Course Catalog Description

Basic introduction to humanities. Focuses on central concepts, historical development and fundamental nature of philosophy, architecture, music, religion and art. Concepts from such disciplines integrated with contemporary American culture.

Detailed Course Description

This course is a basic introduction to Humanities that focuses on central concepts, historical developments, and the fundamental nature of philosophy, architecture, music, religion, and art. Concepts from these disciplines will be integrated with contemporary American culture. The course will focus on the following Western cultural periods: Classical Greece, Republican and Imperial Rome, Renaissance, Scientific Revolution and Enlightenment, Romantic Period, and Early Modern Period. There is no prerequisite for this course. It is not a Gordon Rule writing course and therefore will not satisfy the Gordon Rule requirements of the State Board of Education, Rule 6A-10.30.

No Required Text

You will NOT have to purchase a textbook for this class. However, you will still be responsible for reading the material I provide. I have created reading materials in the form of Open Educational Resources, this is the substitute for the textbook. You will be able to answer all of the Reading Quiz questions from the OER readings and you will also use this information to complete the tests. You will find the OER readings in the Modules. If for some reason you cannot open an OER reading, please let me know and I will assist you.

Additional Required Materials

The instructor will post additional reading materials, worksheets, homework assignments, writing topics, and study guides to the respective CRN in Canvas. All students are responsible for retrieving those materials and printing them out on their own as needed. Basis of Evaluation

Students will be evaluated on the basis of a point system. Each assignment, quiz, and test will be worth a certain number of points. Your final grade will be calculated by adding up the total number of points you received, and dividing that total by the number of points that were available.

When calculating the final grade, only round up the tenth or hundredth percent (the part behind the decimal). So an 79.5% will round up to an 80% and your final grade would be a B. But an 79.3% will not round up so your final grade would be a C. Each number in front of the decimal is equal to about 30-40 points from class assignments and tests. So an 75% cannot round up to a 80% because that would be about 150 points of class work and tests.

Announcements and Atlas Email System

The instructor will post announcements regularly in our Canvas course and use the Atlas email system for contacting students outside of class time. Each student is required to read the announcement that have been posted in the course and check their Atlas email so that they do not miss any important announcements from the instructor. The instructor is not responsible for information that is missed because a student failed to check their Atlas email frequently.

Attendance Policy

Attendance is important to successful completion of this class. In an online class, attendance is based on a student's completion of assignments, quizzes, discussion board

postings, and tests. A missed deadline for submitting an assignment counts as an absence. Assigned items (whether assignments, discussions, quizzes, or exams) will be closed in the Canvas site after completion of that unit (the same day as the test for that unit is due) and students will no longer be able to access them. Missed assignments count as absences and you will not have the opportunity to make up absences. Attendance for the class is not graded, so absences will not count against your final grade per se. However, you will receive a zero on all missing assignments, and those zeros will be calculated into a final letter grade. Students with several missing assignments should consider withdrawing from the class before the withdrawal deadline.

The instructor does not distinguish between "excused" and "unexcused" absences. For severe medical conditions that result in excessive absences, consult the Dean of Students concerning Valencia's medical withdrawal policy.

STUDENT WITHDRAWAL POLICY/WITHDRAWAL DEADLINE

June 28th at 11:59 pm is the deadline for withdrawing from a class for the full Summer 2024 term. If you withdraw from a course prior to this date, you will automatically receive a "W," regardless of the grade you were earning at the time.

The professor will **not** automatically withdraw you from the course if you stop submitting assignments. If you miss assignments and they have closed in Canvas you will receive a zero on those assignments, and those zeros will be calculated into a final letter grade.

"NO SHOW" Policy

Students must post an introduction to the Discussion Board by 11:59 pm on the first Wednesday after the semester begins and respond to two other students by the following Sunday at 11:59 pm to avoid being withdrawn from the course as a "No Show." QUIZZES AND TESTS

Quizzes have a due date, but work like homework assignments, meaning that you can submit them late as long as the submission site is still open. Tests must be completed

INTERRUPTED QUIZZES OR EXAMS

Occasionally it happens that your server, computer, or Canvas has an error while you are taking a quiz or an test, and you need to have the test or quiz reset. If that happens, you can contact me to help you if I am able to—only if the deadline has not passed. Please be aware of and take into account normal office hours (9am-5pm) when I have the best chance of seeing your email and being able to respond before the site closes. If you email me at 11:00 pm when your quiz is due by 11:59 pm that same day, you should not expect a response from me before the deadline. By the following morning, when I read your email, the deadline will have passed and you will not be eligible to retake or take the quiz you missed. Please plan accordingly.

HOMEWORK ASSIGNMENTS

The readings and homework are posted on Canvas and will be turned through the Canvas submission sites on due dates listed in the Course Schedule. Assignments for this course are due on Wednesdays and Sundays at 11:59pm. It is a good idea to work on these assignments ahead of time, so that if you have questions you can ask me. If you email me with a question at 10pm on Sunday, I probably won't respond to you before the due date.

Please check your graded work and read my comments, I'm happy to talk more with you about any comments on assignments. I ask for two weeks to grade assignments. Most assignments will be graded sooner than that, however there are weeks when I have many assignments coming in from all the classes I teach and there are times when assignments (like short writing assignments or essays) take longer for me to grade. If I ever need longer than two weeks to grade an assignment, for example, if I get sick or am out of town, you will be notified.

Deadline for submitting homework assignments: Some homework assignments are due on Wednesdays and some are due on Sundays. They must be submitted **by 11:59 pm on the due date**. Students are responsible for knowing the due dates for each assignment. Specific information about each assignment can be found by clicking on the [Course Schedule](#) available from the Home Page and also by clicking on the "Overview" and reviewing the "Tasks" section.

If you see a score of 1, please read my comments on your assignment. I give you a 1 if I can see that you have tried to submit something but there is a problem viewing it on my end. This happens when files have become corrupted or files are submitted in a format I cannot open, such as Pages. All assignments must be submitted as Word docx or PDFs. If you do not know how to export a Pages doc to a PDF Here is a [link to Apple SupportLinks to an external site](#). that explains how to do this. If this happens and you chose to re-submit the work so I can open it and grade, please send me an email

notifying me that you have re-submitted it. Sometimes I don't get notifications from Canvas in these cases so I have no way of knowing that your work is there.

Work that is emailed to the instructor will NOT be accepted—no exceptions—regardless of whether it is late or on-time!

It is too easy for assignments to become lost in my inbox because I receive so many emails a day. The safest way for me to guarantee that I will see and grade your work is to submit it through Canvas submission site only. No assignments will be accepted if they are submitted through the comments section of the submission site after the due date has passed. Canvas does not notify if you have submitted an assignment this way, so I have no way of knowing your work is there, which is why I cannot accept assignments that are submitted this way.

LATE HOMEWORK

- Late homework assignments will be accepted while we are working in that unit. Submissions for Unit 1 stay open until June 5th, which is the due date of the test for that unit. Submission sites for Unit 2 stay open until June 26th, which is the due date of the test for that unit. Submission sites for Unit 3 stay open until July 14th, which is the due date of the test for that unit. Late homework assignments will be docked with a 15% deduction from the original amount of total points available for the

- You will receive a zero on all missing assignments, and those zeros will be calculated into a final letter grade. Students with several missing assignments should consider withdrawing from the class before the withdrawal deadline.

GUIDELINES AND GRADING CRITERIA FOR DISCUSSION BOARDS

Students are required to post to the Discussion Board on a regular basis, as this is the only way to create a "classroom" atmosphere. We will always respect each other's courage in sharing opinions and participating in discussions, and presenting work that is thoughtful and thought-provoking. Please use constructive criticism. All students are entitled to a positive learning experience, regardless of sex, race, religion, sexual orientation, social class, or any other feature of personal identification.

Therefore, derogatory remarks, rude or disrespectful comments to your classmates or me, or any other comment that disrupts or detracts from the learning environment will not be tolerated.

- All original threads should contain a minimum of **five** (5) complete sentences, and must be posted by 11:59 pm on Wednesday of the week for which it is assigned. Anyone who does not post their initial thread by the deadline on Wednesday will automatically receive a zero for the Discussion Board, and it will count as an "absence." (See the Attendance Policy for how "absences"—in the form of missed assignments or discussions—will affect a student's status in the course.)
- You should respond to the posts of two other students. These responses should each contain a minimum of **three** (3) sentences (not counting the greeting) and should be posted by 11:59 pm on Sunday of the week for which it is assigned. Please include a greeting that includes the name of the students you are responding to. (Example: "Hi, Katrina. I really like what you said about so-and-so, but here's how I feel about that . . .")
- You must edit your work before posting. If a post contains numerous spelling, grammar or sentence structure errors, no points will be given.

Posts will be graded according to the following criteria:

- Mastery of the subject matter and concepts
- Evidence of strong critical thinking skills through analysis, synthesis, and/or evaluation
- Writing that is clear, edited, articulate, and free of major grammatical errors
- Thoughtful, engaging responses to classmates' posts that enrich the discussion

Academic Honesty

Throughout this course, we will discuss our opinions and insights openly. However, when it comes to assignments, quizzes, and exams, you may not share answers with another classmate. Academic honesty is absolutely maintained in this course. You will receive a zero for any questions on assignments or tests that are copied directly from AI or the internet. All responses for course assignments must be sourced from the course materials in order to receive credit. You will receive a zero for any assignment that is plagiarized (from another student or pulled directly from AI or the internet) and may receive a failing grade for the course. If I notice an entire assignment has been plagiarized, you will be warned, and given a zero for that assignment. If another example of plagiarism is discovered at any point during the semester, you will be referred to the dean of the Humanities department and to the dean of students for consequences.

Plagiarism is defined as: "to take (ideas, writing, etc.) from another and pass them off as one's own." It is morally and academically indefensible. Any assignment showing signs of plagiarism, borrowing ideas without giving credit, will receive a zero. Submitting work that is identical to the work of another student, even if it is with the permission of that student, is also unacceptable. Even if you work together on an assignment with a friend, you must always submit assignments that are unique and in your own words.

Plagiarism is a serious academic offense that will result in failure of a particular assignment, you will receive a zero. Depending on the work that is plagiarized it could result in failure of the course, for example, if plagiarism is detected on a writing assignment or exam and the zero received for the assignment lower the final grade in the course to a failing level. If a student is found plagiarizing repeatedly it could result in exclusion from the college.
