Course Description: PRINCIPLES OF ECONOMICS-MACRO Emphasis on study of macroeconomics: national income accounting, consumption, saving and investment, government spending in economic activity, influence of government money and banking, problems of inflation and unemployment, international trade and its impact on domestic economic activity. For prospective economics majors and students with interests in specialized business curricula, completion of full Principles of Economics sequence (ECO 2013 and ECO 2023) is highly recommended.

Course Outcomes

Describe the role of the major participants in the economy and how they affect it. Recognize the role that self-interest and rational behavior plays in the decision-making process. Identify the key variables necessary for assessing the status of the economy. Recognize the major schools of economic thought and their approach to solving economic problems. Understand how scarcity frames the basic economic decision making process and resource allocation. Understand the basis for and implications of international trade. Understand the economic foundation of political parties. Analyze the market system and how prices are established. Analyze the role of economic freedom in shaping markets worldwide.

Assessments

Assessments in this course include quizzes, learn-smart assignments, class discussions, a course project, two tests and a final exam.

HOW YOU WILL BE EVALUATED AND GRADED

You will be evaluated and graded on the basis of your performance on the following:

Tests. There will be three tests during the term. These tests will be taken through CONNECT and will be comprised mostly of multiple choice and true/false questions. They will be timed (90 minutes) and will be required to be taken by specific deadlines. Students will have only one (1) opportunity to take each test, and once they start them, the tests will close by the end of the allowed time, whether they have been completed or not. A student who fails to take test one or two by the deadline because of a valid, written emergency (as defined by the instructor) will be allowed to take the test later without any penalty. Otherwise, if no written proof of valid emergency is provided, the student will be penalized 10% of the test grade. There is no provision for taking the final exam past the specified deadline.

<u>Course Project.</u> There will be one individual course project. The project may be, at the option of the student, 1) a term paper on a topic selected by the student from the list provided below:

for specific instructions and details on requirements, sample format, etc).

If you elect to do a term paper, it must be at least five FULL pages long (not including cover page and works cited page), double-spaced, in font no larger than 12pt, and must include the pros and cons and personal conclusion on the topic discussed. Paper format may be MLA or APA. Works cited page is required, and it is worth 10% of the paper grade. The term paper OR financial plan must be submitted through Canvas (in Excel, Word or PDF format, attached to an email to me) no later than the due date specified in the *Assignments* link. Late term papers or hypothetical financial plans will be penalized 10% for each day late (including weekend days), and none will be accepted after the final exam date.

NOTE: The 3 links above for the course project are available in the Course Deadlines page of the <u>Orientation Module</u> in Canvas. The next to the last item on that page is called "course project."

Quizzes. There will be 10 (ten) quizzes during the course, with the six with the highest score each accounting for 3% of the total course grade (the 4 with the lowest scores will be dropped for grading purposes).

Quizzes will be taken through CONNECT and will be in the form of multiple-choice and/or short-answer questions and problems. They will be timed and will be required to be taken by specific deadlines. Students will have only one (1) opportunity to take each quiz, and once they start them, the quizzes will close by the end of the allowed time, whether they have been completed or not. There will be no make-up quizzes.

Discussions. There will be four class discussions in Canvas. Each discussion will count for 3% of the total course grade. Discussion 1, which is found in the Orientation Module and in Module 1, will be used to introduce yourself to the class. Topics to be discussed in discussions 2, 3 and 4 will be selected at the beginning of the course. Due dates to complete all 4 discussions are included in the Assignments link. For more detailed instructions on the discussions and the deadlines, go to the link Discussions in Canvas. There will not be any make-up discussions.

<u>Smart-Book (SB) assignments.</u> There will be fifteen SB assignments in the Connect platform during the course, each worth 10 points (1% of the course grade). Note that all SB assignments include a deadline, and any student who does not complete the assignment by the deadline will receive a grade of zero on it. CONNECT will allow students to take these assignments more than once, and the attempt with the highest score will be retained for grading purposes. <u>There will not be any make-up assignments.</u> IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT STUDENTS TAKE THE SB ASSIGNMENTS PRIOR TO TAKING THE QUIZZES AND TESTS.

Assignments that will NOT carry a grade weight but will count toward overall academic performance include videos and interactive graphs. These videos and interactive graphs include questions and are designed to promote student learning. They are not timed, so students can view them as often as they wish.
