DESCRIPTION: Application of skills learned in ENC 1101. Emphasis on style; use of library; reading and evaluating available sources; planning, writing, and documenting short research papers. Gordon Rule course in which the student is required to demonstrate college-level writing skills through multiple assignments. A minimum grade of C is required if ENC1102 is used to satisfy Gordon Rule and general education requirements.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

ENC 1102 is designed to improve critical reading and analysis skills through lecture, discussion, films, and examination of selected works of literature. It is also designed to develop research skills through the successful completion of a research paper. Some knowledge of computer skills will also be learned and utilized.

Notice of Non-Discrimination Based on Protected Status

This Policy prohibits all forms of Discrimination and Harassment based on Protected Status. It expressly, therefore, also prohibits Sexual Assault and Sexual Exploitation, which by definition involve conduct of a

sexual nature and are prohibited forms of Sexual or Gender-Based Harassment. This Policy further prohibits Stalking and Interpersonal Violence, which need not be based on an individual's Protected Status. Finally, this Policy prohibits Complicity for knowingly assisting in an act that violates this Policy and Retaliation against an individual because of his or her good faith participation in the reporting, investigation, and/or adjudication of violations of this Policy. These behaviors are collectively referred to in this Policy as Prohibited Conduct.

All members of the College community are responsible for conducting themselves in accordance with this Policy and other College policies and procedures. Valencia students and employees who violate this Policy may face discipline up to and including expulsion or termination.

The College's protection of these statuses is grounded in federal, state, and local laws. The College encourages all community members to take reasonable and prudent actions to prevent or stop Prohibited Conduct. Taking action may include direct intervention when safe to do so, seeking assistance from a person in authority at the College, enlisting the assistance of friends, contacting law enforcement, or contacting Campus Safety and Security. Members of the College community who exercise this positive responsibility will be supported by the College and protected from Retaliation.

The College has an obligation to make reasonable efforts to investigate and address known or suspected instances of Prohibited Conduct. To foster a climate that encourages prevention and reporting of Prohibited Conduct, the College will actively promote prevention efforts, educate the College community, respond to all reports promptly, provide Interim Protective Measures to address safety and emotional well-being, and act in a manner that recognizes the inherent dignity of the individuals involved.

Sexual or Gender Based Harassment, Sexual Assault, Sexual Exploitation, Interpersonal Violence, and Stalking

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 states that: No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance.

Sexual or Gender-Based Harassment, Sexual Assault, Sexual Exploitation, and Retaliation, as defined in this Policy, are prohibited forms of discrimination under Title IX, which covers all of the College's programs and activities. Like racial, religious, and national origin Harassment, Sexual or Gender-Based Harassment and Sexual Violence are also prohibited under Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Section 760 et al, F.S., and other applicable laws.

The College's prohibition against Interpersonal Violence (including domestic and dating violence) and Stalking is also governed by federal law because these forms of behavior are prohibited by the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security and Campus Crime Statistics Act, 20 U.S.C.§ 1092(f) (the Clery Act) and Section 304 of the Violence Against Women Re-authorization Act of 2013. Such acts violate the essential dignity of our community member(s) and are contrary to our institutional values.

The College, as an educational community, will promptly and equitably respond to reports of Sexual Assault, Interpersonal Violence, and Stalking in order to eliminate the Harassment, prevent its recurrence, and address its effects on any individual or the community. The College recognizes that Sexual Assault, Interpersonal Violence, and Stalking encompass a broad spectrum of conduct and will respond according to both the severity of the offense and the threat it poses to the campus community.

ATTENDANCE - PART ONE:

Valencia Online - Netiquette

The term "netiquette" refers to the awareness of the need for a certain code of behavior (etiquette) in electronic environments (the net) ... Net + Etiquette = netiquette. Netiquette, while a general term, is complex at specific levels because there are so many different kinds of electronic environments, and so many different situations in which we may find ourselves in those environments.

In this class, however, you also *represent* Valencia College in those public spaces, and you should keep in mind that those spaces are, practically speaking, an extension of the classroom itself.

If you are engaging electronic environments as a member of this class, then you are subject to the same expectations and rules of conduct any teacher or

ESSAYS: All essays should be typed and <u>double-spaced</u>. The SHORT STORY essays <u>should follow the outline provided exactly</u>. To make the essay, just delete the Roman numerals and capital letters on each outline, creating smooth paragraphs. The poetry essay should include a title page with the title of the essay, your name, ENC 1102, and the date. *Essays must be submitted only on your Canvas course page under "Assignments." No papers will be accepted by personal delivery. Essays will be accepted each week until the cut-off of Sunday at midnight.*

DEADLINES

Your essays must be submitted by midnight on Sunday evenings. LATE WORK WILL BE REDUCED BY ONE LETTER GRADE FOR EACH DAY LATE. NO EXCEPTIONS !! If there is no submitted assignment four days from the due date (Thursday), the student will be given a -0- for that assignment.

• There is a hard deadline for quizzes and exams. If a quiz or exam is not completed by 11:59pm on the due date, a grade of "0" will be assigned.

POETRY ASSIGNMENT

When you begin the Poetry Unit, **you will be assigned a specific poem**. At the beginning of the Poetry Unit, you will be able to open the Excel spreadsheet under "the Poetry Module." Find your poem. Read it. Research it. Create at least four paragraphs:

1st paragraph: Give the title of the poem, the author, the date, and two or three sentences about what **<u>you</u>** think the author is trying to say based **only** on your first reading of the poem.

2nd paragraph: Research and summarize a criticism from a professional source (not a blog). Make sure you document it in the essay and under your Works Cited page.(Remember to cite all your sources using the MLA documentation). Add in any relevant lines in the poem to support their opinion.

3rd paragraph. Research and summarize a criticism from a professional source (not a blog). Make sure you document it in the essay and under your Works Cited page.(**Remember to cite all your sources using the MLA documentation**). Add in any relevant lines in the poem to support their opinion.

4th paragraph: Give your opinion of what you think the poem is saying <u>after</u> you have read and reported on the two other sources and if it was effective. Write at least three sentences of your opinion.

Submit in a normal <u>Word doc</u>. under "Assignments" - "Poetry Assignment" by 11:59pm, *Sunday, March 10, 2024.*

• ENC 1102 Research Paper

The research paper's topic will come from your choice of a list supplied under the topic to the left under "Assignments" entitled "Research Paper, Parts 1-4." Part One contains a list of approved, classic literary novels. Only one person may select a title- no duplication. The work will be completed in stages during the course of the semester. Here is the course of action:

Select your classic and submit three choices to your professor. Once your title has been approved, access it online. Answer basic questions under The Research Paper Module "Research Paper Part 1" on Canvas by **Sunday**, **January 28**, **2024**. Counts **10 points** of your grade.

Finish reading your novel by Sunday, February 11, 2024.

WORKS CITED page due. Go online to find 1 criticism about plot, 1 criticism on point of view, and 1 criticism on theme. Submit under Research Paper Module "Research Paper Part 2" by February 18, 2024. Counts 20 points of your grade.

Write the outline and turn it in on Canvas under "Research Paper Module "Research Paper Part 3" by **Sunday, March 31, 2024.** Counts **35 points** of your grade.

Write your final paper and submit it on <u>or before Sunday</u>, April 14, 2024 Turn it in on Canvas under Research Paper Module and "Research Paper Part 4". *If you turn in your paper one week early (April 7)*, *you get 5 extra points added to your Research paper Part 4 grade!* Counts 35 points of your research paper grade.

WHAT TO EXPECT EACH WEEK

- Log in at least twice a week!

Under "Discussions," post your answer at the end of each month.

Under "Discussions," post a comment to one other student's post each month.

• Be present on the monthly Tuesday night Zoom meeting starting January 16 <u>at 7pm-7:45pm</u> then click on "Discussions" (to your far left) and answer the question.

• PARTICIPATION:

Students who participate in the monthly Zoom meetings beginning on Tuesday January 16 will get credit for every meeting they remain online for the entire call. Yes, I can see who is on the call and how long

each person stayed on the call. If you are unable to attend the Zoom meeting, you must sign in and watch the recorded meeting sometime during the week and e-mail me the answer to the question for that Tuesday Zoom meeting. If less than 12 students appear on the Zoom meeting during any two consecutive months, the Zoom meetings will cease.

Also, under "Discussions," students must post an answer in any of the unit discussions <u>and</u> post a comment to one other student's comment. A student can earn up to 5 percent <u>on their final</u> <u>grade</u>! Percentages are as follows:

70-89% response to Zoom and unit discussions: 4 percent

50-69% response to Zoom and unit discussions: 3 percent

20-49% response to Zoom and unit discussions: 2 percent

 - Learning Activities & Resources: Students will each write an essay using one of several assigned short stories to discover and analyze point of view.
 - Assessment: Quiz on Point of View short stories
 - o Discussion on September monthly Zoom meeting
 - o Written discussion at end of Short Stories Unit
 - Learning Activities & Resources: Each student will write an essay on setting using one of several assigned short stories.
 - Lecture on Narration, Guide to Writing a Narrative on monthly Zoom meeting.
 - Assessment: Quiz on Setting in the assigned short stories.
 - Learning Activities & Resources: Students will each write an essay using one of several assigned short stories to discover and analyze themes.
 - o Discussion of Theme in monthly Zoom meeting
 - o Assessment: Quiz on Themes in the assigned short stories
 - Learning Activities & Resources: Students will each write an essay using one of several assigned short stories to discover and analyze plot.
 - Assessment: Quiz on Plot in the assigned short stories
 - o Written Discussion Question at end of Unit.
 - Module Outcome: Students will identify examples of <u>plot</u> in assigned short stories.
 - Module Outcome: Students will identify examples of **point of view** in assigned short stories.
 - Module Outcome: Students will identify examples of setting in assigned stories.
 - o Module Outcome: Students will identify **theme** in assigned short stories.

Design Outcomes for the Short Stories Unit

Various assessments are used throughout the course and are sequenced in measurable growth steps that align with student learning outcomes/competencies.

- Live discussions in Zoom meetings
- Three required essays utilizing three elements of fiction.
- Short quizzes on each of the assigned short stories
- All-encompassing unit test on Short Stories at the end of the unit.

The Poetry Unit Outcomes

This Poetry Module will address the following course and module outcomes:

- Course Outcome: Students will develop skills in analyzing, assessing, and appreciation for a selected number of both modern and classic poems.
 - o Learning Activities & Resources: Students will read the assigned poems.
 - Assessment: Quiz on Week One Assigned poems and watch accompanying videos.
 - o Discussion of the week's assigned poems in monthly Zoom meeting
 - o Learning Activities & Resources: Students will read the assigned poems.
 - Assessment: Quiz on Week Two Assigned poems and watch accompanying videos.
 - Discussion of the week's assigned poems
 - o Learning Activities & Resources: Students will read the assigned stories.
 - Discussion of Poems
 - Assessment: Quiz on Week Three Poems from the assigned poems
 - Learning Activities & Resources: Students will each write an short research paper on an assigned poem.
 - Assessment: This poetry paper will be graded with more percentage than quizzes.
 - Written Discussion Question at end of Poetry Unit.
 - Module Outcome: Students will identify examples of poems including sonnets, haiku, and ballads.
 - o Module Outcome: Students will identify examples of theme, personification and alliteration in assigned poems.
 - Module Outcome: Students will demonstrate their knowledge of researching, and citing sources by creating a short research paper on an assigned poem.

Various assessments are used throughout the course and are sequenced in measurable growth steps that align with student learning outcomes/competencies.

- Live discussions on the assigned poems in Zoom meeting
- Short quizzes on the assigned poems.





In the aftermath of the hurricane 779 lost their lives and over 2,000 were killed by the time the hurricane dissipated. Some residents decided to rebuild but later hurricanes took their toll on the community and there is not much remaining of the once thriving village.


