**PREREQUISITE:** Minimum grade of **C** in ENC 1101 or ENC 1101H or IDH 1110.

#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This is a three credit course offering an integrated examination of the cultural expressions of art, literature, music, philosophy, and religion. This course covers the period from the late Roman Empire through the middle Ages emphasizing the synthesis of classical, secular, and religious element. Non-western cultures will also be examined, significantly those that were impacted by European exploration and conquest. This is a Gordon Rule course in which the student is required to demonstrate college-level writing skills through multiple writing assignments. Minimum grade of C required if used to satisfy Gordon Rule requirement.

### **Learning Outcomes:**

- 1. To comprehend and synthesize the historical and cultural developments that shaped the early modern world.
- 2. To analyze and evaluate the impact of monotheistic religion on western culture.
- 3. To understand the genesis and development of the late Roman and Medieval period in painting, sculpture, and architecture.
- 4. To discern the impact of European expansion and technology on global civilizations during the late Roman and Medieval eras.
- 5. To trace the steps of the religion and philosophy in the late Roman and Medieval period and examine its impact on world history and culture.
- 6. To examine evolution of music and the development of instrumental and choral music during the late Roman and Medieval period.
- 7. To trace the evolution of philosophy and learning during the late Roman and Medieval period.
- 8. To interpret works of the major writers of the period.
- 9. To develop and provide opportunity for students to gain leaderships and collaborative work place skills through the practice of effective oral and written communication.
- 10. To encourage students through readings and research and in class-room discussion and debate to develop a deeper more significant understanding of history and culture.
- 11. To encourage students to become aware and cognizant of global cultures by the examination of the past to gain a deeper understanding of current cultures and values

#### **COURSE REQUIREMENTS:**

- Full semester course students will be required to fulfill online class assignments.

- Research Paper: Choose a topic from within the time span
  of the course (with professor's prior approval) of
  approximately 1500 words. In addition to this 1500-word
  research paper a bibliography of no less than 4 academic
  sources. Please no Wikipedia or on-line research this is a
  college level paper.
- 4 short focus papers "Thinking Critically" on assigned topics covered in readings and course materials. Each paper must have a heading and use MLA formatting, no less than 750 - 800 words, double spaced 12-point font. Please place word count at the bottom of each paper.
- 2 Exams Midterm and a Final exam. They will be offered online and are timed they are multiple choice questions and essay questions.

### **Written Assignments:**

All of your writing assignments must be submitted to **Blackboard Safe Assign**. I will not accept any papers sent via e-mail. Please submit the word count at the bottom of the page. Only submit assignments in .doc or docx format. I will give a zero to any paper not submitted in the requested format.

Your research paper should be no less than **1500 words** or more with a cover sheet and works cited page included as a separate page. Please use **MLA format**. The topic is your choice relating to the humanities of the period with the prior approval of your professor. **Your paper must be original to this course**.

### **Discussion Posts:**

Please post your initial discussion thread of no less than **100 words** before the close of day **Thursday**. Please post to no less than three classmates with at least **50 words or more** before close of day on Sunday. By doing this you will gain full credit for this portion of your grade.
