Catalog Description:

Emphasis on everyday use of the language, integrating basic grammar, vocabulary, composition, and culture through a conversational approach to Spanish. <u>Not open to</u> <u>Spanish heritage or native speakers</u>. A minimum grade of C is required to pass this course if being used to satisfy the General Education Foreign Language Proficiency Requirement.

This class is Not open to Native or Heritage Spanish Speakers.

Native Speaker: a student born and raised in a Spanish-speaking country.

Heritage Speaker: a student who learned or was exposed to Spanish outside of the classroom setting at a young age (such as through their family, parents, grandparents, etc.)

Prerequisite:

None

SPN 1120:

This course is an introduction to the Spanish language and culture. It is the first class of two semesters. The purpose is to introduce you to the experience of learning a foreign language, and give you the basic tools to continue your other Spanish courses. The level of proficiency you attain will depend on you as the student.

This course requires **self-discipline and time commitment**. This is not a self-paced course. All assignments, activities, and assessments are due according to the calendar of deadlines (the <u>Course/Assignment Schedule (https://online.valenciacollege.edu/courses/221119/pages/course-schedule)</u>) found on Canvas and <u>VHL Central Supersite</u> (<u>https://online.valenciacollege.edu/courses/221119/pages/vhl-supersite</u>)</u>, websites. The VHL Supersite is your classroom in this online course, and it is <u>35%</u> of your total grade. Failure to complete VHL will result in you not succeeding in this course. Keep in mind that going out of town, vacations planned during the semester, and work are not excuses for not completing work. Only under extenuating circumstances will your professor make exceptions to the deadlines. If you feel you lack the self-discipline, motivation, and time required to be successful in this course, you may want to consider the classroom setting instead. Keep up with the pace of the course and ask for help as soon as you feel you need it.

Course Objectives:

At the end of the semester students are expected to use the target language to speak, listen, write and read in order to perform the following communicative functions:

- · Introduce self and others
- Describe self and others
- Ask and answer questions
- Express likes and dislikes
- Describe the physical environment
- Negotiate elements of time
- Describe daily routine

The linguistic objective is for the student to communicate at a novice high level of proficiency (according to the American Council of Teachers of Foreign Language proficiency guidelines) when communicating in the target language.

In agreement with the Standards for Foreign Language Learning in the 21st Century, also known as the "5C's", this course will enable students to:

• Communicate in Spanish (according to the proficiency level targeted in the course).

- Gain knowledge and understanding of <u>Cultures</u> of the Hispanic world.
- Connect with other disciplines and acquire new information.
- Develop awareness of similarities and differences (Comparisons) among language and culture systems around the world.
- Use the language and the knowledge gained in the course to build and participate in <u>Communities</u> at home and around the world.

ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines for novice high level of proficiency are that the student can:

SPEAK: Manage simple and formulaic communicative tasks in straightforward social situations.

LISTEN: Sometimes understand information from sentence-length speech, one utterance at a time, with contextual support. Understand standardized speech dealing with areas of basic practical needs.

READ: Typically derive meaning from short, simple texts in context and/or with extra linguistic support. Understand formulaic language such as that which is found on train schedules, road maps, and street signs.

WRITE: Meet limited basic writing needs using lists, short messages, and simple notes.

Methodology and Activities:

This course stresses **communication skills** in Spanish. Every effort will be made to make this class student-centered. To help students succeed in this course, the class will engage in a variety of activities and assignments, including but not limited to activities such as the following: Practice and communication using vocabulary and grammar learned in oral and written modes; Sociolinguistic practice and functions through communicative activities (paired and virtual chat activities using VHL Supersite); Reading activities and exercises, such as pre- and post-reading, intensive and extensive reading; Writing activities ranging from short paragraphs to developed compositions; Video/audio/computer exercises, presentations, and discussions.

Language Learning Tips: Food for thought.

- 1. Be tolerant to not understanding all of what you are hearing. Be comfortable listening selectively.
- 2. Use trial and error...for practice. Language is more skill than knowledge.
- 3. Spanish is not English. Be prepared to look at everything differently not only words and phrases, but also complete ideas.
- 4. Listen and speak in Spanish at every opportunity.
- 5. Lose your fear of making mistakes.
- 6. Memorize rules. Five minutes engraving a rule in the brain is worth avoiding five hours of groping and a lifetime of frustration and mistakes.
- 7. Language is not grammar. Grammar simply helps learners understand how things go together.

Course Attempts & Course Withdrawal:

1. A student is permitted to withdraw from a class on or before the withdrawal deadline, as published in the College calendar. A student is not permitted to withdraw from a class after the withdrawal deadline.

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- 2. A faculty member is not permitted to withdraw a student from their course throughout the semester.
- 3. Faculty members, however, must certify that students are actively attending a course during the first week of classes, during the no-show period. If students do not attend class/complete an online assignment, during the first week of class, student will be withdrawn as a 'No show' during this period at the beginning of the semester.
- 4. A student who withdraws from a class before the withdrawal deadline will receive a grade of "W." Any student who withdraws or is withdrawn from a class during a third or subsequent attempt in the same course will be assigned a grade of "F". The grades of "WP" and "WF" are eliminated.
- 5. A student who receives a grade of "W" will not receive credit for the course, and the "W" will not be calculated in the student's grade point average; however, the enrollment will count in the student's total attempts in the specific course.

VERY IMPORTANT: College policy requires that students who are not attending class during the first week of classes be withdrawn from the course. In an online class, attendance is documented by participation. Your orientation quiz is proof of attending the first week of classes. Thus, it is very important that during the first week of class, you complete the new student orientation, create your supersite account, and complete the orientation quiz. Failure to do so will result in being withdrawn from the course.

Assessments:

Lesson Tests (18%):

LESSON EXAMS:

All lesson tests will be administered online using Canvas via computer under time constraints. Keep in mind Canvas does not support test-taking with your phone or tablet. Make sure you are using Chrome as your browser. The best preparation method for tests is by keeping up with your class work, online homework, and assignments on Canvas. Tests will be administered at the end of each lesson accessed within Canvas in the Learning Modules for each chapter. The professor will drop the lowest lesson test grade. If you miss a test, that will be your lowest grade. The lowest dropped test grade policy does not apply to midterm or final since those are separate grades. **Important**: The use of vocabulary and grammar not learned in class will result in a failing grade for all assignments on Canvas.

There are <u>four Lesson exams</u> in this course (one exam for each of the Lessons covered in this course – Lesson 1, Lesson2, Lesson 4, & Lesson 5). Note that the lesson exams (as well as the Midterm & Final) are <u>Not</u> opened book nor open notes exams. Your top <u>three</u> scores will be used to calculate your exam percentage and final grade. Be aware that a make-up exam will only be granted for <u>legitimate extenuating circumstances with proper documentation provided by student (e.g. jury duty, funerals, military service, hospitalization, or religious holidays). The lowest exam grade will be dropped at the <u>end</u> of the semester. <u>The lowest dropped test grade policy does not apply to the Midterm or Final</u>. If you must miss an exam, be advised that you must contact me, your professor immediately, <u>prior</u> to the test date.</u>

IMPORTANT: All tests must be taken on the dates assigned on the <u>Course Calendar (https://online.valenciacollege.edu/courses/22119/pages/course-schedule)</u>. No makeup tests are available without <u>explicit written consent of your professor</u>, which will only be granted for legitimate extenuating circumstances. Each Test (Lesson Exam/Midterm/Final/etc.) on Canvas will be open to take within a 3-day window, so plan accordingly, as to when you will sit to complete your tests.

Tech issues:

Occasionally your server, computer, or Canvas has an error while you are taking a quiz or an exam, and you need to have the exam or quiz reset. If that happens, you can contact me to help you if I can—only if the deadline has not passed. Please be aware of and consider my office hours. If you email me at 11:00 pm when your quiz is due by 11:59 pm that same day, you should not expect a response from me before the deadline. If you send an email after the deadline, you will not be able to take the quiz or exam that you missed. Please plan accordingly. After sending the email, continue checking your email for additional notifications from me about the course of action you should take after your issue is resolved. You should also contact Valencia's tech support for additional help prior to contacting me. Note that should not wait until one hour before the due time to attempt to complete your assignments on Canvas.

Note: If you miss an exam you will receive a 0 (zero). You only have one attempt for each exam. Final Exam:

You will take one final comprehensive exam per semester (which will cover all the material covered throughout the semester). The Final Exam will include listening, reading, writing and an essay writing section. The Final Exam will be on the scheduled date listed during Finals Week. Do not make other plans for the days during Finals until you know the exact date and time of your scheduled Final Exam. THE FINAL EXAM IS 15 % OF YOUR GRADE.

MIDTERM: The Midterm will take place on the date listed on the Course Calendar and it will cover all the information from Lesson 1, Lesson 2, and Lesson 3. <u>THE</u> <u>MIDTERM EXAM IS 6 % OF YOUR GRADE</u>.

ORAL EXAMS / Oral Assessments: There are also three oral assessments which counts toward 8% of your final grade. Two of these assessments will be recorded online via Canvas and the last, final oral exam will take place some time during the last two weeks of class. Further information about the oral exam can be found below & detailed information (e.g. topics, rubric, date, etc.) will be available under the 'Module' section on Canvas (https://online.valenciacollege.edu/login/canvas (https://online.valenciacollege.edu/login/canvas).) as well as on the Course Calendar.

Midterm (6%) and Final Exam (15%):

The goal of the midterm and final exams is to assess your ability to assimilate what you have learned about Spanish grammar, vocabulary, language, and culture in the lessons up to that point in the course. The final exam will be comprehensive and cumulative in nature. The midterm and final exams will consist of listening, reading, and writing sections in which you will demonstrate your overall knowledge of the course material. The test is not curved and no make-up test will be given. Honorlock - Online Remote Proctoring system

"Honorlock" will proctor all your Exams this semester. "Honorlock" is an online proctoring service that allows you to take your exam from the comfort of your home. You Do Not need to create an account or schedule an appointment in advance. "Honorlock" is available 24/7 and all that is needed is a computer, a working webcam, and a stable Internet connection.

To get started, you will need the Google Chrome browser and to download the "Honorlock" Chrome Extension. You can download the extension at <u>www.honorlock.com/extension/install (http://www.honorlock.com/extension/install%C2%A0)</u>.

When you are ready to take your exam, log into Canvas, go to your course, and click on your exam. Clicking "Launch Proctoring" will begin the "Honorlock" authentication process, where you will take a picture of yourself, show your ID, and complete a scan of your room and desk. "Honorlock" will be recording your exam session by webcam as well as recording your screen. "Honorlock" also has an integrity algorithm that can detect search-engine use, so please do not attempt to search for answers, even if it is on a secondary device.

If you use any vocabulary or grammar not yet learned in this course, you will receive a failing grade as your grade for the assignment. Make sure you follow instructions carefully when completing any assignment. You will find the instructions for the compositions in the learning modules. Make sure you read and follow instructions carefully.

Technical issues with assignments must be communicated via email before the due date/time and after contacting Canvas.

Oral Assessments (8%):

There will be three oral assessments . These assessments will be recorded online via Canvas.

Cultural Presentation:

You will prepare a cultural presentation to be presented via a Discussion Board Assignment on Canvas. Every student is expected do their presentation between 4 to 6 minutes that will count as 7% of your total grade. More details in Canvas (https://online.valenciacollege.edu/login/canvas (https://online.valenciacollege.edu/login/canvas)) under the "Cultural Presentation / Research Project (https://online.valenciacollege.edu/courses/221119/pages/project-cultural-presentation-instructions-and-evaluation-information)" assignment. IMPORTANT: An example of what your presentation is supposed to look like is provided in the instructions on Canvas. And prior to this assignment, you will have to turn in a detailed Outline (https://online.valenciacollege.edu/courses/221119/pages/outline-template-for-project-spanish-speaking-country-cultural-presentation) of the information that you will be presenting in your presentation. It is your responsibility to carefully read the details of both the assignments/requirements provided on Canvas.

Cultural Presentation Projects:

For your Cultural Presentation, you are expected to present your project with good, detailed & clear visual aids (pictures) via PowerPoint (you may NOT use Prezi).

Make sure to follow the guidelines below for a successful presentation.

- 1. First you need to click on the Signup document (located under the instructions page of the Research project Module) and write your name next to the country that you will be presenting on; every student will be presenting on a <u>different</u> country (whoever signs up first, gets first choice on the country that they want to present on).
- 2. After you have signed up for one of the Spanish speaking countries; you will need to research that country. This is a research project, so you will need to <u>cite at least 5 different academic</u> <u>sources both in your Outline AND</u> at the end of your video presentation. Academic sources include books or government or educational websites (not personal website nor Wikipedia these are not considered academic resources).
- 3. Include a variety of clear visual aids (pictures) for each cultural aspect that you will be describing.
- 4. Present your project via video (or a PowerPoint saved as a video file) & make sure to do Spell Check to avoid any spelling mistakes.
- 5. Include a map of your country indicating where it is located.
- 6. You need to present in English but stay within the 4 minute to 6 minute (max) limit for your presentation.
- 7. Make sure that you do a comparison with your own culture and the country that you are presenting .
- 8. Do not read off your presentation; practice it multiple times before hand to make sure you are comfortable presenting it in your four to 6-minute time span.
- On your video presentation include descriptions of your visual aids but DO NOT write out everything you are going to say in each slide as you will be presenting this
 information, not reading it.
- 10. In your presentation you should make sure to include multiple Important / Unique Traditions, as well as celebrations & important holidays.

Supersite Activities - Online Homework (35%):

<u>VHL Supersite (https://online.valenciacollege.edu/courses/221119/pages/vhl-supersite)</u> is one of the two learning management systems you will use in this course. These activities are your class work–learning activities. The activities assigned in the VHL Supersite and "<u>vText</u> := <u>(https://reader.vhlcentral.com/portales12e/student-edition/vol1-2e_vtext)</u>" are listed in the 'Dashboard' as well as under the **Calendar** in the "Assignment" tab on the VHL Supersite website. The activities assigned represent extensive communicative practice that will assist students internalizing the language. These activities are graded and averaged as part of the overall 'VHL Supersite' grade for the course. VHL Supersite activities will need to be completed by the dates that appear in the VHL Supersite calendar (which is located under the "Assignments" tab on the right-hand corner on the VHL Supersite website). Other assignments might be graded differently, depending on the type of activity. Late Supersite activities incur a penalty of 5% reduction for each day they are late. Submissions after 19 days of the due date will obtain a zero grade. - Technical issues with assignments must be communicated via email before the due time and after contacting Canvas.

Zoom:

For this class, we will use Zoom for a mandatory meeting (Meet your professor). This assignment(s) will be scheduled using Canvas Calendar. You might have Zoom sessions scheduled to complete other assignments for this course.

Our class sessions will all be audio-visually recorded for students in the class to refer to and for enrolled students who are unable to attend live. Students who participate with their camera engaged or utilize a profile image agree to have their video or image recorded. If you are unwilling to consent to have your profile or video image recorded, be sure to keep your camera off and do not use a profile image. Likewise, students who unmute during class and participate orally are agreeing to have their voices recorded. If you are not willing to consent to have your voice recorded during class, you will need to keep your mute button activated and communicate exclusively using the "chat" feature, which allows students to type questions and comments live.

Tutoring

The Language Lab (https://valenciacollege.edu/students/learning-support/east/language/) offers in-person tutoring that is available to any student enrolled in a Spanish class (or any foreign language course). It is located in the East Campus library, first floor in Building 4, The Learning Support Center. It is designed to help students who need additional time or support in mastering concepts or answering specific topic-related questions. Tutors may answer questions related to online homework, such as confusion with instructions or a particular concept, but they cannot complete assignments for you. Be sure to come to the tutoring center with a particular question(s) in mind.

Please note that Valencia also offers <u>Online Tutoring (https://libguides.valenciacollege.edu/c.php?g=1014597&p=7348794)</u> or 'Distance Tutoring' via Zoom as well for a number of different courses including for Foreign Languages (which includes Spanish). You must make an appointment with a Tutor to meet via Zoom.

Email: Email will be an integral part of this course. Make sure you:

- Check your email often, at least once a day (this is required). Any instructions will have due dates for your response.
- Please, always write in the subject line Elementary Spanish I online and the course section number (CRN).
- Do not use personal emails. You will not receive a response.
- Use a greeting and a closing. Treat university email as regular mail, not as text messaging.
- Do not use the VHL Supersite email or personal email. You will not receive answer.
- Any email referring to tech issues with Supersite should include the incident report number they will provide you.
- Be patient. Don't expect an immediate response when you send a message. I will get back to you within 24 to 48 hours Mondays Fridays or sooner. Weekend emails will be answered on the next business day. Set up your Canvas account to receive emails or get the Canvas App so you do not miss any email or announcement.
- You can use the discussion board in Canvas to ask questions to other students in the class. This discussion board is called "El Café Latino" Just remember that this
 discussion board is exclusively for the students to help each other and I will not reply to any emergencies or questions about your grade within this discussion board.
- Be courteous and considerate. Being honest and expressing yourself freely is very important but being considerate of others online is just as important as it is in the classroom.
- Make every effort to be as clear as possible in your communications. Online communication lacks the nonverbal cues that fill in much of the meaning in face-to-face communication.
- Do not use all caps. This makes the message very hard to read and is considered "shouting." Check spelling, grammar, and punctuation (you may want to compose in a word processor, then cut and paste the message into the discussion or e-mail).
- Break up large blocks of text into paragraphs and use a space between paragraphs.
- Sign your e-mail messages and include the course you are taking.
- Never assume that your e-mail can be read by no one except yourself; others may be able to read or access your mail. All emails and communications at Valencia College
 are public record.
- Make sure you check email daily (required). Any instructions will have due dates for your response. If you email because of tech issues, they should be resolved before due time.

Participation/ Canvas Discussions (5%):

You are required to complete the activities listed in the discussion board, then to check regularly to review the responses of other students, and to add follow-up comments whenever applicable to contribute to the academic discussion thoughtfully and with detail. I will be monitoring your progress and the quality of your responses throughout the course. To receive full credit you are required to post one original comment and reply to 5 or more postings.

The guidelines to receive full credit for Discussions are as follows:

- Post an original comment by the Due Date
- Read at least seven other responses
- Reply to a minimum of five (5) or more peers' responses within two days of the Posting deadline

- You are required to post before midnight and will have until two days of the Posting deadline to respond to other students. No late postings will be accepted.
- Do not post to comments with original postings with that have five (5) responses.

In addition to discussions, this percentage of your grade also includes your orientation quiz, setting VHL account first week of classes, and other activities that will be announce during the semester.

Participation Policy:

Attendance is required for this online course. You are responsible for all material and announcements posted on Canvas, under the Announcements & via your Valencia College email. It is your responsibility to contact your professor regarding questions on missed activities and assignments.

Attendance during the first week of classes is mandatory. Anyone who does not complete any of the assignments due on Canvas during the first week of class will be withdrawn as a "No Show".
