Prerequisites: Demonstration of required level of English proficiency OR minimum grade of C in EAP 0400.

Course Description/Objective: Students develop speaking and listening skills necessary for participation in classroom discussions, with an emphasis on clarification through rewording and asking questions.

Competencies: 1) basic academic speaking/listening skills; 2) classroom interaction skills; 3) introduction to critical listening skills and strategies. Required lab work is a homework component of this course. In order to pass this course, student must earn a C or above in course.

Valencia Competencies: Valencia has defined four interrelated competencies that prepare students to succeed in the world community: (1) think, (2) value, (3) act, and (4) communicate. The college catalog outlines these competencies. The activities in this course will further develop your mastery of the four core competencies.

CLAS: Evidence of College Level Academic Skills is a graduation requirement. To the extent possible, you will be encouraged to develop reading skills, essay skills, and English language skills as part of your work in this course. Additional information is available in the Current Valencia College Catalog.

Classroom Policies:

Languages: All students will improve language skills by speaking only English during class.

These circumstances will be determined on a case-to-case basis and ultimately decided by the instructor.
