Academic Honesty and Student Code of Conduct

Academic Honesty

- Academic Honesty will be taken <u>seriously</u>.
- *Plagiarism* is the use of someone else's words, ideas, pictures, design, and/or intellectual property *without* the correct documentation and punctuation. All work submitted for credit in this class must be the product of the individual student's own original thoughts supported and informed by appropriately documented and credited sources.
- *Plagiarism is morally indefensible*. Any assignment showing signs of plagiarism, either the:

- 1. deliberate cut-and-paste of online or print sources,
- 2. the recycling of essays from previous classes,
- 3. essays written on behalf of the student by family members or friends, or
- 4. the result of inattention and incompetence *will be graded zero*. A second offense will result in an appointment with the dean of the Arts and Humanities Department.
- Plagiarism takes many forms: for example, turning in the same essay for two different courses is considered self-plagiarism and will result in a zero for the paper. You may legitimately wonder how anyone would ever know; this is one of the purposes of the plagiarism scan.
- Students are advised to keep planning notes and outlines should the need for authentication arise.
- If you are unsure as to what constitutes plagiarism on an essay, consult the Professor.

Plagiarism Check

All *Assignments* will be submitted for plagiarism analysis online. Valencia College subscribes to this feature that allows students to upload their essays so that software can compare these essays to every available electronic resource in the world, looking for parts that match up with previously published sources.

- Before you upload your document, confirm that you have attached the right file as a <u>Microsoft Word file ONLY</u>. I will not accept any other format submitted! A discrepancy will raise a red flag and prevent me from grading your assignment.
- Any assignment showing signs of plagiarism will be given an immediate zero. Second offenders will result in failure of the overall course. Make sure to cite your sources and give appropriate credit to others' thoughts and ideas.

MLA Style Citation

Within this class we will be learning the MLA Style Citation: how to properly cite your sources and correctly format a Works Cited page. Once we have covered this material within the first two weeks, you will be **REQUIRED** to provide a Works Cited page on every assignment. **Failure to abide by this policy will result an immediate zero or a failing grade on your assignment.**

- 3. Express differences of opinion in a polite and rational way
- 4. Maintain an environment of constructive criticism when commenting on the work of other students (language that is negative, disrespectful or stereotyping WILL result in being withdrawn from the course).
- 5. Avoid bringing up irrelevant topics when involved in group discussions or other collaborative activities

The following list summarizes the kind of behavior that is not acceptable. Each item listed below is grounds for removal from the class. **Students should not:**

- 1. Show disrespect for the instructor or for other students in the online class
- 2. Send messages or comments that are threatening, harassing, or offensive
- 3. Use inappropriate or offensive language that is negative, disrespectful or stereotyping of ANY people, culture, ethnicity, gender, other students, faculty, or staff

- You are only allowed one attempt for the Final Exam. **FAILURE** to complete the Final Exam by the stated due date will result in a **ZERO** for your exam grade.

Late Submissions

Do not subject yourself to deadlines by waiting until last minute to complete your work!

There will be a consistent rhythm established throughout the semester for the release of new weekly modules and assignment due dates. All weekly modules will be available to students on Canvas ahead of time to allow students to complete their work by the stated due dates. You will need to download the Course Calendar at the start of the semester to plan for each week's assignments and to successfully manage your time in this class.

I do not accept late work without a valid excuse. All work must be received by the stated due date and time for it to be considered "on-time". If your work is not submitted by the stated due date and time, then it will be marked as "late."
