**Course Description:** INTRODUCTION TO LITERATURE In this course, students will be assigned readings representative of a broad range of literary genres and cultures. These readings will cover a variety of literary movements and historical eras. The readings will include selections from the western canon. Written analysis of literary works may be required. Students will be provided with opportunities to practice critical interpretation.

## **Course Outcomes**

• Students will identify a variety of literary movements, historical eras, and/or cultural contexts. • Students will demonstrate critical thinking and analytical skills.

# **Required Materials**

This course uses Open Education Resources/Zero cost course material. There are no required books to purchase for this course; items will be provided to students in the class.

## **Assessments**

Assessments in this course include quizzes, weekly discussions, short answer journals, two creative/reflective writing projects, and a final ePortfolio.

### **Attendance**

considered academic dishonesty. The first instance will result in a zero score on the assignment and a second offense will result in a failure of the course.
