Course Description:

Accounting Principles and procedures used in analysis and control of costs for manufacturing and service businesses. Topics include preparation of statements and schedules, analysis of costs, selling, general, and administrative expenses and analysis of variances. **Prerequisite: ACG 2071C. ONLINE: 3 hours per week**

Communication:

Since this class is online, most of our communication will likely also be online. In this regard, when you need to contact me, you MUST click on the Inbox link within the Canvas course site. This way, I can verify that you are enrolled in the class. I will not respond directly to emails sent outside of the Canvas site.

For direct questions that you may have when working with the practice problems or homework, you may also click on the "Ask my instructor" link located within the My Accounting Lab (MAL) online utility (see below). This link will provide a direct link to the problem along with your question which makes it much more efficient for me to respond.

As your instructor for this class, I will make every effort to respond to any messages within 24-48 hours of posting Monday through Friday. Any messages sent late in the day on Friday may not be answered until the next business day (Monday). I do not plan on checking the course message area during the weekends, college holidays or when the main campus is closed. Please refer to the course calendar for more information.

Required Materials:

<u>Cost Accounting- A Managerial Emphasis</u>, by Horngren, Datar and Rajan, 17th edition. The custom designed edition of this text is packaged at the West Campus bookstore and is sold at a substantial discount over the original hardcover textbook. Custom Edition Bundle ISBN: 9780137504107 (Includes loose leaf book and access card for MyAccountingLab). Again, this custom edition can only be purchased at the West Campus bookstore.

IMPORTANT: You must acquire the correct edition for this class. No other editions will be allowed.

<u>Pearson My Accounting Lab (MAL)</u>- is an online utility that you will use to complete your assignments and exams. You can purchase an access card (packaged with book) at the West Campus bookstore or directly online.

FREE TRIAL: You can also sign up for a free trial version of the My Accounting Lab (MAL) utility which will last for a few weeks while you are getting your other materials for this course. Just be sure to convert this free trial version at the end of the trial period or your work to date may be lost. Also, in order to effectively use the MAL online utility, you must have a reliable internet access connection. If you do not have a reliable connection, you should plan to use the computer labs on campus designed for student use.

E-TEXT: There is an E-TEXT version of the book available within the MAL utility and you may opt for this when signing up for the MAL utility in lieu of buying the paperback version. It's up to you, but you must have either the paperback textbook (or the E-TEXT) AND access to the MAL utility in order to complete this class. Also, if utilize the E-text, please be aware that the chapter numbers will not align with the labels on the Homework and Quizzes in MAL. You'll need to compare the chapter titles to be sure that you are reading the correct chapter.

Other necessary materials include pencils, notebook and calculator.

- Student will be able to establish cost pools and identify logical cost drivers for each cost pool.
- Student will be able to calculate the total and per unit costs of inventory using ABC.

Utilize a standard cost system to manage and control costs.

You SHOULD FOCUS SOLELY ON THE POINTS YOU HAVE EARNED IN THE COURSE. Your final grade will be based on the point scale shown above.

As the course is progressing, if you want to determine your grade, take the points you've earned to date and divide them by the total possible points available to be earned at that point in the course. The resulting percentage should give you an idea of where you currently stand in the course.

How to be successful in this class:

Here's a step-by-step approach you can follow in this course to maximize your chance of success.

- **1-** Log into the Canvas course site and the My Accounting Lab Utility several times per week to check for important announcements and deadlines. Then, carefully read each assigned chapter as it is scheduled. Since this is an online course you WILL NEED TO READ THE TEXT!!!
- **2-** On the Canvas course site, check the chapter module and review the provided chapter materials. If available, printout any chapter notes and/or the "In-Class Exercise" and try to complete it using what you have learned from reading the chapter. A solution is also provided so that you can check your work. These "In-Class Exercises" are simply for your practice and reference, they do not need to be submitted.
- **3-** Log into the MAL utility and complete the chapter **Dynamic Study Module** by the due date and time noted. The length of time it takes to complete these modules depends on how well you know the material, so I strongly advise that you read the text and review the Class Materials carefully before attempting these modules. **LATE SUBMISSIONS WILL INCUR A 20% PER DAY PENALTY. Late submissions beyond 5 days will receive a ZERO grade.**

- **4-** Log into the MAL utility and consider completing a few of the practice exercises located under the Study Plan link. These problems do not count towards your final grade but are essential to your success in this course.
- 5- Log into the MAL utility and complete the **Chapter Homework** assignment by the due date and time noted. For these Chapter Homework assignments, you will have the option to submit multiple attempts until the due date to improve your score. **LATE SUBMISSIONS WILL INCUR A 20% PER DAY PENALTY. Late submissions beyond 5 days will receive a ZERO grade.**
- 6- Log into the MAL utility and complete the **Chapter Quiz** by the due date and time noted. Only 1 attempt is allowed so make it count! You should only click on the quiz link after you have completed all of the other assignments and are sufficiently comfortable with the material. These must be completed individually but you can use your text and notes as a resource. Just know that the Quizzes are timed and must be completed in one sitting. You may not leave and return later to complete the quiz. Be careful not to click on the Quiz link until you are ready to actually take the quiz, otherwise it will use up your only attempt. **LATE SUBMISSIONS WILL INCUR A 20% PER DAY PENALTY. Late submissions beyond 5 days will receive a ZERO grade.**
- **7-** At the conclusion of the course, you will be required to take a comprehensive Final Exam (covering all chapters). More information on this exam and how to prepare for it will be included as the course progresses.
- **8-** GET HELP when needed! Remember, I am here to assist you in understanding the assigned material. Valencia College also provides several tutoring resources for this class if you are struggling. These are free resources, so don't be shy in using them if you think it may help you to succeed.

NOTE: Assignments must be completed using the MAL application tool. These assignments should be completed individually and any use of online solution manuals or other such services will be considered academic dishonesty.

LATE SUBMISSIONS: MAL Homework, Quizzes and Dynamic Study modules submitted past the assigned due date and time will automatically receive a deduction of 20% per day for each day it is late. Any submissions more than 5 days after the deadline will receive a ZERO grade. No exceptions. The Final Exam cannot be submitted late under any circumstances.

Technical problems with the utility or your internet connection will not be an acceptable excuse for late submissions of an assignment or quiz or exam (Don't wait to the last minute to submit any assignments!)

<u>IMPORTANT</u>: After submitting each assignment in MAL, it is YOUR responsibility to check that a score has been recorded for you on that assignment by the due date and time assigned. Academic Honesty Policy:
