Course Details -

- * *Description*: This three-credit hour, onsite course discusses the topics of macroeconomics: national income accounting, influence of money and banking, problems of inflation and unemployment, international trade and its impact on domestic economic activity. There are no pre-requisites or co-requisites for this course.
- * *Textbook*: *Principles of Economics*, 2nd edition, by OpenStax College. Check your student email for textbook information that was sent prior to the start of the semester.
- * *Examinations*: There are two regular exams and one cumulative final exam. Each exam is multiple-choice and given in class. Each regular exam has 20 questions, each worth 5 points. The final exam has 40 questions, each worth 2.5 points. The total for each exam is 100 points. The dates for the exams are:

Examination 1: Monday, September 25
Examination 2: Monday, October 30
Final Examination: Monday, December 4

- * *Examination Scores*: If the class average on each exam is below 75 percent, a curve necessary to reach 75 percent will be given. If the class average exceeds 75 percent, no curve will be given. Your exam score will be posted in Canvas. If there is a mistake on my part (or even if you believe so), then bring it to my attention immediately so that I can correct the error.
- *Course Average*: Your average for the course is calculated in three ways:
 - ♦ METHOD 1: Each regular exam is weighted 35 percent, and the final exam is weighted 30 percent.
 - ♦ METHOD 2: The higher regular exam is weighted 50 percent, and the final exam is weighted 50 percent.
 - ♦ METHOD 3: Each regular exam is weighted 15 percent, and the final exam is weighted 70 percent.

Your course average is determined by whichever method gives you the highest average. This procedure is done automatically and allows you to drop or miss one of the regular exams. Note that the **final exam is required**; if the final exam is not taken, then a score of zero will be calculated in the methods.

Course Policies -

- * *Make-Up Examinations*: A make-up exam is given only in college-approved instances, including, but not limited to, jury duty, maternity leave, official college event, military duty, hospitalizations, and death of an immediate family member.
- *Graded Work*: Your course grade is determined by your performance on exams. There are no graded quizzes, papers, projects, etc.
- * Withdrawal Deadline: The withdrawal deadline (W) is Friday, October 27. You will not be permitted to withdraw after this date, except for certain medical situations. I do <u>not</u> withdraw students because of failure to complete exams. If you decide to withdraw, then <u>YOU</u> must withdraw through Atlas or myUCF. - * *Intellectual Freedom and Viewpoint Diversity*: Students may record video and/or audio of class lectures for their personal use. - *Attendance*: There is no grade for attendance. It is your responsibility to prepare for and attend each lecture.


- Course Material

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Classroom Policies -

Each student is expected to comply with Valencia's policy on <u>Academic Honesty</u>. - 7 Don't close your books, rustle your papers, or grab your backpack to signal the end of class. I know what time it is.
- 8 Don't tell me that you will be missing class. If you're not in class, I assume that you have a good reason. Offer up an excuse, and you ruin it.
- **9** Refrain from doing work for another class while in mine. If you're too busy to be here, then don't attend.



You must have a valid picture ID to take an exam in the Testing Center. A student <u>MUST</u> schedule an appointment using RegisterBlast at least 24 hours <u>prior</u> to taking an exam. To schedule an appointment: For *Valencia students*, use <u>Valencia RegisterBlast</u>; and for *UCF students*, use <u>UCF RegisterBlast</u>. Sign in using your Valencia Atlas ID or UCF NID. In Canvas, click on the *Student Resources* button for additional information about registering through RegisterBlast. The format of a make-up exam will be the same as that of an inclass exam. This also holds if you decide to take an exam early.

Last Word

Each semester, I receive repeating questions during the course. I will answer them here.

<u>Question 1</u>: "I have vacation/work/family plans during the semester. Will this be a problem? **Answer**: In part, that depends on your abilities and whether you study the material you missed. If you have many plans already scheduled, then these plans will most likely interfere with your studies. Make-up exams are only given in college-approved instances. Work or vacation plans aren't among these. After discussion of this syllabus, decide if this course fits with what you want. If not, then you'll need to register for another professor's course.

<u>Question 2</u>: "How do I do well in your course?" Answer: To do well in economics, you practice. For each lecture, I will give a detailed description of the topic. You will have the opportunity to ask questions in class or during my office hours. Also, you have access to many practice questions, previous exams, and onsite and online tutoring. In other words, there's a lot of resources available to you. Don't wait until it's "too late" to seek help. If you're having trouble, then let me know and show you're concerned.

Question 3: These questions are asking for special treatment.

- ♦ "Can you let me do the exam again?"
- ♦ "Can I have extra credit?"
- ♦ "I didn't know when the exam was. Can I take it later?"
- ♦ "I missed class last week. Can I have the notes?"
- ♦ "I have an 88%. Can you give me two points so I can have an A?"
- ♦ "I need this class to graduate, but I'm failing. Can I write a paper?"

Answer: These requests for favors invariably come from students who aren't doing the work. When students realize that they have fallen behind (usually because of procrastination) but don't want to put in the effort to catch up (usually because of laziness), that's when the requests for favors flood in. However, for those students who are studying hard, completing all the course work, following directions and deadlines, and really wanting to be in the class, it's completely unfair to give leniency to those students who aren't. So...There are no make-up exams, except in the college-approved instances. Drop a bad exam score and move on. There is no additional work because you "need" this class. All students need this class, or they wouldn't have enrolled. There is no "bumping" to the next grade level. You didn't earn that grade level. There is no extra credit. Just work extra hard during the remaining time in the course. I don't make notes available to students because I don't have any. Get notes, handouts, and review sheets from one of your classmates.
