Course Description: U.S. GOVERNMENT. Analysis of the organization structure and operational dynamics of the U.S. national government, both past and present, and an examination of the U.S. Constitution, including principles and theories supporting it. This

course includes learning activity designed to ensure competence in the basic use of computers.

Course Outcomes

Explain the philosophical theories that led to the writing of the Declaration of Independence and U.S. Constitution. Describe the basic principles of American democracy and how they are applied in our Republican form of government. Explain the checks and balances system created by the U.S. Constitution given to each branch. Analyze the relationship between the individual and the government in pursuit of social, political, and economic goals. Students will analyze how the U.S. electoral system impacts the level of political participation of the individual.
