Course Description:

Catalogue Description: ENC 1102H is designed to advance student knowledge of expository writing and research, focusing on an application of skills learned in ENC 1101 or ENC1101H. There is an emphasis on style; use of library; reading and evaluating available sources; planning, writing, and documenting a short research paper. This is a Gordon Rule course in which the student is required to demonstrate

college-level writing skills through multiple assignments. A minimum grade of C required if ENC 1102 is used to satisfy Gordon Rule and general education requirements.

Course Learning Outcomes

- Apply a multi-stage research process to produce essays.
- Compose a written argument using evidence from varied sources.
- Apply conventions aligned to varied writing situations.
- Document source material in accordance with at least one recognized documentation style.
- Apply critical reading skills.
- Honors Students will apply problem-solving skills creatively to address societal needs and challenges.
- Honors Students will integrate interdisciplinary perspectives to enhance course content.

Assignment Breakdown

Quizzes & Discussions

Low-stakes quizzes are created to verify that students are progressing as expected and adequately prepared for the module's coursework.

Discussions serve as low-stakes formative assessments, aiming to enhance student engagement through peer-to-peer dialogues on pertinent subjects. These discussions often involve external reading and analysis, cultivating critical reading and writing skills.

Each discussion entails an initial post and 2 responses to classmates. Initial posts are due on specified Thursdays, and response posts are due by the subsequent Sundays. Assessment is guided by a discussion forum rubric that evaluates cognitive aptitude and interactive participation.

Quizzes & Discussions must be submitted on time; no exceptions for late submissions will be made.

Formal Writing Assignments

These assignments hold substantial weight as high-stakes summative assessments, serving to gauge student comprehension of module learning objectives. In recognition of their importance, these assignments carry a higher points value.

Structured as formal exercises, they necessitate document uploads and adherence to the MLA format and style. This formal approach aids in distinguishing between formal and informal writing.

Evaluation is guided by an assignment-grading rubric, placing significant focus on cognitive prowess, alongside assessment of mechanical proficiency.

Writing Assignments can be submitted with a maximum delay of 1 week, but they will incur a 10% penalty.

Final Exam

The final exam is a summative assessment of the work taught throughout the semester. Students can expect a final exam module that mirrors the design of all learning modules.

Final exams must be submitted by the designated deadline and cannot be accepted late; no exceptions will be granted.

Late Work Policy:

All assigned discussion posts, responses, quizzes, and exams must be submitted by their designated due dates exclusively. Late submission of discussion activities will not be considered for grading, as these activities aim to foster peer engagement and community cohesion. Writing assignments received up to 1 week after the deadline will incur a 10% penalty, while those submitted after 1 week will not be accepted for grading.

Late Work Exceptions:

- Health or medical documentation
- Jury duty, military duty, SAT testing, and religious observances are not considered emergencies that warrant make-up/late work. These all require advance notice. Course work may be submitted early due to these absences pending notification to the instructor prior to the absence.
- For extenuating circumstances related to a medical emergency or ongoing medical condition, please see the professor for discussion.

If a student is caught submitting plagiarized work a first offense will result in a zero score on the assignment, a second offense will result in a class grade of F.

This course uses plagiarism detection software to support the above policy. The definition of plagiarism is the practice of taking someone else's work or ideas and passing them off as one's own.

Academic dishonesty in a learning environment could involve:

- Having a tutor or friend complete a portion of your assignments
- Having a reviewer make extensive revisions to an assignment
- Copying work submitted by another student
- Using information from online information services without proper citation (Proper documentation consists of quotation marks around three or more of someone else's words followed by a proper citation. No quotation marks are necessary if you put someone else's ideas in your own words; however, you must follow the paraphrase with a proper citation.)

- Using a paper, you have/had written for another class to fulfill an assignment in this class unless you have permission of both instructors
- Sharing or receiving answers on tests before the test has been completed
- Using AI Technologies without documentation, see below.

AI Technologies:

- All work submitted in this course must be your own. Contributions from anyone or anything else- including AI sources, must be properly quoted and cited every time they are used. Failure to do so constitutes an academic integrity violation, and I will follow the institution's policy to the letter in those instances.

When engaged in online interaction, it is important that we all follow netiquette. This means our feedback must be clear, concise, not in all capital letters (which indicates yelling) and focus on both the positive and negatives of the work we are reading, giving the author specific examples to support our criticism and specific suggestions on how to fix what we are criticizing. We should start and end each critique with a positive but specific comment about what we are studying.

Students follow basic rules of civil communications:

- no inappropriate language, threats, or negative personal comments tolerated. All such correspondence forwarded to the Student Conduct Officer for appropriate action.
- Additionally, students are urged to report to the instructor immediately any harassment by a classmate, whether by email or on the Discussion Board and to forward the offending messages.
