# COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Prerequisite: A minimum grade of C in GRA 1206C or department approval. Students will be charged with the tasks of working with the editorial staff of the Phoenix (the college's art and literary magazine) to design and produce a finished layout for print. Each spring term a small group of students will work alongside Phoenix's editorial staff and faculty advisor to transform student submissions of literary work and visual artwork into a finished publication. This publication will be submitted for competition with other student literary publications. (Special Fee: \$95.00)

This is a team-based project. Each member will be assigned duties within the project. The ability to meet deadlines and demonstrate strong communication skills (with teammates, the editorial team and with your instructor) are crucial skills.

### STUDENT CORE COMPETENCIES:

The faculty of Valencia college have established four Core Competencies that describe the learning outcomes for a Valencia graduate. They are: THINK, VALUE, COMMUNICATE, ACT. These general competencies are outlined in the College Catalog. In this course, through classroom lecture and discussion, group work, meeting deadlines and other learning activities, you will further your mastery of those core competencies.

This course includes critiques, presentations and verbal interaction with your classmates that are designed to ensure competence in oral communication. In addition to our class text, you are invited go back and review your GRA1142c Graphics workbook for Mac and Graphics Basics.

### ATTENDANCE & PARTICIPATION:

Regular and punctual attendance is expected. Students not taking the course with sincerity and seriousness enough to come to class are encouraged to withdrawal to prevent a reduction in their overall GPA. It is expected that students come prepared to work each class and bring materials as required. STUDENTS ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR REFERENCING AND FOLLOWING THE COURSE SCHEDULE PROVIDED.

Students who miss more than 2 classes will have their final grade reduced by 10 points for each absence over the 2. **NOTE:** This is even if absences are due to documented and legitimate reasons, such as doctor appointments.

Arriving very late, early departure, sleeping during class, or failing to come to class prepared to work will result in you being considered not in attendance for that day.

Arriving late three times is equivalent to one absence and will count towards deductions in your final grade.

If you arrive after attendance has been taken, it is your responsibility to follow-up with your instructor after class to correct your absence to a tardy mark for that day. Otherwise you risk being recorded as absent, effecting your grade.

### **ACADEMIC HONESTY:**

Students are responsible for preparing for class by completing assignments. Students who are absent are fully responsible for all material covered in class.

Students may collaborate on preliminary creative process, design and technical issues. Collaboration should be used to improve visual communication or to solve technical problems. Copying a design solution completely or partially is considered cheating, and a student's inability to describe the process and solution of a submitted assignment will be considered evidence of cheating. All students involved in incidents of cheating will be given a zero ('0") for that assignment/quiz/exam/project without regard to who did the original work or who may have benefited.

### EXPECTED STUDENT CONDUCT:

Valencia College is dedicated not only to the advancement of knowledge and learning but is concerned with the development of responsible personal and social conduct. By enrolling at Valencia College, a student assumes the responsibility for becoming familiar with and abiding by the general rules of conduct. Use of computers in the Graphic & Interactive Design classrooms at Valencia College is restricted to those activities designated by the instructor to enhance the class materials. Any other use is strictly forbidden. Inappropriate use includes, but is not limited to:

- Use of computer to send E-mail or access Internet sites not specifically assigned in class.
- Use of computer for job, internship, homework or other activities not assigned in class.
- Modifying any hardware or software system configuration or setting.
- Activities not in accordance with the Valencia Student Code of Conduct
- Use of computers in any of the Graphic & Interactive Design and Digital Media Labs is limited to those activities involved with preparing homework or coursework in the Graphics and Digital Media departments and is subject to the same restriction as listed above.
- Computer may be remotely monitored; any student using computers inappropriately may be subject to dismissal from class or banishment from the lab. Subsequent offense may be sent to the campus administration for further disciplinary action.

#### GRADING:

The final grade will be determined by grades earned on required projects, tests/exams and on participation and a positive attitude in the class. The following is the Valencia's Community College Grading scale:

A = 100 - 90	Exceptional achievement, demonstrated in work of keen understanding and optimal mastery of course competencies. Earned for exemplary work, clearly beyond the requirements.
B = 89 - 80	High achievement, demonstrated in work of consistent effort, intelligence, and mastery of course competencies.
C = 79 - 70	Satisfactory completion of course requirements and mastery of essential course competencies.
D = 69 - 60	Unsatisfactory completion of course requirements and an unacceptable grade for prerequisite or graduation requirements.
F = 59 or less	Failure to perform required work or to master required course material and competencies.

A final grade of "C" or better is required for this course in order to meet prerequisite requirements for higher level courses or to be used as credit towards an AS degree in Graphic & Interactive Design.

### **GRADING CRITERIA:**

- Ability to work within a team well and independently when necessary.
- Careful note-taking and sharing of information among the team.
- Acquiring information from sources, as needed.
- Creative resource gathering, sharing and presenting.
- Demonstration of consistent reliability in working with team and in meeting deadlines.
- Attendance, active participation and engagement during meetings.
- Meaningful contribution in meeting milestones/deadlines set during the evolution of the project, including working on projects outside of class meetings.
- Demonstration of consistent creative input, technically sound skills and quality design & layout solutions.
- Demonstration of ability to meet deadlines with quality finished work.
- Maintaining safe, accurate backups of your work to safeguard the publication.
- Professional, timely and concise communication within the team, with *Phoenix* editorial staff/faculty and Valencia College marketing staff.

You WILL NOT be receiving a detailed project description and yet, you will be required to meet requirements and deadlines during the evolution of the project. Students will be required to keep and maintain detailed notes during meetings and obtain understanding of requirements verbally from the editorial staff, team members and their instructor, along the way.

When a milestone date arrives, your ability to produce quality work at that time will directly affect your overall grade.

I can not stress enough how much interdependency of the team and meeting milestones (deadlines) are of keen importance in this project. With that in mind, a portion of your grade will be determined through a peer evaluation conducted by your work team (classmates).

# **GRADING VALUES:**

Your grade in the above outlined criteria will be reflected in two scores: one given by your teammates (factored in at 20%), and one by your instructor (80%). Students will complete a peer evaluation of teammates using the below criteria.

#### PEER EVALUATION CRITERIA

- Contribution to team culture
- Communication with team members & editorial staff
- Engagement within the team
- Quality of work
- Commitment to the project outcomes

Your instructor will also complete an evaluation of demonstrated skills throughout the term using TVCA (Core Competencies) skills for a graphic designer in relation to the design and production of the finished *Phoenix* publication.

# SCHEDULE / MILESTONES:

A schedule of milestones (periodic deadlines) will be provided by the Phoenix editorial staff and published on our shared online storage. From this, a division of labor will be established based upon our team's individual strengths, and internal milestones established to ensure we meet the larger milestones.

#### **DEADLINES (IMPORTANT):**

In the workplace, when projects are due, they are due. They cannot be late. This course has 1 project with many milestones, or deadlines along the way. A missed deadline by one team member creates havoc for everyone else who has a job to do—the work is very interdependent. Therefore, you must not ever miss a deadline. No exceptions!! If you know ahead of time that you will be unable to meet a deadline, you must communicate with your teammates and instructor as soon as you believe there may be a delay. Communication is key to working within a team and essential element to creating a finished product on time and one all members can be proud to have in their portfolios.

#### **CRITIQUES:**

Formal and informal presentations of work is due at the beginning of class meetings. If you do not have your work ready to share at the beginning of class start on day it is due, you have let your creative team down. Graphic design is highly structured. Each student will be expected to work in a productive and structured way to meet the needs of production schedule.

There will be times the team will be presenting to individuals outside of our class (editorial staff and outside vendors). Remember that you need to make a good impression for yourself and your team. The craft of your presentation is important. Take pride in your work and present it in the best possible way. Presentations should be clean and without scratches or dented edges. Be prepared to orally present to designers and non-designers an explanation of yours (or our teams) concept, goals, production techniques and any

other relevant information specific to the design of the publication. You will be answering questions about the design from teammates, the instructor and Phoenix staff. There may be times when you are presenting other teammates work or participating by questioning and commenting when other students are presenting work. Be prepared by understanding ahead of time the scope of the work and engaging in presenting the best outcome for the team and the publication.
