, misconduct
 during a testing situation, facilitating academic dishonesty, and misuse of identification
 with intent to defraud or deceive.
- All work submitted by students is expected to be the result of the students' individual thoughts, research, and self-expression uniquely created for this class. - If a student is caught cheating or submitting plagiarized work, a first offense will result in a zero score on the assignment, a second offense will result a class grade of F.

This policy will be applied at the professor's discretion <u>regardless of the amount of cheating/plagiarism involved</u>. Specifically, whether a student copies a single quiz answer or the entire final exam, whether a single sentence is plagiarized or a full essay is copied off the internet, the penalties outlined above will be applied.

Communication Policy

You are expected to check your Atlas and Canvas email on a regular basis throughout the week as these are my only methods to communicate with you outside of class. I will respond to Canvas and Atlas email within 24-hours, Monday through Friday, with the exception of days when the college is closed.

If a student is caught submitting plagiarized work, a first offense will result in a zero score on the assignment, a second offense will result a class grade of F.

Withdrawal Policy

Valencia has a withdrawal policy (effective Session 1-97/98) that may affect cost of classes. Through the published deadline (usually during the second week of classes), students will be able to drop/withdraw from this class without attempt penalty and receive a refund. After that date, if students withdraw, no refund will be issued and it will count as an attempt, which will affect the cost of repeat classes. The Florida Legislature passed a bill that states that for the third attempt of a college- level class, the cost will be the same as out of state tuition. Per Valencia Policy 4-07 (Academic Progress, Course Attendance and Grades, and Withdrawals), a student who withdraws from class before the withdrawal deadline (usually during the week prior to Final Exam Week) will receive a grade of "W." A student is not permitted to withdraw after the withdrawal deadline. Any student who withdraws or is withdrawn from a class during a third or subsequent attempt in the same course will be assigned a grade of "F."

Note to International Students (F-1 or J-1 Visa) Please be advised that withdrawal from this course may result in the termination of your visa status if you fall below the full-time enrollment requirement of 12 credit hours.
