# **Course Description**

HUM 1020 is a basic introduction to humanities. The course focuses on central concepts, historical development, and fundamental aesthetics or form in philosophy, architecture, music, religion, painting, poetry, and more. This course explores vast mediums and perspectives expressions of the human condition as it is reflected in social and material human designs. Our focus, humanistic inquiry, demands we interrogate the forms and themes expressed in artistic and material works to form historical and contemporary connections. Studying in the humanities integrates history, art history, political science and theory, philosophy, composition and rhetoric, anthropology, sociology, and other academic arenas.

This course introduces students to multiple artworks, mediums, movements, and historical moments while addressing a multitude of meanings in creative human production, what we refer to as culture. Through a combination of weekly recorded ZOOM lectures and live ZOOM discussions, students explore the aesthetic histories and social contexts of multiple works. Students demonstrate their engagement with assigned readings through weekly reading quizzes and hone their observational, interpretative, and analytical skills through discussion posts. Students illustrate their newly formed or refined knowledge through online, open-note unit tests.

With *mediation* as the theme for this course, students discover how the political and social conditions of a particular historical or artistic movement informs the formal choices and larger themes in a given cultural product/artwork. Simultaneously, understanding each work to be an expression of social anxieties, preoccupations, or desires, students will take what they see, hear, and feel to articulate how each work makes meaning for our own space and time. Revealing the value of art for worlds inside and outside the classroom, the course demonstrates the relevance of the humanities for a variety of academic disciplines and occupational pursuits.

### **Valencia Core Competencies**

The faculty of Valencia College has identified four core competencies that define the learning outcomes for a successful Valencia graduate. These competencies are at the heart of the Valencia experience and provide the context for learning and assessment at Valencia College. You will be given opportunities to develop and practice these competencies in this class. The four competencies are:

- 2. Value make reasoned judgments and responsible commitments to deadlines
- 3. **Communicate** communicate questions, interpretations, and complex ideas with instructor and fellow students in writing and virtual ZOOM sessions
- 4. **Act** act purposefully, effectively and responsibly when forming responses and arguments surrounding our studied works AND carry this critical thinking into your everyday experience


# **Learning Objectives**

Students in this course will develop and refine many skills related to both the content and coursework:

- Students will be able to identify the social and political concerns of specific historical moments and/or artistic movements.
- Students will be able to explain the thematic and formal preoccupations of varying artistic movements across a plethora of media forms.
- Students will be able to discuss artworks with appropriate technical terms when discussing cultural production.
- Students will sharpen their scholarly writing, developing astute observations into a meaningful interpretation that concludes with a valuable analysis.
- Students will learn how to engage with multiple artworks and mediums in an academic form, as well as glean how to engage with academic secondary materials.
- Students will learn how to properly research, cite, and rely upon academic sources.






# **Weekly Modules**

Every week, I will organize your assignments and supplemental material into modules. This will contain your reading quiz, the link to access the weekly recorded ZOOM lecture, supplemental YouTube videos to watch or additional study materials, and

weekly discussion posts. You can access every module in CANVAS > Modules > Week #. You should be able to complete each week's assignments through the module, but if you are unable to do so, directions to access reading quizzes and discussion posts are below. Each module will become available to you at 12:01 AM every Monday.

To best succeed in this course and complete all your required assignments on time, you should follow this weekly timeline:

- **Prior to 11:59 PM <u>Tuesday</u>**: Read Textbook Chapter, complete Reading Quiz, and view recorded ZOOM lecture
- **Wednesday**: Study the primary work (main cultural or artwork we are studying) and view supplemental study materials (i.e. YouTube videos, etc.)
  - Thursday: Join the Live ZOOM discussion to discuss the primary works
  - Prior to 11:59 PM Sunday: Complete discussion post

#### **ZOOM**

There will be two (2) ZOOM videos every week. The first will be a recorded ZOOM lecture in which I explain and contextualize each week's powerpoint slides you will be able to access via CANVAS > Files > Lecture Slides > Week # > .pptx. Recorded ZOOM lectures will be saved to the cloud in CANVAS and will be accessible from a link that you will find in your weekly module and emailed directly to all students.

The second ZOOM session will be a live Q&A discussion conference in which we can analyze the primary cultural works together and answer any questions. Live ZOOM discussions will be scheduled for every Thursday. For personal reasons, we will not have a consistent and regularly scheduled Live conference until the end of May. When attending Zoom discussions, ALL STUDENTS ARE TO SPEAK PROFESSIONALLY, BE CONSIDERATE OF THE INSTRUCTOR AND OTHER STUDENTS, AND RESPECT THE FEELINGS AND CONCERNS OF OTHERS. I do NOT tolerate offensive or intolerant language or behavior in my classroom and will not tolerate the same in virtual conferences.

Discussion Posts 30%

Students will be required to complete **five (5) discussion posts** over the course of the semester. Discussion posts are designed to ensure attention to assigned homework and comprehension of previous lectures, requiring completing a response to multifaceted questions on the prior weeks' material. Discussion posts can be found on CANVAS >

Discussion > Discussion Post #. Discussion questions will be posted to CANVAS and available for student view at 12:01 AM on Monday and will be due no later than 11:59pm on the immediately following Sunday. Because students have a full week to complete this assignment, late posts to the discussion board will be graded as a 0 and NOT accepted any later than the assigned due date unless permission is granted in advance by the instructor. Discussion posts are currently assigned to be completed on the following dates: Su 5/10; Su 5/24; Su 6/21; Su 7/12; & Su 7/26.

Students are welcome to respectfully comment on the discussion posts offered by their peers, but responses to other posts will **NOT** be graded as participation in discussion. To complete the discussion post assignment, each student must respond to the prompt in their own post. Discussion posts should span, roughly, 300 words. Every post should begin with a clear and identifiable thesis statement that promises a logical organization that the student's writing clearly executes. Discussion posts will be assessed on writing proficiency, understanding of material, quality of ideas, and clarity.

### Grading for discussion posts is as follows:

### • 10- Exceptional

The student provides a clear, concise, and articulate response to the prompt. The student has engaged well with the material and integrated evidence from the selected text(s) into a strong, novel analysis with close-readings. The student has brought new information or insight beyond what has been discussed in class lectures. The analysis is exceptional and focused into a clear argument. Words and ideas from outside sources are placed in quotation marks (when necessary) and properly parenthetically cited with a full citation at the bottom of the post.

## • 8-9- Very Good

The student responds directly to the prompt but may lack clarity or concision. The student may provide evidence from selected text(s), but analysis or interpretation of the evidence is unclear or absent. The student understands the meaning and value of each work, but does not elaborate or add to what is offered by the artwork or secondary material. The student might have quoted words of others but not properly parenthetically cited the material or is missing a bibliography.

#### 7- Good

The student mostly addresses the prompt offered by the instructor, but does not clearly address the central question or does not provide a focused response. The student may provide evidence from text(s), but it lacks proper context or analysis, or the offered evidence contradicts the claims of the student. The student seems to slightly

misunderstand some minor value of the artwork or secondary material. There are no citations in the post and words or ideas from others are not properly credited.

### • 0-6- Needs improvement

The student that scores in this category will have one or many of these issues and the score will correspond with the severity of each instance. The student does not address the prompt or central question offered by the instructor. The discussion post is far too brief to demonstrate any engagement with the materials. The post lacks any reference to selected text(s). The student has plagiarized the post. The student does not complete the discussion post by the required deadline of **Sunday at 11:59pm**.

Discussion posts will be scored out of a total of 50 points at the end of the semester. Each discussion post will be worth a total of ten (10) points but contribute towards 30% of the final course grade.

### Reading Quizzes 30%

Students will be required to complete reading quizzes on assigned material prior to live ZOOM discussion sessions. Excluding the syllabus quiz which is due the first Friday in the course (5/8), quizzes will be **due EVERY Tuesday** we are exploring new material by 11:59 PM. Currently, reading quizzes are assigned for the following dates: **Fri 5/8** (Syllabus Quiz), Tu 5/12, Tu 5/19, Tu 5/26, Tu 6/9, Tu 6/23, Tu 7/7, Tu 7/14, Tu 7/22.

All reading quizzes may be accessed on CANVAS > Quizzes > Quiz #. All reading quizzes will be available on Monday at 12:01 AM prior to the class Tuesday on which they are due. All reading quizzes are due at 11:59 PM on the Tuesday they are assigned. You will have 48 hours to complete your reading quiz. There are NO exceptions, failing submit a completed quiz prior to this time on the assigned date will result in the score of a zero.

\*\*THE ONLY EXCEPTION WILL BE THE SYLLABUS QUIZ ASSIGNED ON THE FIRST DAY OF CLASS, Monday 5/4; THIS SYLLABUS QUIZ WILL BE DUE FRIDAY NIGHT (5/8) BY 11:59PM TO CONFIRM ACADEMIC ACTIVITY.\*\* NOT COMPLETING THE SYLLABUS QUIZ ON TIME ASSIGNMENT MAY RESULT IN YOU BEING DROPPED FROM THE COURSE.

Students will have <u>UNLIMITED</u> attempts at the quiz prior to the assigned deadline to allow for the highest score possible. Each attempt will have a <u>TIME LIMIT of 3</u> minutes. Students will not be allowed to see correct and incorrect answers during or after completing the quizzes. Each reading quiz will consist of five (5) multiple choice

questions and be worth a total of 5 points. The nine (9) (or more if more quizzes are assigned) reading quizzes will total 30% of your final grade.

Unit Tests (13.33% Each Test) 40%

Students will be administered **three (3) unit tests** throughout the semester—<u>including</u> the final examination. These tests will be comprehensive but NOT cumulative, meaning that the material on each test will only contain material assigned as homework and discussed in course lectures that the students have not responded to on previous unit tests. The unit tests will comprise of 50 multiple choice questions for a total of 50 points per exam. Each exam will contribute towards 13.33% of a student's final grade; together, the three unit tests will contribute towards 40% of a student's final grade.

Unit test assessments will be distributed online through CANVAS. All three tests will **ALWAYS** be released (made available) at 12:01 AM on Monday and due on Tuesday by 11:59PM (before midnight). You may access the exam anytime in this 48 hour span, but <u>YOU MUST SUBMIT YOUR ANSWERS BEFORE 11:59PM ON TUESDAY</u>. The unit tests do HAVE **TIME LIMITS**. Once you begin the exam, you will have the assigned class meeting time available to complete all 50 multiple choice questions (75 minutes for tests 1 & 2; 165 minutes for test 3). The unit tests are OPEN-NOTE. You will have opportunities to revise a previous answer as long as it is BEFORE you submit your exam answers. Once you submit your test, your submissions are LOCKED and will be graded as submitted.

Unit tests are assigned for the following dates: **Tuesday**, 6/2; **Tuesday**, 6/30; & **Tuesday**, 7/28. Students **MAY NOT** makeup missed exams without authorization or approval from the instructor and a scheduled makeup date and time before the test. If a student misses an exam without approval from the instructor **PRIOR** to the exam, the student will receive a **0** for the assignment.
