COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Capstone: You will be completing the cumulative SAM Capstone Project in

MindTap throughout the semester. Each part of the **SAM Capstone Project** must be completed during the days it is available. **No makeup work will be allowed.** Any work missed will result in zero (0) points

earned.

End of Module Projects: At the end of each Module, you will complete the End of Module Project in MindTap. These activities are assigned to help master the material in the text. Each completed End of Module Project is worth

one hundred (100) points and must be submitted by the due date.

Incomplete or missed End of Module Project cannot be made up and

will receive zero (0) credit.

SAM Trainings: Prior to the completion of each textbook Module, you will complete the SAM Training in Mindtap to introduce you to important database concepts presented in each Module. Each completed SAM Training is worth one hundred (100) points and must be submitted by the due date. Missed SAM Trainings cannot be made up and will receive zero (0) credit.

Discussion Board: There are four (4) Discussion Board topics throughout the semester. You post an original answer to the Discussion Board topic and answer the posting of one of your classmates for a total of two (2) postings per Discussion Board topic. Your original posting to the Discussion Board topic must be between 75 and 100 words. Your posting in answer to your classmate must be between 50 and 75 words. Points will be deducted for postings that do not meet the word count requirement. All postings must be checked for typographical and grammatical errors. Points will be deducted otherwise. Additionally, no points will be earned for postings that do not address the Discussion Board topic. Late postings are not accepted. There are no exceptions to this rule.

Grade Book: As you complete each assignment in MindTap, your grade will automatically sync to your Canvas grade book. If MindTap does not sync your grade correctly, please email me, and I will investigate the issue.

DISCLAIMER
