Teaching Philosophy:

Hello, my name is Professor Daye. Welcome to Introduction to Sociology! I am so glad you have chosen to join our learning community. As an educator, I take a collaborative, learning-centered approach to teaching. Students will learn how to critically apply course discussions, projects, and activities to relate concepts to their everyday lives in my courses. By actively interacting with what our learning community and the social world present before us, this new knowledge provides us with the tools needed to identify root causes for social inequalities and contribute to the movement towards social justice. Using the text to help guide the discussions and provide students with different materials to supplement readings from the text, including interactive applied activities, students have various opportunities to apply these concepts through real-life case studies. During class, we use hands-on activities that enable us to engage with the materials in ways that relate them to today. I am excited to build a great learning community in our class this semester and look forward to seeing what we accomplish together!

Course Description

Sociology is the systematic study of society and the relationship between individuals and society. The social world is complex, and sociology uses scientific methods to study the complicated world around us. This enables students to understand social behaviors and social processes and become familiar with vocabulary, theory, and methodology in the discipline of sociology. Emphasis on culture and personality, age and sex roles, family, deviant behavior, social class and stratification, group behavior and social change are among some of the topics that will be explored, and attention will be given to forces of stability and change inherent in the relationships between the individual and society.


Core Competencies:

- 3. Students will apply the major theoretical frameworks in sociology to past, present, and future social issues.
- 4. Students will describe the sequential steps in scientific research.
- 5. Students will recognize the social inequalities that exist in diverse environments.
- 6. Students will identify the basic elements, concepts, and influences of social institutions, groups, and organizations.
- 7. Students will evaluate the characteristics and consequences of social change.

Incomplete Grading Policy

In general, only the above grades will be given. Incomplete grades (such as "WP", "WF", "I", "X", "H", or "N") are NOT given under any circumstances. Students having difficulties meeting the course requirements can withdraw from the course by the withdrawal deadline. Students withdrawing from the course will receive a course grade of W. Further, students cannot withdraw themselves after the withdrawal deadline, **October 28, 2022** at 11:59 p.m. EDT, students who fail to withdraw before the deadline and are ineligible to continue in the class, will receive an overall grade of F for the course.

Assignment Details

Discussion Posts

There will be one discussion post assignment for each module during this course. Students will receive a prompt and asked to reflect on their thoughts on the topics discussed in the module during these assignments. This reflection activity asks students to discuss how they personally engage with the topics in the module and to relate them to their own personal experiences. **There is a total of five Discussion Posts assignments throughout the course worth 15 points each for a total of 75 points towards your final grade.**

Exams

Exams are a way to evaluate your understanding of the concepts and materials that we discuss during the various activities and instruction during the course. Each exam will cover several chapters from the text: Exam 1: Chapters 1- 4; Exam 2: Chapters 5-8; Exam 3: Chapters 9-11. Students will complete all exams online through Connect. There will have three attempts for each exam and the attempt with the highest score will be used for the grade book. There is a total of three multiple-choice exams given in this course worth 100 points each for a total of 300 points towards your final grade.

Power of Process Chapters

Power of Process is an interactive way to review sociology-based research and media articles to understand a topic related to the area that we are discussing in the chapter. Students will have six questions to answer during these assignments: two questions before you read the article, two questions to answer while reading the article, and two questions to answer after the article. These prompts will ask you to type an answer or highlight where the information being asked for is located within the text. There is a total of three Power of Process Chapters assignments throughout the course worth 25 points each for a total of 75 points towards your final grade.

Research Project

Part 1: Identifying Parts of the Research Process

After reading and completing the SmartBook assignment for chapter 2, students will be asked to critically assess a peer-reviewed research article following the guidelines given on p. 46 in chapter 2. In a discussion post by answering question prompts and providing constructive feedback and suggestions to at least two classmates. Part 1: Identifying Parts of the Research Process is worth 30 points towards your final grade.

Part 2: Identifying a Topic

During this part of your assignment, students will identify the topic they would like to use for their research project. First, pick a topic of interest that you can explore using your sociological imagination. Topics can relate to your interests, such as family, sports, and social media, or you may select something connected to your desired or current career field. Once you pick a topic in this assignment, you will then explain why it is important to you and why it is important to explore sociologically. Finally, you will identify a research question and methods that you will

use to answer your research question for this project. Part 2: Identifying a Topic is worth 60 points towards your final grade.

Part 3: Research Proposal or PechaKucha Presentation

For the final part of this project, you will have the option to write a one-page research proposal or to submit a PechaKucha (6 minute and 20 seconds) presentation via Canvas as your final project. The proposal and the presentation will have the same grading rubric and must include the following sections: an introduction, research question, theoretical foundation, approach to social science research, and methods. Part 3: Research Proposal or PechaKucha Presentation is worth 100 points towards your final grade.

SmartBook

During this course, we will use SmartBook, an interactive tool that helps you engage in the chapter concepts and materials through critical thinking to apply the knowledge from each chapter as you are learning. SmartBook assignments are due before class each Tuesday at 11:59 PM. You will find a SmartBook assignment scheduled for each chapter except chapters 5, 10, and 17 when exams are due. **There is a total of 14 SmartBook assignments worth 25 points each for a total of 350 points towards your final grade.**

SmartBook 2.0 Orientation Video

This video will help to familiarize you with the various aspects of your online textbook. Once you have completed watching this short video, you will check the radio button below the video to confirm that you have completed the orientation. The SmartBook 2.0 Orientation Video assignment is worth 10 points towards your final grade.

Classroom Policies and Student Expectations

Attendance

Attendance in our weekly classroom sessions provide an opportunity for students to further engage in the materials, ask questions, and contribute to our learning community in this class. Attendance and participation is expected. I will take attendance weekly for my records. Students who attend and participate in all classes (excluding the one missed day that is permitted) will be eligible for the attendance round up policy listed below. I look forward to seeing you each week.

Attendance Round Up Policy

Students who miss no more than one class the entire semester and participate substantively are eligible for up to three extra points on their overall grade. This means that if you qualify for this option, you can finish the course with an 87, for example, and still earn an A. To be considered present, you must be on time, engaged, and stay for the entire class. If you leave class repeatedly or appear to be distracted by your electronic devices for significant portions of the class meeting, you will be marked absent for the day.

Participation

Participation in this course includes approaching each class with a prepared by doing the readings and ready to participate in the learning process with your peers. In order to receive credit for participation in class each day for the round up policy you must be present for the entirety of class (11:30 AM until 12:45 PM) and have engaged in discussion by answering questions posed by me or contributing to class discussion in a substantive manner, you will be counted as present. I will drop one day from your total so you can miss one day and it will not directly affect your attendance grade.

Netiquette
