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Credit Hours: 3 Class Hours: 3

DESCRIPTION: FRESHMAN COMPOSITION II. Prerequisite: Minimum grade of C in ENC 1101 or 1101H Application of skills learned in ENC 1101. Emphasis on style; use of library; reading and evaluating available sources; planning, writing, and documenting short research papers. This Gordon Rule course states that the student is required to demonstrate college-level writing skills through multiple assignments. A minimum grade of C is required if ENC 1102 is used to satisfy Gordon Rule and general education requirements. This class is a Gordon Rule class.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

ENC 1102 is designed to improve critical reading and analysis skills through lecture, discussion, films, and examination of selected works of literature. It is also designed to develop research skills through the successful completion of a research paper. Some knowledge of computer skills will also be learned and utilized.

Point of View



- 1st person point of view: a character WITHIN the story tells the story.
- 2nd person point of view: It's all about YOU.
- 3rd person omniscient point of view: a character NOT IN the story tells the story, and the reader sees the thoughts of MORE THAN ONE character.
- 3rd person limited point of view: a character NOT IN the story tells the story, and the reader sees the thoughts of ONE character.

Based on a true story. From the vantage point of an insane asylum, aging royal composer Salieri (F. Murray Abraham) recalls the events of three decades earlier, when the young Mozart (Tom Hulce) first gained favor in the court of Austrian emperor Joseph II. Salieri was very mad that God would bless so vulgar and obnoxious a young snipe as Mozart with divine genius. Unable to match Mozart's talent, Salieri uses his influence in court to sabotage the young upstart's career. Disguising himself as a mysterious benefactor, Salieri commissions Mozart to write the backbreaking *Requiem*, which eventually costs Mozart his health, wealth, and life. Among the film's many pearls of dialogue, the best line goes to the emperor, who rejects a Mozart composition on the grounds that it has too many notes! The movie "Amadeus" won eight Academy Awards, including Best Picture, Best Director, Best Adapted Screenplay, and Best Actor.

DETAILS ABOUT THIS CLASS:

GORDON RULE. This is a Gordon Rule writing course. This course requires the student to demonstrate college-level writing skills through multiple appropriately assessed writing assignments. Completion with a final grade of "C" or better will partially satisfy the requirements of State Board of Education Rule 6A-10.30. This course provides reinforcement in these College-Level Academic Skills: 1) Literal and critical reading comprehension; 2) essay skills (for ex., select a subject, formulate a thesis, provide supporting details, and revise for clarity and conformity); 3) writing skills. To satisfy requirements of the State of Florida, a new requirement is as follows: Six semester hours of English coursework and six semester hours of additional coursework in which the student is required to demonstrate college-level writing skills through multiple appropriately assessed writing assignments. As a result of this rule, students must earn a grade of "C" or higher in this course. *All* essays must be completed to meet this requirement.

<u>WITHDRAWALS:</u> Students who fall behind in their work may be withdrawn by the professor. A student may withdraw at any time during the term in Atlas. You may be withdrawn from the class by the instructor after the fourth unexcused absence.

SPRING Term Student Initiated Drop with Refund date is January 13, 2025, 11:59pm.

SPRING Student Initiated Term Drop/Withdrawal Deadline for Grade of "W" and no refund is Friday, March 14, 2025, at 11:59pm. After this date, up to April 27, 2025, if a student withdraws or is withdrawn by the professor for excessive absences or for other reasons, the professor will assign a grade of W (Withdraw). A "W" will not be counted in the grade point average. It will be as if the student never took the class.

Faculty Initiated Withdrawal

A faculty member is permitted to withdraw a student up to the beginning of the final exam period for violation of the faculty member's attendance policy as published in the faculty member's syllabus. 4th paragraph: Give your opinion of what you think the poem is saying <u>after</u> you have read and reported on the two other sources and if it was effective. Write at least three sentences of your opinion.

- o Go online to find five criticisms about plot and one other element of fiction that refers to your novel. Create a Works Cited page using this information. Keep the total information for use in your essay) Submit under "Assignments" "Research Paper Part 2 by Sunday, February 16. Counts 20 points of your grade.
- Write the outline and turn it in under "Assignments" by Sunday, March 30, 2025.
 Counts 35 points of your grade.

 Write your final paper and submit it on or before Sunday, April 13, 2025. Turn it in under "Assignments" and "Research Paper Part 4". Counts 35 points of your grade.
