PRE AND COREQUISITES: None

COURSE DESCRIPTION

A general education non-lab field course, with supporting lecture, designed to increase knowledge and awareness of North American bird species. Some of the topics to be included are: bird identification techniques, bird topography and anatomy, tips on using field guides and checklists, binocular basics, basic birding principles, common backyard birds, urban birds, birds of prey, wading birds, shorebirds (let's go to the coast), and migratory species, conservation measures and issues impacting bird populations, an introduction to the ecology of birds, bird habitat relationships, birding by ear, taxonomy, scientific nomenclature, Alpha codes, census techniques, and birding ethics.

This course requires a flexible attitude and openness to new outdoor experiences. Since we spend most of our time

outdoors, we cannot predict what our experiences will bring. Students will need some degree of hardiness, as conditions in the field may occasionally be uncomfortable (hot, cold, humid). Students are expected to pay \$5.00 each to cover the cost of the field trip to the Audubon Bird of Prey Center (if time permits).

Since this is a hybrid and WebCT enhanced course you will submit and access many assignments on-line. We will use these tools to ensure that you have a productive and rewarding class experience.

WITHDRAWAL DEADLINE and POLICY: Class attendance is required the first week of class. If you do not attend class during the first week of class, you may be withdrawn from the class as a "no show." The deadline for withdrawing from this class with a grade of W is Saturday, May 1, 2010. After that date, withdrawing from class will result in a grade of either WP or WF, depending on your average as of the date of your withdrawal or last date of attendance. If a student decides to withdraw prior to the final exam, it is the student's responsibility to complete official procedures through the registrar's office. If you do not withdraw and fail to take the required final examination, the instructor will assign you an F. Please refer to the College catalog for more details.

GRADING SCALE:

- 4. Bird Conservation PowerPoint presentation (55 pts) (post on webct)
- 5. Bird slides identification test (50 pts) (taken in class)
- 6. Birding Basics Quizzes 4 @ 12pts each = 48pts (taken on webct)
- 7. Basic Bird Diagram Quiz (23pts) (taken in class)
- 8. Bird Song Quiz (20 pts) (taken in class)

CLASS POLICIES:

- 1. VALENCIA COMMUNITY COLLEGE WEEKEND POLICY: I welcome your attendance at each of the Friday and Saturday sessions. It is important that you are here each Friday and Saturday. Although carpooling with your group is encouraged, groups must also adhere to the attendance policy.
- 4. ASSIGNMENTS are to be turned in at the beginning of class. Late assignments are accepted with a 50 percent point reduction and must be turned in within 2 days from due date. You can email your assignment to me, but for assignments to be considered on time, the date and time on the email must be before the class on which the assignment is due. You cannot make up missed assignments.
- 5. CLASS LOCATIONS: It is your responsibility to understand and verify the location of the field trip, as field meeting locations may change during the term. Call or email me or your classmates if you are unclear of the location. Be sure you know where each meeting place will be.
- 6. PARKS AND REFUGES: No plant or animal collecting is allowed. Bring a camera or do sketches to help you remember what you have observed.
- 7. WEATHER: If weather causes cancellation of field trips for an entire class day, we will meet on the Winter Park Campus in room 242

HANDOUTS:

- 1. Some supplemental materials will be handed out during class. All other materials will be posted on WebCt6
- 2. If you are absent from the class when handouts are distributed or you misplace them, access them from WebCT
- 3. Maps to field trip locations are best accessed through map quest from your home.
