COMMUNICATION:

E-MAIL POLICY: All e-mails will be answered. If you e-mail questions to the instructor and do not receive a reply e-mail, then your message or work did not reach the instructor. Activate the "sent" function on your e-mail system to have a record of outgoing messages.

DUE DATES: You are responsible for keeping track of all the due dates this semester. Modules will open weekly, and the due dates for each assignment in the module can be found in three places: course calendar, the module itself, and the assignment tab (other than discussions).

ATTENDANCE: Because we do not meet, you are expected to sign on to the course at least once a day. Assignments may change. Due dates may change. DOCUMENT FORMATS:

You must submit all research papers as email **attachments**, not in the actual email. In addition, the documents must be in **rich text or Word formats**. The file extension will be **.rtf**, **.doc**, or **.docx**. If you do not know how to save in these formats, be sure to visit a **campus computer lab** to get instructions. I will not evaluate your work in any other formats. I CANNOT OPEN WPS or ODT files, and so I will automatically give a zero for any assignment that is submitted in WPS or ODT files. I will not accept PDF files of your work.

COMPUTER EXCUSES:

I do not accept technological problems at home as excuses for late work. If you are unable to complete your assignments on your own computer and deliver them via the assignment tab, I expect you to drive to campus and finish them at one of the college's computer labs. I buy "My hard drive crashed" with the same skepticism as "The dog ate my homework." *Online* equals *via computer*, not necessarily *from home*.

CORE COMPETENCIES AND OBJECTIVES:

Think, Value, Communicate, and Act are Valencia's core competencies. This course will help develop these core competencies by developing your ability to interpret literature, and to research and compose a coherent research essay. Specifically, you will develop your ability to infer meaning and analyze the specific elements good writers use to create both fiction and non-fiction texts. You will learn how to think critically and respond to literature in numerous ways to the texts that you read.

In addition, you will learn the skills needed to become good stewards of other writers' work by learning how to incorporate and properly document their words and ideas in your own work.

Students will:

- Compose essays, including a formal research essay
- Use conventions of standard American English
- Demonstrate competence in research and documentation
- Demonstrate competence in critical reading skills

PLAGARISIM:

Plagiarism is a serious offense. **The minimum consequence for plagiarism is a zero on the assignment**, but more serious consequences can occur. Plagiarism is defined as "presenting another person's ideas or words as if they were your own" (Kriszner and Mandell, 224). Plagiarism covers quoting without using

quotation marks, or referencing the source, paraphrasing an idea without referencing the source, and of course using parts of any document (including those found on websites) without quoting or referencing. Please see chapter 17 in your handbook for further information on plagiarism. Plagiarized essays will receive an automatic zero.

- Skip a line between the **title** and the first line of the essay.
- All papers must be double-spaced!
- **Proofread** your paper carefully to correct all grammatical and mechanical (spelling, capitalization, and punctuation) errors.

GRADING PROCEDURES:

Your grade will be determined by the skill you demonstrate in your written work. Your essays will be evaluated according to the criteria specified on the writing rubrics (see course homepage).



For purposes of computing, the following scale will be used:

To calculate your grade at any time, total your earned points, divide that number by the total of possible points and multiple by 100.

Graded assignments

100 points	Research summaries
3 @ 33 points each	Your culminating paper requires you to conduct research. Throughout the semester, you will have to submit summaries of your research.
400 points	Essays
Minor Essay: 1 @ 100 points	You will write three minor essays this semester: compare/contrast, definition, and argument essay. The essays will be based off of the literary pieces we read this semester. Due dates and detailed descriptions of the essays will be found in the course modules.
Research Essay: 1 @200 points	This essay will require you to research some aspect of literature. The essay is, first and foremost, an argument essay, but you may also employ other rhetorical modes in the essay such as compare/contrast, definition, narrative, etc. Due date and detailed description of the essay will be found in the course module.
Journals: 3 @ 33 points each	Journal prompts will be assigned to specific texts throughout the semester. See modules for prompts.
100 points	Discussions
5 discussions @ 20 points each	You will partake in five discussions this semester. Each discussion will have its own prompt which you can find in the discussion tab.

Basic requirements for written assignments:

Minor essay:

- must follow MLA format
- must be a minimum of 4 pages in length
- must contain quotations from the text
- must have a works cited page
- must be double spaced, 12pt font
- must address the prompt



Journals:

- must follow MLA format
- must be a minimum of 500 words in length
- must contain your opinion of the reading
- must answer the prompt assigned
- is not a summary
- must be double spaced, 12 pt font

The texts for the journal responses can be found in the reading schedule.

Research essay:

- must follow MLA format
- must be a minimum of 8 pages in length
- must be an argument based on researched information
- must have at least 3 sources
- must contain quotations from the sources
- must have a works cited page
- must be double spaced, 12pt font
