Pre-requisites/Co-requisites

ENC1101 or 1101H with minimum grade of C

Course Description

- Application of skills learned in ENC 1101. Emphasis on style; use of library; reading and evaluating available sources; planning, writing, and documenting short research paper.
- Gordon Rule course in which the student is required to demonstrate college-level writing skills through multiple assignments. Minimum grade of C required if ENC 1102 is used to satisfy Gordon Rule and general education requirements.

Course Learning Outcomes

The following outcomes will be assessed in this course. An “outcome” is defined as something students take with them beyond this course. During this course, you will learn the following skills.

Apply a multi-stage composing and revising process to produce essays.

Explanation: For each paper, you will go through the entire writing process: deciding on a topic, choosing sources, creating an outline, assembling an annotated bibliography, and polishing your rough draft into a final draft. For the first paper, you’ll also be peer reviewing your classmates’ papers. Following the process will help you to approach all writing tasks with confidence.

Compose a written argument using evidence from varied sources.

Explanation: Argument isn’t just for non-fiction topics. You can also make strong, significant claims about literature, too. In this course, you’ll be writing an argument paper related to one of the poems we’re reading in the second half of the course. You’ll analyze the poem and relate it to a personal experience or a current event. This paper will not only sharpen your argumentative skills, it will also give you a new appreciation for the power and importance of poetry. Poetry isn’t just Shakespearean sonnets: Poetry can capture a moment with a rawness and realness that even fiction can’t match.

Apply conventions aligned to varied writing situations.

Explanation: In this course, you’ll become familiar with several types of writing: informal journal responses, group discussions with classmates, evaluations of classmates’ work, analysis of professional sources, and formal expressive and argumentative papers. Learning the conventions of these situations will prepare you for different writing challenges you will encounter in college and beyond. You will be able to shape your writing so that it meets academic and professional standards.

Document source material in accordance with at least one recognized documentation style.

Explanation: MLA is the documentation format of English and the humanities. For the first paper, you will be required to use MLA format. For the second paper, you’ll have the option of using APA format, the documentation style used in the sciences and social sciences. You’ll be able to use the format which aligns with your major. No matter your major, you will see these two documentation styles repeatedly in college and, possibly, in your professional life. This course assumes that you have some experience with format and documentation, but there will be ample resources in the course Canvas shell to help you with both. Mastering MLA and APA will improve your writing and information literacy skills, as correct format and documentation are important whenever you are using sources.

Apply critical reading skills.

Explanation: To be able to write about literature, you must be able to read it carefully. This course will promote the deep and thoughtful reading of stories, poems, and sources about the stories and poems. We will learn active reading skills and annotation methods to help you master these varied, complex, and beautiful pieces of writing. These skills will be important not just for ENC 1102, but for any class or profession which requires clear understanding of written materials—and that’s all of them!

These are some of the characteristics that can contribute to your success.

1) Create a learning space

Use a space conducive to learning. An optimal space is technologically accessible, has minimal distractions, is comfortable, and allows you to take mental and physical breaks every 15-20 minutes or as needed, where you can process what you learned, stretch, etc.

2) Manage your time each day

Plan to dedicate at least 8-10 hours per week to this course by creating a daily schedule that allows time to

- **complete** the online lessons.

- **create** the assignments in a thoughtful manner.

- **review** and utilize professor's feedback.
- **use** learning support.
- **recognize** that some assignments require much more time than others and plan accordingly, particularly planning, drafting, and revising essays.

3) Communicate with professor and peers

- Get to know your professor.
- Use engagement hours for one-on-one support.
- Use the online forums to engage in the discussions and learn from your professor as well as your peers.
- Set up study groups outside of class.

4) Utilize additional resources

What is expected?

What happens if I miss multiple lessons or assignments?

- Missing online lessons and assignments can adversely affect your course grade, which is why active participation is required of you. I will contact you through the Grade forum and/or Canvas email if you miss multiple assignments or a high-stakes assignment.

What if I am absent from the course?

- If you experience short-term absence from the course due to illness, family emergency, etc., please communicate with me as soon as possible to create a plan to complete any missed assignments so that your learning can progress in your course.

What is a "no show"?

What is the withdrawal deadline?

<i>Poetry Portfolio Prewriting</i>	2 assignments which prepare students for writing the Poetry Portfolio: An annotated bibliography and an outline. <i>Submission Method:</i> Word files	50 points
<i>Poetry Portfolio</i>	A 3- or 4-part portfolio that focuses on a poem. Students write an expressive reflection, a researched analytical argument, and a comparison/contrast with another poem. A fourth creative response section may be completed for extra credit. <i>Submission Method:</i> Canva, photographs, web links, Word files (vary by individual paper)	200 points

Can I submit assignments early?

- Students are welcome to submit work early.
- Regrades of submitted assignments will only be allowed under very specific circumstances (such as a posting error). If a graded assignment can be resubmitted for additional credit, I will let you know in my grading comments.

What happens if I submit late?

- Late assignments lose 5% credit for each day of lateness. Assignments may not be turned in more than 1 week late. Extensions in emergency circumstances are decided on a case-by-case basis: Students experiencing unusual circumstances should contact me for a conference.
- Certain assignments this term may not be turned in late. Those will be specifically labeled in the Canvas module.

What if my file attachment or video link does not open?

- If your file attachment or video link does not work, this counts as a "0" because there is nothing to grade. This is also true for "blank" submissions when there is a submission, yet nothing is posted. Students will have to resubmit those assignments to receive credit.
- To prevent this, after your post, you need to return to the forum and check that your work is visible and opens.

When will I get my grades back?

I generally return regular graded assignments within 7 days and major assignments (the major papers) within 14 days from the original due date. If there is ever a grading delay, I'll let students know via Canvas announcement.

What can lead to plagiarism?

There are several ways that plagiarism can occur, so make sure you understand the conditions that can lead to plagiarized content to prevent unintentional or intentional plagiarism in this course.

Plagiarism happens when a student

- uses a source's ideas or content without quoting and citing.
- uses ideas or content from a peer.
- gives his or her work to another student.
- submits work from a prior semester or another class.
- uses unedited AI-generated text and represents it as entirely their own work.

How is this prevented?

- Create your own original work for this course that meets the assignment's criteria.
- Document a source's ideas by quoting what the source says and citing it using MLA citations.
- Use AI only for prewriting and generating ideas, not for creating full and final drafts.

What happens when plagiarism occurs?

- If an assignment has plagiarized ideas, the student is notified through Grades in Canvas or through email. **An assignment with plagiarized ideas will lose points depending on the amount of plagiarism involved. Heavily plagiarized assignments receive an automatic zero.**
- If plagiarism happens repeatedly, the student may be referred to the appropriate college representative, where proceedings for disciplinary measures may occur depending on the egregious nature of the Academic Dishonesty violation.
