Course Description

Integrated examination of dominant ideas in Western culture as expressed in art, literature, music, philosophy and religion. This course covers period from will cover human culture from the first societies to the Roman Empire with an emphasis on development and influence of classical ideas. Through this class, you will learn about the basics of the ancient world, as well as the interconnected webs of trade, religion and conflict that tie distant regions and cultures together. Students must demonstrate college-level writing skills through multiple assignments. Minimum grade of C required if used to satisfy Gordon Rule requirement.

Prerequisite: ENC 1101, ENC 1101H or IDH 1110 (for any writing course)

Required Texts

Henry M. Sayre, The Humanities: Culture, Continuity & Change, Vol. 1, (Boston, 2018).

This is the Valencia College edition. If you use a different edition, pages numbers will be incongruous with the outline. You are responsible for making the necessary adjustments.

Additional primary source reading assignments will be given throughout the semester, usually placed on Canvas

Course Policies

Deadliness

Course work is due on the date indicated on this syllabus and on Canvas. It is essential that you keep up with the course pacing and a percentage will be taken off for each day the assignment is late. You should be prepared to participate in an online class and understand that you are required to have the technology needed. As such, technological problems are no excuse for tardiness. Obviously, if severe personal circumstances interfere with your completing your work on schedule, you can discuss those circumstances with me and we can negotiate options.

Completion of Work

Work is complete when it contains all the required elements (for example, if I ask you to turn in a bibliography with your essay, it is incomplete if you do not include one). Incomplete work will lose points.

"No Show" Status

Class participation is required beginning with the first class meeting per Valencia guidelines. For an online class this means that you must participate in an "academic activity" during the first week of the course. For this course you must, at a minimum, complete the syllabus quiz and participate in the "Introduce Yourself" discussion to be considered actively participating in the course. Students who are not actively participating in an online class and/or do not submit the first assignment by the scheduled due date must be withdrawn by the instructor at the end of the first week as a "no show". If you are withdrawn as a "no show," you will be financially responsible for the class and a final grade of "WN" will appear on your transcript for the course.

Plagiarism is using someone else's words, ideas, pictures or other original content without acknowledgment.

Students often think that it is not a big deal to

- cut and paste a few sentences from a web site,
- use a picture found freely available on a web site in a paper,
- or paraphrase someone's else idea without acknowledging the source of the words, picture or idea.

But **all of these uses are plagiarism**, and plagiarism can have severe consequences. At Valencia (and most colleges in the United States) plagiarism is considered academic dishonesty.

Withdrawal Statement

Per Valencia Policy 4-07 (Academic Progress, Course Attendance and Grades, and Withdrawals), a student who withdraws from class before the established deadline for a particular term will receive a grade of "W".

Assessment

All assignments for this course will be conducted through Canvas.

For each unit in this course you can expect to complete a variety of assignments that may include online discussions, quizzes, reading and response, videos, short essays, exams, and a final research project. Each assignment will be available through Canvas and will be due on the date and time stated on Canvas, <u>late assignments will receive a 5-percentage point</u> reduction for every day that they are late. The Canvas grade book will automatically deduct this. Some assignments may require some preplanning on your part, so it is imperative that you keep up with the course and do no wait until the last minute to read the assignment directions. Most assignments are due by the end of the assigned week but some assignments, such as the discussions, will be due earlier in the week. College holidays and other days that the campus are closed may affect the scheduling so please be sure to use the calendar feature on Canvas

Responsibility

Students are responsible for preparing for the course by reading pre-assigned readings, completing assignments and ensuring that they have the required internet connectivity and software to access Canvas and complete the assignments.

The best way to contact your instructor is through the message function in Canvas, this will both send me an IM as well as an email. If you are unable to reach me via Canvas it is possible to leave me a message at the Humanities Department office extension which is x5730. Messages should consist of your name, your class and class time, and a brief message. Questions such as "What did we cover in class?" will not result in a response. Due to the problem of "phone tag", student phone calls will normally not be returned. **Emails with specific questions will be answered as soon as possible**, usually within 24 hours (during week days). Students who need more than a brief response should arrange a meeting with the instructor.

Discussions (15% of Grade)

Throughout the course there will be several discussion boards in which you will be asked to respond to a specific question or to reflect upon the module as a whole. For each of these discussions you will be asked to make an initial response and then respond to at least two of your peers. You will be expected to adhere to the Netiquette guidelines posted in Canvas for all discussions.

Assignments (15% of Grade)

Short assignments such as responding to videos or a reading in a short response. These are designed to help facilitate understanding of the readings.

Quizzes (15% of Grade)

There will be several online quizzes that line up with the chapters of the Sayre book. These are formative and are designed to facilitate the required reading for the course. These quizzes will be available on Canvas and are required to be completed before the posted date. You will be able to retake the quizzes up to the due date and Canvas will save the highest grade.

Responses (20% of Grade)

As this is a Gordon Rule class, you will also be expected to complete a minimum of 6,000 words of academic writing. To achieve this you will complete a variety of response papers and essays. These will be a discussion and review of various primary sources (literature, art, architecture, music) and their place in the development of human culture. The essential point of a reflection paper is to encourage students to think about different sources and provide some analysis. There may be some guiding questions given along with the sources but this is not an exercise in simply finding the correct answer to a question. You may answer the questions (indeed it can be helpful to do that) but you should also try to think further and form an opinion about the source, its relevance, possibly links to other sources, or anything else that you think is interesting regarding the source. Some of these papers will vary in size but should be somewhere between 500 and 1250 words. MLA referencing is required. Style Guides can be found through the library website.

Research Essay (15% of Grade)

You will also be expected to complete a 750-1250-word academic research essay on a topic of your choosing. This should be well organised with a clear thesis statement/argument and be clearly supported by and discussion of academic sources. This is a part of the departmental assessment and the topic will be available through Canvas. You should include at least <u>five different sources (utilise the library and other online academic sources</u>!!!), but you may use more (the best papers draw on a variety of sources). MLA referencing is required. Style Guides can be found through the library website. The textbook is an excellent place to start and there is also further material on Canvas.

Spelling, Punctuation, Style and Grammar: All work submitted for this course should be considered an exercise in academic writing. Students are encouraged to use a dictionary, thesaurus, or other aid. Points will be deducted for errors, including spelling, grammar, punctuation, and construction. Compositions will also be graded for clarity of argument, interest, and appropriateness of style.

Format: Unless otherwise specified, students should word-process all essays to be submitted in **Microsoft Word .doc format or PDF format**, no other format will be accepted. Each essay should be formatted with one-inch margins and 12-point Times New Roman, double-spaced. Papers will be turned in electronically; do not use a cover page. Failure to observe these standards may result in a loss of points on assignments.

Exams (20% of Grade)

You will have two main exams, a mid-term and a final. These will consist of matching, multiplechoice questions along with some short response and will cover all the material that is discussed either in class or during the readings. They will be conduct through Canvas.
