
This course is designed to give you a general understanding of political processes, structures and occurrences at the state and local level. Although this course will be quite useful to students majoring in Political Science, it is primarily intended to help most students understand the important role that state and local governments plays in our lives despite the amount of emphasis we typically ascribe to the federal government.

Additional Instructor Description: Look, the government is really important. But following the news can be confusing, or infuriating, or boring, depending on your interests. In this class we will learn about what the government does, why it does it, and what part we all play in the whole system. Course Learning Outcomes and Competencies

Students do not require any background in state and local politics, in American politics, or in political science generally to successfully complete this course.

Valencia Competencies: Part of your experience in this course will be to develop the core competencies of Valencia College of "Think, Value, Communicate, and Act" TVCA. Students will consider their role in the larger scheme of the American political system, learn to value the role they play as citizens, communicate ideas learned in the course through discussions and examinations,

and understand ways in which they can take action to become more civically engaged.

- 1) describe the basic principles of federalism and how they apply in our republican form of government.

- 3) describe the policy making process of state and/or local government.
- 4) demonstrate college-level writing skills.

Expectations

Your Expectations of Me

In order to create a positive learning environment that allows for every student to maximize their potential in the course, I find it helpful to lay out some mutual expectations we can and should have for each other. You should absolutely expect me to communicate with you frequently and regularly. I try my best to respond to all e-mails and Canvas messages within 24 hours, and to have all assignments graded within 24 hours, if not sooner. You should expect me to treat you with respect and to respect your opinions and views. As our class deals explicitly with politics, you should expect me to be as neutral as possible in the way I present material, and to do my utmost to foster in you the ability to come to your own conclusions about how you view the political world and orient yourself towards it.

My Expectations of You

In return, I have several expectations of you. I expect you to do your best to keep up with your work, and to be in touch with me as soon as is feasible if you are not able to do so. I expect you to treat me with respect as I will absolutely do for you. In our interactions, and in your interactions with your classmates, I expect you to be courteous, even if and when you disagree with what they are saying. Finally, I expect you to read this whole syllabus (yes, I know it's long) and to follow the policies it lays out.

Introductory Assignment/Syllabus Quiz

After the Course Information module is complete students will be asked to take a <u>quiz about the syllabus</u>. It is open note/open syllabus. The purpose of this quiz is to make sure that students have read and understand the syllabus. This quiz serves as the introductory assignment for the course for "no show" reporting.

Module Quizzes

Each module finishes with a module quiz. The module quizzes are open-book and open-note, are timed, and are comprised of multiple choice questions. There are 8 module quizzes. You can take each one only once, but you can drop your lowest score.

Unit Tests

Each of the four units finishes with a test. The test will be composed of two parts - an open-book/open-note objective section with question types such as multiple choice, matching, and fill-in-the blank, and a section with several essays. You may only take each section once.

Discussion Boards

There are two discussion boards in this class, and each takes place in three separate pieces over three weeks. More details can be found in the <u>first Discussion Board module</u>.

Critical Reflections

There are three short critical reflection papers throughout the course. More details can be found in the first critical reflection assignment.

State Research Paper

The state research paper serves as the final exam for the course. You can find more information on the paper in the Research Paper/Final Exam Module (it's the second module in the Modules page).

Withdrawal Policy

Per Valencia Policy 4-07 (Academic Progress, Course Attendance and Grades, and Withdrawals), a student who withdraws from class before the withdrawal deadline (March 25, 2022) will receive a grade of "W." A student is not permitted to withdraw after the withdrawal deadline. Students who stay in the class after this deadline are responsible to complete all work required for the course; e.g., quizzes, tests, discussions, etc. If you choose to stop attending the class after the withdrawal deadline, you will be held responsible for all work missed, including the final. Any work that is not completed by the appropriate deadline will receive a zero. Hence, the final grade for the course will be determined by taking into consideration the percentages obtained by work that was turned in and the zeros given to work that was not turned in on time. Students can still be withdrawn by the college for violations of the college's code of conduct policies. Any student who withdraws or is withdrawn from a class during a third or subsequent attempt in the same course will be assigned a grade of "F." Students may want to meet with an advisor or counselor before withdrawing. Withdrawal may impact future financial aid and staying on satisfactory academic progress. Late Work/Make-up Assignments

Here is the deal with late work and make-up assignments: I hate being in the position of a referee

having to decide (a) whether the reason someone has missed an assignment is "good enough" to justify it and (b) having to feel like I need to verify the accuracy of your excuse. That sets up an adversarial dynamic between us, which doesn't seem like the best way to go about it. In the olden days we used to just be able to say stuff like "late assignments will be allowed at the instructor's discretion" but it is really tough to ensure that I am being consistent and equitable that way. Therefore I've come up with the following policy and so far it seems to be working well. It strikes a balance between not unduly punishing those who miss thing, but also not creating a world where no one does anything by the deadlines.

You can do any assignment after the date that it is due, but with a 3% penalty per day. The maximum penalty is 40%, in other words your score cannot be reduced below a 60% on something that is late. It's all set up automatically in Canvas, so do let me know if it seems to be messing the math up, and I'll double check it. There are some absences that are excused, though, and that the late penalty does not apply to. This includes if you have a doctor's note, a hospital note, or a death in the family. Also any other official college-excused absence, such as travel for a college athletic or academic team, would count. In any of these cases please just reach out to me by e-mail and we will figure out a way for you to make the work up without penalty. Similarly, if you know you're going to struggle to meet an upcoming deadline due to a medical reason (such as COVID or expected due date, etc.), please reach out and we'll work it out so that you do not have the penalty.

For any other reason - whether that's family issue, work-related stuff, schoolwork-related stuff, or if you just happened to forget - you can make up the assignment with the above late penalty, no questions asked. Assignments will be accepted up until the due date of the last assignment for the course.
