Prerequisite: SPN 1120 or Departmental Approval

A minimum grade of C in SPN 1120 or equivalent (two years of high school Spanish completed within the last three years and department approval).

This course requires self-discipline and time commitment. All assignments, activities, and assessments are due according to the calendar of deadlines found on the Course Calendar and the VHL Central homework Calendar. Keep up with the pace of the course and ask for help as soon as you feel you need it.

CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

Elementary Spanish II is the second semester of the one-year Elementary Spanish Language and Civilization sequence. It emphasizes oral proficiency as well as the remaining language skills: listening, reading, writing, as well as awareness and understanding of the culture. **A minimum grade of C is required to pass this course** if being used to satisfy the General Education Foreign Language requirement. This course is not available to native or near-native speakers.

Course Description: This course is a continuation of fundamental skills in Spanish comprehension, expression, and structure. It increases awareness and understanding of the culture. It emphasizes oral and

written proficiency as well listening and reading comprehension. The level of proficiency you attain will depend on you as the student.

Course Learning Objectives:

Goals: There are various goals for Spanish II. The first is to develop **basic communicative skills** in Spanish as a second language. At the end of the semester students are expected to use the target language to, listen, write, read, & talk about:

- your past experiences
- describing food, and ordering food in a restaurant
- how you feel physically and talk about health and medical conditions
- your daily routine and personal hygiene
- clothing, negotiate and pay for items, & express preferences while shopping

A second goal is to develop **some general knowledge about culture** in the Spanish-speaking world. Some examples are:

- foods and meals in Hispanic countries
- celebrations and traditions in Hispanic countries
- history, geography, and defining characteristics of different Hispanic countries

Do not expect this course to be just about grammar and vocabulary learning. Although you will be learning grammar and vocabulary to achieve the goals below, they are not the only focal point of this course. You will also be tested on cultural and communicative aspects of the language so studying and preparation should not be limited to studying only grammar and vocabulary.

In agreement with the *Standards for Foreign Language Learning in the 21st Century*, also known as the “**5C’s**”, this course will enable students to:

- **Communicate** in Spanish (according to the proficiency level targeted in the course).
- Gain knowledge and understanding of **Cultures** of the Hispanic world.
- **Connect** with other disciplines and acquire new information.
- Develop awareness of similarities and differences (**Comparisons**) among language and culture systems around the world.
- Use the language and the knowledge gained in the course to build and participate in **Communities** at home and around the world.

ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines for novice high level of proficiency are that the student can:

SPEAK: Manage simple and formulaic communicative tasks in straightforward social situations.

LISTEN: Sometimes understand information from sentence-length speech, one utterance at a time, with contextual support. Understand standardized speech dealing with areas of basic practical needs.

READ: Typically derive meaning from short, simple texts in context and/or with extra linguistic support. Understand formulaic language such as that which is found on train schedules, road maps, and street signs.

WRITE: Meet limited basic writing needs using lists, short messages, and simple notes.

Methodology and Activities:

This course stresses **communication skills** in Spanish. Every effort will be made to make this class student-centered. To help students succeed in this course, the class will engage in a variety of activities and assignments, including but not limited to activities such as the following: Practice and communication using vocabulary and grammar learned in oral and written modes; Sociolinguistic practice and functions through communicative activities (paired and virtual chat activities using VHL Supersite); Reading activities and exercises, such as pre- and post-reading, intensive and extensive reading; Writing activities ranging from short paragraphs to developed compositions; Video/audio/computer exercises, presentations, and discussions.

Language Learning Tips: Food for thought.

1. **Be tolerant** to not understanding all of what you are hearing in Spanish. Be comfortable listening selectively.
2. **Use trial and error**...for *practice*. Language is more skill than knowledge.
3. **Spanish is not English**. Be prepared to look at everything differently – not only words and phrases, but also *complete* ideas.
4. **Lose your fear of making mistakes**.
5. **Memorize rules**. Five minutes engraving a rule in the brain is worth avoiding five hours of groping and a lifetime of frustration and mistakes.
6. **Language is not grammar**. Grammar simply helps learners understand how things go together.

Lesson Tests (15%):

LESSON EXAMS: There are **four Lesson exams** in this course (one exam for each of the Lessons covered in this course – Lesson 6, Lesson 7, Lesson 9, & Lesson 10). Your top **three** scores will be used to calculate your exam percentage and final grade. Be aware that a make-up exam will only be granted for legitimate extenuating circumstances with proper documentation provided by student (e.g. jury duty, funerals, military service, hospitalization, or religious holidays). The lowest exam grade will be dropped at the end of the semester. The lowest dropped test grade policy does not apply to the Midterm or Final. **If you must miss for an exam, be advised that you must contact me, your professor immediately, prior to the test date.**

IMPORTANT: All tests must be taken on the dates assigned on the [Course Calendar](#). No makeup tests are available without explicit written consent of your professor, which will only be granted for legitimate extenuating circumstances with proper documentation provided by student (in a case of jury duty, funerals, military service, or religious holidays).

Final Exam: You will take one final comprehensive exam per semester (which will cover all the material covered throughout the semester). **The Final Exam will include listening, reading, writing and an essay writing section. The Final Exam will be on the scheduled date(s) listed during Finals Week. Do not make other plans for the days during Finals week until you know the exact date(s) of your scheduled Final Exam. THE FINAL EXAM IS 15 % OF YOUR GRADE.**

MIDTERM: The Midterm will take place on the date listed on the Course Calendar and it will cover all the information from Lesson 6, Lesson 7, and Lesson 8. THE MIDTERM EXAM IS 5 % OF YOUR GRADE.

ORAL EXAMS / Oral Assessments: There are also **three oral assessments** which counts toward **10%** of your final grade. These assessments will be recorded online via Canvas . Further information about the oral exam can be found below & detailed information (e.g. topics, rubric, date, etc.) will be posted on the announcement section on Canvas (<https://online.valenciacollege.edu/login/canvas>) as well as on the [Course Calendar](#).

Note: If you miss an exam you will receive a 0 (zero). You only have one attempt for each exam. Note that you cannot wait until one hour before the due time to attempt the test then email me regarding any problems you encounter because you will miss the deadline.

Midterm (5%) and Final Exam (15%):

The goal of the midterm and final exams is to assess your ability to assimilate what you have learned about Spanish grammar, vocabulary, language, and culture in the lessons up to that point in the course. The final exam will be comprehensive and cumulative in nature. The midterm and final exams will consist of listening, reading, and writing sections in which you will demonstrate your overall knowledge of the course material. The test is not curved and no make-up test will be given. Check [Course / Assignment Schedule](#) for Midterm Exam and Final Exam date(s).

Midterm (5%) and Final Exam (15 %): You will go to a Valencia testing center or arrange to take the midterm and the final exam using Proctor U , an online proctoring company if you do not live close to a Valencia College campus (<https://www.proctoru.com> ^{en} [\(https://www.proctoru.com/\)](https://www.proctoru.com/)). Midterm and Final Exam expectations are the same as for other exams. Midterm and final exam are NOT opened book/ opened note.

1. These two exams must be taken in one of Valencia's testing centers or approved testing center, using Canvas.
2. If you do not live in the Central Florida area, you may arrange to take the exam using Proctor U.
3. When you take the exam you must show your Valencia ID.
4. Each of Valencia's testing centers have different days and hours of operation. Some of their hours may be different from the times posted on their webpage. Please double-check that the hours of operation at the Valencia testing center you intend to use
5. None of the Valencia testing centers are opened on Sunday.
6. Saturday hours are limited.
7. None of the testing centers will allow you to sit for the exam one hour prior to the center's closing time.
8. The open hours I allow for the exam do not reflect the hours of the testing centers.
9. You are not allowed to have notes, books, or any other study aids during the exams.

The goal of the midterm and final exams is to assess your ability to assimilate what you have learned about Spanish grammar, vocabulary, language, and culture in the lessons up to that point in the course. . The final exam will be comprehensive and cumulative in nature. The midterm and final exams will consist of listening, reading, and writing sections in which you will demonstrate your overall knowledge of the course material. The test is not curved and no make-up test will be given. **Check schedule for opening and closing date for Midterm and Final Exams.**

Compositions (6%): You will write a minimum of two compositions in Spanish. The use of electronic translators or unauthorized human assistance (such as a Spanish-speaking friend) is strictly forbidden. **You are only allowed to use vocabulary and grammatical forms learned in this course. Otherwise you will receive a failing grade for the assignment.** Make sure you follow instructions carefully when completing any assignment. You will find the instructions for the compositions in the learning modules.

Oral Assessments (10%): There will be three oral assessments . These assessments will be recorded online via Canvas. Further information about the oral exam can be found below & detailed information (e.g. topics, rubric, date, etc.) will be posted on the announcement section on Canvas (<https://online.valenciacollege.edu/login/canvas>) as well as on the [Course Calendar](#).

Supersite Activities (30%): [VHL Supersite](#) is one of the two learning management systems you will use in this course. The activities assigned in the VHL Supersite and “vText” are listed in the **Calendar** tab under “Assignment Calendar”. The activities assigned represent extensive communicative practice that will assist students internalizing the language. These activities are graded and averaged as part of the overall grade. VHL Supersite activities will need to be completed by the dates that appear in the VHL Supersite calendar. Other assignments might be graded differently, depending on the type of activity. Late Supersite activities incur a penalty of **10%** reduction for each day they are late. Submissions after 9 days of the due date will obtain a zero grade. If you do not have a physical textbook, you can access the digital textbook format by clicking on the “[eCompanion](https://reader.vhlcentral.com/portales1e/student-edition/vol1_ecompanion-v2#/book/vol1_ecompanion-v2?rid=0)” link on the [VHL Central website](http://www.vhlcentral.com) under the ‘Content’ tab on the top right-hand corner on the VHL Central website.

All online (Supersite) homework is due by 11:59 PM .

NOTE: Please do the homework frequently. Do not leave the homework for the last minute. You will not finish and you may encounter technological problems. Use the textbook to help you complete the online activities. Activities are due as assigned online. Read the instructions and the whole exercise carefully **before** listening or performing the task. For audio exercises **you may need to listen several times to each exercise.**

Activities with a partner and recording activities: In the Supersite, there are activities that you will need to record your answers with a “virtual” conversation partner and there are other activities that you are required to record with a partner. In order to complete the activities recording with a partner, you need to have a webcam. You are responsible to contact and schedule to meet with your peer online before the due date. There are three alternatives to find a partner: (1) when you are online in the VHL Supersite: go to the **Communication** tab, and then select “Chat”. A window will pop up including the names of all students that are online when you are. Select the name of any student to wish to partner with and ask to be your partner. (2) A second alternative is to post an announcement in the discussion board titled, “**El cafe latino**” in Canvas. (3) The last alternative is to invite your peers via email using Canvas.

The Language Lab / the Tutoring center is available to any student enrolled in a Spanish class (or any foreign language course). **It is located in the East Campus library, in Building 4, room 104.** It is designed to help students who need additional time or support in mastering concepts or answering specific topic-related questions. Tutors may answer questions related to online homework, such as confusion with instructions or a particular concept, but they cannot complete assignments for you. Be sure to come to the tutoring center with a particular question(s) in mind.

Email: Email will be an integral part of this course. Make sure you:

- Check your email often, at least once a day. **Please always write in the subject line Elementary Spanish 2 online and the course section number (CRN). Do not use personal emails. You will not receive any response.**
- Use a greeting and a closing. Treat university email as regular mail, not as text messaging.
- Do not use the VHL Supersite email or personal email. You will not receive answer.
- Any email referring to tech issues with Supersite should include the incident report number they will provide you.
- Be patient. Don't expect an immediate response when you send a message. I will get back to you within 24 hours Mondays – Fridays. Weekend emails will be answered on the next business day. Set up your Canvas account to receive emails or get the Canvas App so you do not miss any email or announcement.
- You can use the discussion board in Canvas to ask questions to other students in the class. This discussion board is called "El café latino" Just remember that this discussion board is exclusively for the students to help each other and I will not reply to any emergencies or questions about your grade within this discussion board.
- Be courteous and considerate. Being honest and expressing yourself freely is very important but being considerate of others online is just as important as it is in the classroom.
- Make every effort to be as clear as possible in your communications. Online communication lacks the nonverbal cues that fill in much of the meaning in face-to-face communication.

- Do not use all caps. This makes the message very hard to read and is considered "shouting." Check spelling, grammar, and punctuation (you may want to compose in a word processor, then cut and paste the message into the discussion or e-mail).
- Break up large blocks of text into paragraphs and use a space between paragraphs.
- **Sign your e-mail messages and include the course you are taking.**
- Never assume that your e-mail can be read by no one except yourself; others may be able to read or access your mail. All emails and communications at Valencia College are public record.
- Make sure you check email daily (required). Any instructions will have due dates for your response. If you email because of tech issues, they should be resolved before due time.

Participation Policy / Canvas Discussions (13%):

Participation/ Canvas Discussions (13%): You are required to complete the activities listed in the discussion board, then to check regularly to review the responses of other students, and to add follow-up comments whenever applicable to contribute to the academic discussion thoughtfully and with detail. I will be monitoring your progress and the quality of your responses throughout the course. To receive full credit you are required to post one original comment and reply to 5 or more postings.

The guidelines to receive full credit for discussions are as follows:

- Post an original comment Due Date
- Read at least five other responses
- Reply to a minimum of three (5) or more peers' responses by no later than two days after the original Due Date listed on the Course Schedule.

- You are required to post before midnight and will have until Saturday to respond to other students. No late postings will be accepted.
- Do not post to comments with original postings with that have five (5) responses.

In addition to discussions, this percentage of your grade also includes your orientation quiz, setting VHL account first week of classes, meet your professor and other activities that will be announce during the semester.

Attendance Policy:

This course is web-based, fully online and considered a "WWW" course. Students are expected to complete and participate in all online activities and assignments. Participation in online discussions are similar to attendance in a face-to-face class and joining in group discussions is an absolute requirement. Therefore, try not to miss these asynchronous activities because once a discussion opportunity is missed, it is not possible to make it up. Assignments that are not turned in to Blackboard or the Supersite will receive 0 points and missed exams cannot be retaken. (See above for Supersite activities late deduction policy.) Be

sure to provide pertinent documentation deemed acceptable by the instructor for any excused absence from a discussion group or delayed assignment. There are no Incompletes given in language

VERY IMPORTANT First Week: College policy requires that students who are not attending class the first week of classes to be withdrawn from the course. In an online class, attendance is documented by participation. Your orientation quiz is proof of attendance the first week of classes. Thus, it is very important that during the first week of class you complete the new student orientation, create your own supersite account, and complete the orientation quiz. Failure to do so will result in being withdrawn from the course.

However, under the new policy, after the first week of class, if you do not withdraw prior to the deadline and you do not complete your work, you will receive an "F" as final grade. If you have an emergency please contact me immediately.

For severe **medical conditions** that result in excessive absences, consult the Dean of Students concerning Valencia's medical withdrawal policy. International students, and students receiving financial aid, should be aware of how a "W" will affect their status.

Cultural Presentation: You will prepare a cultural PowerPoint/Video presentation to be presented via a Discussion Board Assignment on Canvas. Every student is expected do their presentation between 4 to 6 minutes that will count as **6%** of your total grade. More details in Canvas

IMPORTANT: An example of what your presentation is supposed to look like is provided in the instructions on Canvas. And prior to this assignment, you will have to turn in a [detailed Outline](#) of the information that you will be presenting in your presentation. It is your responsibility to carefully read the details of both the assignments/requirements provided on Canvas.

Cultural Presentation Projects:

For your Cultural Presentation, you are expected to present your project with good, detailed & clear **visual aids (pictures) via PowerPoint (you may NOT use Prezi)**.

Make sure to follow the guidelines below for a successful presentation.

1. First you need to click on the [Signup document](#) [↗] (https://docs.google.com/document/d/1UwcZ1hm0glJM8proP63OM_5bre03L-cQ1Cyy2vhQC48/edit) and write your name next to the country that you will be presenting on; every student will be presenting on a **different** country (whoever signs up first, gets first choice on the country that they want to present on).
2. After you have signed up for one of the Spanish speaking countries; you will need to research that country. This is a research project, so you will need to **cite at least 5 different academic sources both in your Outline AND** at the end of your PowerPoint presentation. Academic sources include books or government or educational websites (not personal website nor Wikipedia – these are not considered academic resources).
3. Include a variety of clear visual aids (pictures) for each cultural aspect that you will be describing to the class.
4. Present your project via PowerPoint & make sure to do Spell Check to avoid any spelling mistakes.
5. **Include a map** of your country indicating where it is located.
6. You need to **present in English** but stay within the 4 minute to 6 minute (max) limit for your presentation.
7. **Make sure that you do a comparison with your own culture and the country that you are presenting .**
8. **Do not read off your presentation**; practice it multiple times before hand to make sure you are comfortable presenting it in your four to 6-minute time span.
9. On your PowerPoint presentation include descriptions of your visual aids but **DO NOT write out everything you are going to say in each slide** – as you will be presenting this information, not reading it.
0. In your presentation you should make sure to **include multiple Important / Unique Traditions, as well as celebrations** & important holidays.

Withdrawal from a Course Policy:

1. A student is permitted to withdraw from a class on or before the withdrawal deadline, as published in the College calendar. A student is not permitted to withdraw from a class after the withdrawal deadline.
2. A faculty member is permitted to withdraw a student from the faculty member's class for violation of the faculty member's attendance policy with written notification to the student prior to the beginning of the final exam period, as published in the faculty member's syllabus. A faculty member is not permitted to withdraw a student from his or her class as a response to student conduct which falls under the jurisdiction of the Student Code of Conduct (6Hx28:10-03).
3. A student who withdraws from a class before the withdrawal deadline will receive a grade of "W." A student who is withdrawn by a professor will receive a grade of "W." A student who is withdrawn for administrative reasons at any time will receive a grade of "W" or other grade as determined in consultation with the professor. Any student who withdraws or is withdrawn from a class during a third or subsequent attempt in the same course will be assigned a grade of "F". The grades of "WP" and "WF" **are eliminated.**
4. A student who receives a grade of "W" will not receive credit for the course, and the W will not be calculated in the student's grade point average; however, the enrollment will count in the student's total attempts in the specific course.

5. If a student withdraws from a class, the student may, upon request and only with the faculty member's permission (which may be withheld at any time in the sole discretion of the faculty member), continue to attend the course. If a student is withdrawn by a faculty member or is administratively withdrawn, the student is not permitted to continue to attend the class.
