Course Overview

Application of skills learned in ENC 1101. Emphasis on style; use of library; reading and evaluating available sources; planning, writing, and documenting short research paper.

Gordon Rule - ENC 1102 is a Gordon Rule course in which the student is required to demonstrate college-level writing skills through multiple assignments. Minimum grade of C is required if ENC 1102 is used to satisfy Gordon Rule and General Education Requirements.

Course Prerequisites: Minimum grade of C in ENC 1101 or ENC 1101H.

Academic Integrity: Plagiarism & AI Technology Use*

Plagiarism is the use of someone else's words, ideas, pictures, designs, and/or intellectual property without the correct documentation and punctuation. Any student who plagiarizes, either accidentally or intentionally, is subject to penalty.

Note: Valencia uses [Unicheck](#), (link), software designed to find matching texts. The matches Unicheck finds should all be cited correctly. Sometimes, there is a coincidental match, and I do look at each person's paper/report individually. Students will have access to their OWN Unicheck reports, so if a paper has a "problem," I expect students to contact me before I contact them.

Penalties for plagiarism & AI Technology Use* depend on the severity of the crime:

- Minimum, first offense: A zero on the assignment is typical; some points may be given if the copied material is minimal/citing was attempted, but the student will still earn no higher than an F on the paper.
- Second offense: A meeting with the professor and/or dean will be required; the paper earns a zero.
- Three or more offenses: The student will fail the class and talk with the dean and/or dean of students.

Note: Submitting a paper, you have already submitted in another class will earn you a zero on that assignment.
Note: Sharing an assignment with a classmate means you both earn zeros.

Note: AI use score report of more than 20% will be penalized warranting a possible resubmission at the instructor's discretion or subject to the penalties cited above based on more severe occurrences and repeated occurrences. [AI Technologies: Chat GPT, Grammarly Premium, Open AI, Jasper Chat, other AI Chats, etc.

If it feels like “cheating” avoid it or avoid overuse. When in doubt ASK ME.

Note: Getting too much “help” from someone means the writing is no longer your own. Submitting work that is obviously of a higher level than your own writing skills is subject to these same penalties.

Course Requirements:

Each student will complete 1 formal short critical essay and 1 Critical Research Paper. The Critical Research Paper will include critical responses to the work from other sources, the student’s own analytical and interpretative response to the work, and specific evidence from the work itself to support student responses. Reading quizzes will be given on Canvas that will cover the assigned textbook readings. In addition, online discussions will be required.

All formal writing assignments must meet all MLA, 9th Edition writing guidelines both for format and documentation as applicable to the essay type.

Frequency and quality of participation may affect your grade. Therefore, please note the following:

- Check your online course e-mail account daily. All course related communication must come through this e-mail account.
- Check the Discussion area of Canvas at least once each day to participate in the discussions. Late posts are not accepted.

Papers should be uploaded on time and before the deadline in Canvas. Those turned in within 7 days after the deadline will be considered late. A 20% late penalty applies to late work* within the seven days limit; this does not include the Discussion Board posts, research paper and the final exam which should be completed on time to receive credit—no late research papers or final exams will be accepted except with an excused absence as defined by the college policies.

Any other formal writing assignments that are late more than **7 days** will not receive any credit. My policies are a tool to assist you in realizing that work needs to be completed within the set deadlines. Remember communication is key, planning, and accountability. I’m here to facilitate your learning, please ask for assistance when you find yourself gridlocked concerning course content. Alternative accommodations and make-up opportunities are available for students who provide written documentation of a medical emergency or ongoing medical condition to be presented within the impacted week of the missed assignments or tasks. The key is to stay in communication and be proactive.

Reading Assignments:

All assigned reading is to be completed prior to the first day of class for the week. Face-to-Face courses, have all readings completed prior to the week’s class meeting.

Quizzes:

You will be given quizzes as diagnostic tools and as critical assessments of assigned reading. You will be given a week to complete the quizzes in Canvas and once the quiz has closed, it will not be re-opened unless a student provides official, verifiable documentation (medical or legal, for example) for missing the assignment deadline.

Short Critical Essays:

Short essays include 1 response to an introductory reading in the first 2 weeks of class and 1 Critical Comment Paper. Comment Papers are literary-analyses, and they should be written in response to a selected reading assignment in

the specified genre, but they should not be mere summaries of assigned readings. The topic options for these essays will be provided by the instructor. Students will write these compositions to be uploaded via Canvas (on identified due dates) for evaluation and grading.

All short essays must be typed, double-spaced, using MLA 9th Edition format. More specific instructions for each of these essays will be available on Canvas. These files will be automatically uploaded to the plagiarism detection service available in Canvas. Files that cannot be opened will be treated as zeros if the appropriate file type is not uploaded by the assignment deadline. It is your responsibility to make sure that you upload the correct file and file type (.doc). Any plagiarized essays will be issued a grade of zero. The assignment Dropbox will remain open 1 week past the deadline for late essay submissions: essays submitted within this 1-week grace-period will receive a point deduction (see below) from the final point total. Papers should be uploaded on time and before the deadline. Those turned in within 7 days after the deadline will be considered late. A 20% late penalty applies to late work* within the seven-day limit; this does not include the research paper and the final exam which should be completed on time to receive credit.

Research Paper:

The Research Paper should be a minimum of 1,000 words, typed, double-spaced, using MLA format, 9th Edition. Topic options will be provided by the instructor and any student proposed topic (beyond those options) must be approved by the instructor. The paper includes a minimum of three (3) scholarly, authoritative sources, a works cited page, and a peer-reviewed rough draft. Because this paper will require much structural and grammatical revision, it is imperative that students complete the rough draft of this project in a timely manner.

Like the final draft of the research paper, each rough draft is assigned a specific due date. The research paper will undergo a class peer-review of the rough draft; the date for this peer review is posted on the class schedule. Finally, the research paper must be uploaded as a Microsoft Word file. It is your responsibility to make sure that you upload the correct file and file type. Any plagiarized essay final drafts will be issued a grade of zero. The assignment link in Canvas will remain open 1 week past the deadline for late essay submissions: essays submitted within this 1-week grace-period will receive a 20%-point deduction from the final point total.

Discussion Boards:

Discussion posts are not essays. Discussion board posts are personal response, informal writing assignments. Discussions provide you with an opportunity to discuss the course readings with your peers and professor. It's a place to practice writing, responding, and peer reviewing.

However, students' discussion posts are still targeted toward an academic audience, so students should pay attention to the content, grammar, spelling, and punctuation in their post. Students will be given prompts/questions for each post: they will select a topic and submit an initial response of at least 150 words by Thursday at 11:59 p.m. of the week the Discussion Forum is scheduled. Each student will then respond to the initial posts of 2 different classmates, with each response being a minimum of 50 words. These 2 responses will be due by Sunday at 11:59 p.m. of the week the Discussion Forum is scheduled. Any student who does not submit the initial post by Thursday will receive a 50%-point penalty deduction from the score for that Discussion Forum. Students who submit neither the initial post nor the 2 classmate responses by the weekly deadlines will receive 0 points for that Discussion Forum. Any additional guidelines will be provided in the specific Discussion Board Forum on Canvas.

There will be approximately 10 Discussion Board Forums on Canvas during the semester. Each Forum will remain open

1 week. The Forums will open Monday at 12 a.m. and will close Sunday night at 11:59 p.m. during the weeks when they are scheduled.

Creative Project:

Students will have a project due toward the end of the semester focused on creatively responding to a course reading through a photo essay & video response that cannot exceed 4 minutes. This will demonstrate your ability to verbally communicate to your audience.

Final-Exam:

All students must take a final exam for this course. The exam will be taken on Canvas (multiple choice questions that assess knowledge of rhetorical and grammatical concepts) as well as an essay component. The final exam evaluates the following tasks:

1. Formulate a thesis statement.
2. Write a 4-6 paragraph theme with an adequate introductory paragraph, sufficiently supported, and developed body paragraphs, and an effective concluding paragraph.
3. Use appropriate transitional devices.
4. Use standard English grammar.

Final Exam Week:

The Spring 2024 Final Exam Week begins Monday, April 22nd and ends on Sunday, April 28th. Valencia classes will follow the final exam schedule.

Grading:

Student grades will be recorded in Canvas. It is the student's responsibility to keep track of his or her grades.

All work submitted for evaluation must be a finished product. In other words, it must be free of errors, including spelling, structural, and grammatical. Because writing is a process that includes much revision, the student should expect to write several drafts of each paper before it is ready for final evaluation.

The instructor will provide general and specific feedback for short essays and the research paper. When extensive proofing is desired, due to time constraints you are strongly encouraged to use the Writing Lab at Valencia.

Your grades and progress for this course will be available through Canvas. All graded assignments will be available for your viewing.

Late work is graded after current work. Please do not email me excessively about grading your late work. Once current assignments are graded and updated, late work will be graded and updated.

I DO NOT ACCEPT EMAIL SUBMISSIONS (FINAL DRAFTS) OF ANY KIND NOR FOR ANY REASON. I WILL NOT GRADE EMAILED ASSIGNMENTS. ALL ASSIGNMENTS MUST BE SUBMITTED VIA CANVAS USING THE DROPBOX FEATURE.

In cases of blatant dishonesty, failure to adhere to this policy will result in a "0" on the assignment and possibly an "F" in the course.
