Recommended allocated time for this course: As students, you are encouraged to learn to manage your time wisely. What does this mean regarding this class? Since it is a 4-credit hour class, you should multiply 4 times 4 which is equal to 16 hours of study time per week for this course. This means that if you divide 16 (hours) by 7 (days of the week), you are expected to study and work in this class for at least 2.5 hours daily. Out of those 2.5 hours, at least 20 minutes should be devoted to studying and memorizing vocabulary daily.

It is recommended that you purchase the textbook at the Valencia Bookstore. By doing so, you are guaranteed to receive the book and the online access code that is required for the course. If you purchase the book online from an outside vendor such as Amazon, you are not guaranteed to receive a valid and active online access code that is required for this course.

This is the textbook publisher's website where you will be creating your username and password, enrolling in the VHL course, and completing the assigned homework activities. (These homework activities are in addition to activities on the Canvas platform).

The Professor will see your name on VHL and <u>can give you a one-time temporary two-week online access</u> so that you do not fall behind at the start of the semester. COURSE DESCRIPTION:

SPN 1120 and SPN 1121 are designed for students without two years of recent high school Spanish completed within the last three years. The class will emphasize the everyday use of the language, integrating basic grammar, vocabulary, composition, and culture through a conversational approach to Spanish. This class is not open to native or heritage speakers. Please see the definition of Native and Heritage Speakers under the Native Speaker and Heritage Learners heading of this syllabus. A minimum grade of 'C' is required if being used to satisfy the General Education Foreign Language proficiency. Four credits will be earned upon successful completion of this course.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

The objective of this course is for students to achieve a novice level of proficiency in the target language (in writing, speaking, reading, and listening) as well as awareness of the Hispanic culture. In addition to competencies at the end of the semester, you will be expected to be able to use the target language at an intermediate-novice level.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

The student will be able to communicate verbally and orthographically in the target language at an intermediate/mid-level according to the American Council of Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL) as well as develop listening and reading skills in the target language at an intermediate/mid-level proficiency according to ACTFL. Furthermore, students will develop a mature attitude toward cultural differences.

NO-SHOW POLICY:

Class attendance is required beginning with the first day of class. If you do not attend the first class meeting and/or complete the entire Orientation Module including all of the assignments, quizzes, and discussion, you may be withdrawn from the class as a "No-Show". Class attendance is required for all modalities including online, mixed-mode, and face-to-face classes; students who are not actively participating in class and/or do not submit the required attendance activities and assignments by the scheduled due date will be withdrawn by the instructor at the end of the first week as a "No-Show". If you are withdrawn as a "No-Show", you will be financially responsible for the class, and a final grade of "WN" will appear on your transcript for the course. If you begin the class and decide not to continue, you will need to withdraw yourself by the withdrawal deadline or earn an "F" in the course.

WITHDRAWAL POLICY:

- Per Valencia Policy 4-07 (Academic Progress, Course Attendance, Grades, and Withdrawals), a student who withdraws from class before the established deadline for a particular term will receive a grade of 'W'.
- A student may withdraw at any time during the term in Atlas up until the withdrawal deadline ('W' Grade) which is by the following date:

NATIVE SPEAKERS AND HERITAGE LEARNERS:

SPN 1120 (Elementary Spanish I), SPN 1121 (Elementary Spanish II), SPN 1000 (Conversational Spanish I), and SPN 1001 (Conversational Spanish II) are classes specifically designed for non-native speakers or non-heritage learners. If you are a native speaker or heritage learner, this class is not designed for you.

All students are <u>required</u> to take a Heritage Placement Exam as soon as the course opens and upload their results to the assignment page.

A native speaker is one who was born and raised in a Spanish-speaking country and has studied the language formerly in elementary school and/or high school in a Spanish-speaking country.

A heritage learner could also be someone who was born in the United States or moved to the United States from a Spanish-speaking country at a very young age, has never formally studied the language, but speaks (or at one time spoke) Spanish at home. A heritage learner can communicate orally with a limited vocabulary but has not fully developed writing or reading skills. In addition, proper sentence formation, correct grammatical usage, and good pronunciation are usually lacking in their conversation.

In short, "a student who is raised in a home where a non-English language is spoken, who speaks or merely understands the heritage language and who is to some degree bilingual in English and the Heritage language" (Valdes, 2000). If you are a native speaker, this class is <u>not</u> designed for you. It is strongly encouraged that you take another language class such as Portuguese, French, German, or Latin.

Another option is to take the CLEP (College Level Examination Program) Test which awards college credit for demonstrating achievement in a subject through a computer-based exam. Below is the link for more information on the CLEP Test:

Another alternative if you are a Heritage learner is enrolling in a course that Valencia has created that will count as Foreign Language credit. These courses are called **Spanish for Heritage Speakers I and II (SPN 1340 and SPN 1341)**. These classes are designed for students who have some level of fluency but wish to become more fluent, become better readers in Spanish, and become better at expressing themselves orally and in written form in Spanish all while improving their vocabulary and grammar. SPN 1340 and SPN 1341 classes are now usually offered throughout the entire academic year.

To both Native Speakers and Heritage Learners: You are strongly encouraged to <u>drop</u> this course. If you do not and it is discovered later on that you are indeed a Heritage Learner, it will leave you little or no time to register for another course or take the CLEP. For Elementary language courses, we don't allow students to use any elements of the language that we are not specifically learning in the class. Why is this? Because this is

a good indication that somebody else is doing their work for them or that they are using an online translator. If this happens, they receive a very low grade or a **zero**. For students that have some level of fluency either Native speakers or Heritage learners, they will inevitably use elements of the language that are not in our learning parameters. These students can also receive a low grade or a **zero** in this course. As a result, to get a good grade, Native speakers and Heritage Learners feel forced to use a level of the language that is lower than their level of proficiency. This leads to no real and productive learning taking place. For this reason, we offer many other languages, including Spanish for Heritage Speakers courses, or the CLEP Test options.

METHOD OF INSTRUCTION:

The course will be taught through a combination of written homework assignments, Canvas discussions, and various video assignments. Face-to-face and mixed-mode classes will include in-class presentations.

CANVAS AND VHL ARE REQUIRED:

This Spanish course will utilize <u>two</u> websites, <u>Canvas</u>, and the <u>VHL Central Supersite</u>. We will be using Valencia College's **Canvas** website for grades, Canvas assignments, Canvas graded assessments, etc. We will also be using the textbook publisher's website Vista Higher Learning (**VHL Central Supersite**), for VHL homework, some VHL formative practice assessments, as well as cultural activities. Please note that you will be able to launch VHL from Canvas in the left-hand navigation. See below for more details.

You will be using **Canvas** for the following:

- Keeping track of your grades
- Taking graded Canvas Practice Quizzes/Chapter Tests/Final Exam
- o Participating in various Canvas Discussions Boards
- Completing Canvas presentations
- Checking Canvas-specific assignment due dates
- Completing various other Canvas assignments
- Accessing extra materials such as Pages, worksheets, PowerPoints, useful YouTube videos, and other helpful links throughout each chapter module within Canvas
- Communicating between Professor and student through the Canvas messaging system

You will be using the **VHL Central Supersite** for the following:

- Viewing VHL tutorials
- Seeing VHL Supersite weekly assignments and their due dates
- Completing VHL Supersite activities including some formative practice quizzes/tests

When you purchase the Portales textbook from the Valencia Bookstore, you will receive an access code that will allow you to gain access to the VHL Supersite.

Reminder: If you purchase the book online from an outside vendor such as Amazon, you are <u>not</u> guaranteed to receive a valid and/or active online access code that is required for this course.

EXTRA CREDIT:

The Extra Credit I offer in this class is <u>optional</u> and is <u>graded</u>, but it is <u>10% over and above the total grade in this course</u>. In other words, the total percentage in this class could be up to 110%. You will <u>not</u> be penalized if you don't do any of the Extra Credits even though you may have a 0 entered as a grade for these activities.

Note: Extra credit will not be accepted if any academic dishonesty occurs during the course.

EXAMS:

• Any indication of academic misconduct (including but not limited to the following; that someone else is taking the exam for you reflected in advanced verbal usage, slang, and common errors made by native speakers, not seeing your face during the assessment, talking during the assessment, evidence of using Al technologies, online searches outside of the assessment page, putting the assessment on pause, videotaping the assessment with a phone or other device including screen recording with the computer and or device with which the assessment is taken) during these assessments and all other Honorlock proctored assessments will

result in a zero for the flagged assessments and the student will receive a zero (F) in this course as a final grade.

- Throughout the course, you will have Chapter Tests in Canvas.
- The Canvas Practice Quizzes, Chapter Tests, and Final Exams could consist of listening, reading comprehension, grammatical knowledge, and writing competencies as well as developing knowledge and awareness of the various Hispanic and Native cultures of the Spanish-speaking world.
- The writing portion of the tests/exams could be assigned separately. In other words, you could have two or more summative assessments per chapter.
- Exams will have a time limit.
- Once you open the exam, you must complete it. You cannot close or pause the exam and then reopen it at a later time.
- There will be **no make-up exams** regardless of the excuse.
- If there is any indication whatsoever that someone else is taking the exam for you, you will receive a <u>zero</u> for the exam. These indications include but are not limited to the use of any Al technology, advanced vocabulary, advanced sentence structure, advanced verbal usage, slang, and common errors made by native speakers. Refer to the section on plagiarism.
- It is your responsibility to have a working computer with reliable internet.
- There will be at least five Canvas Chapter Tests and various Canvas Chapter Practice Quizzes.
- The Final Exam is <u>mandatory</u>. Regardless of your grade, the Final Exam is <u>required</u> to pass this class. If you do not take the Final Exam the professor will drop your final grade one entire letter grade (e.g. it could drop from an A to a B).

HONORLOCK:

This course utilizes Honorlock, an online exam proctoring service, to promote academic integrity during online testing. You do not need to create an account, download software, or schedule an appointment in advance. Honorlock is available 24/7. After you verify your identity and scan your room, you can begin your exam. Honorlock will record you via webcam, as well as record your screen activity. The Honorlock system also includes a process that can detect inappropriate search-engine use, while protecting the privacy of your personal information. The recorded information will be subject to the protection of the College's policy on Student Records.

To take an online exam, you will need:

- A laptop or desktop computer with a microphone (not a tablet or a phone).
- A webcam and headphones.
- A reliable Internet connection.
- Photo identification in the form of a Valencia-issued student ID card or government-issued ID card (i.e. driver's license, passport).
- Google Chrome (required browser).
- Honorlock Chrome Extension (required extension).

Honorlock support is available 24/7/365. Support access is built into Honorlock in real-time. If you encounter any issues during an exam, please contact support by live chat within the Honorlock window in Canvas, and/or by email at Honorlock email. For answers to common questions on online proctoring, visit the Student FAQ page or visit the Honorlock Knowledge Base Help page. Beware that timed quizzes or exams will not be paused as you contact Honorlock support for help during the time you are taking these types of assessments.

SPEAKING ASSESSMENTS USING FLIP:

Language skills using *Flip Discussion Board* – For each Chapter, you will be asked to post a short video where you will ask a question in Spanish and/or share something brief related to the communicative goals of each chapter. You will then be asked to respond by posting a short video to at least two of your classmates' posts. Make sure you read the instructions for each Flip discussion activity. By clicking on the assignment, it will take you there automatically. These presentations must comply with the minimum time requirement. You are encouraged to use visuals/props to enhance your presentation. For example, if you are saying that you like to play soccer, hold up a soccer ball.

Warning: Only use grammar and vocabulary that we are learning in class. Do <u>not</u> use advanced grammar and vocabulary. Failing to do so will result in a very low grade or perhaps a <u>zero</u>, at the professor's discretion.

CULTURAL DISCUSSIONS:

When covering **Culture**, we will discuss cultural topics related to the Spanish-speaking world including its various Native cultures. These will be done mostly in **English**, but are encouraged to use Spanish terms whenever possible or applicable. You must submit an initial post with intelligently and well-thought-out comments, then respectfully and intelligently respond to at least **two** other posts to receive full credit. You will receive full credit if you write an original post plus include your responses to at least **two** classmates' posts.

PRACTICE QUIZZES:

Practice Quizzes are assigned 3-4 times throughout the chapter. They are short quizzes that vary between fill-in-the-blank and multiple-choice, etc. Their purpose is to make sure you are learning and understanding the material. You will have 3 attempts and there is no time limit on most of the Practice Quizzes.

WRITING ASSIGNMENTS:

Writing Assignments (Journals) are done in Canvas. These are essentially practice writing assignments in which you will write on various topics. You are expected to use the material, grammar, vocabulary, and sentence structure that we are learning in class. Any work that uses the Spanish language that is beyond our scope of learning will receive a <u>zero</u>. This includes but is not limited to using verb tenses that we have not yet learned for each of the chapters and or using any type of AI technology aid.

HOMEWORK IN VHL CENTRAL SUPERSITE:

The VHL Central Supersite can be found at VHL Central. This is the online component of the textbook where you will do many of the activities of the course and keep track of your VHL Homework grades. The assigned activities will be listed on the calendar of the VHL website. The activities will include extensive grammar-driven practice, vocabulary practice, listening practice, oral communication activities, reading activities, as well as activities to develop your oral and writing proficiency. These activities will assist the student in internalizing the material the student has learned. The VHL Homework will be completed on the dates that appear on the calendar at VHL Central. There will be homework most days of the week. This is to ensure that you are staying in touch with the course daily thereby being exposed to the target language every week. It is essential to have daily contact and interaction with the Spanish language to have the most immersive experience.

REGARDING CANVAS AND VHL:

- The Professor will not remind you to do your homework on both Canvas and VHL.
- Please be sure to complete all Canvas and VHL assignments on time. It is highly recommended that you complete all of the homework and activities in each chapter module before taking each chapter test.
- Late assignments are subject to a 20% deduction on top of any other deductions due to grammatical and/or context errors.
- Although you may submit assignments late due to a medical emergency, <u>do not</u> get into the habit of turning in late work. With a language class, it is best to stay on track for more effective learning of the target language.
- Please be responsible and manage your time wisely.
- Make sure you have a working computer with a camera, headphones, and a microphone. Remember, there are computer labs at all Valencia Campuses which are available to students (bring your headphones).
- Please read the instructions for all homework activities on both Canvas and VHL carefully.

QUIZLET FOR VOCABULARY:

• Towards the beginning of each chapter module, there is a Quizlet activity that involves inputting all vocabulary words into Quizlet.com and creating flashcards which you will use to study and memorize your Spanish vocabulary words from each chapter for at least 20 minutes daily. Successful students say that they find that memorizing vocabulary makes learning grammar much more effective. When you learn vocabulary words and then incorporate that new vocabulary into your new grammar lessons, you can use your knowledge to your advantage.

SPANISH PRONUNCIATION ASSESSMENTS:

- You will have the opportunity to practice and showcase your Spanish pronunciation through a Discussion Board in which you will practice reciting a tongue twister three times in a row.
- I highly encourage listening to the original tongue twister several times and then practicing before attempting to record yourself.
- Try your best to imitate the sounds and pronunciation of each word from my original recordings so that you may achieve a native sound in Spanish.
- I recommend that you write out the tongue twister several times in a notebook because when you take the time to write it out with a pen on paper, you get the opportunity to see the way each word is constructed in terms of accents, diphthongs, and letter combinations.
- Take it a step further and try to **memorize** the tongue twister you choose to record.

INFORMATION GAP ASSIGNMENTS:

- Information Gap Assignments are activities that you will complete with a classmate and/or a Valencia or Brainfuse tutor.
- Please be sure to follow the instructions within this Canvas activity carefully.
- Always follow the examples given in each Information Gap Activity.

- Be prepared to video record yourself during the Oral Assessments.

FINAL EXAM:

- The Final Exam will cover chapters 1-5 for SPN 1120 and chapters 6-10 for SPN 1121. The Final Exam is composed of 3 parts;
 - 1) The Main part consists of vocabulary, listening, reading, and grammar
 - 2) The Writing sections
 - 3) The Final Oral Assessment
- Students who do not take all 3 components of the Final Exam will not pass.
- The Final Exam **does not** have to be taken in the Testing Center.
- The "Main" part and the "Writing" portion of the Final Exam will be available during Final Exam week.
- The Final Oral Assessment will be available before the Final Exam week. The
 Professor will ask you questions based on what we have learned in class. Sample
 questions can be found in the Final Oral Assessment Module. Remember that the
 Oral Assessments will be completed via Canvas Quizzes using Honorlock.

LATE WORK:

Students will receive a one-week grace period to submit Canvas work. With a language class, it is best to stay on track for more effective learning of the target language. It is best to turn in all assignments on time. This includes both VHL and Canvas assignments.

- VHL homework is required to pass this course.
- Students will have a 3-day grace period to turn in late work for Canvas.
- Valid Medical excuses will be accepted.
- Each VHL lesson homework must be completed to at least 70% for each chapter lesson.
- Your final grade will be reduced by one letter grade if you don't complete the minimum
 70% for each chapter lesson of your VHL homework.

ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION:

Attendance and Participation in all course modalities (face-to-face/mixed mode/online) are strictly recorded and graded. Please let the professor know ahead of time if you will be absent and/or not participating. The only way to get a valid excused absence is to provide a medical excuse with the date(s). Unless you are medically excused, if you arrive late to an onsite class and/or if you leave class early it will be counted as a tardy in your Attendance grade for that day.

A reminder of Recommended allocated time for this course: As students, you are encouraged to learn to manage your time wisely. What does this mean regarding this class? Since it is a 4-credit hour class, you should multiply 4 times 4 which is equal to 16 hours of study time <u>per week</u> for this course. This means that if you divide 16 (hours) by 7 (days of the week), <u>you are expected to study and work in this class for at least 2.5 hours daily.</u> Out of those 2.5 hours, at least 20 minutes should be devoted to studying and memorizing vocabulary daily.

Guidelines to prevent copying from native speakers, online translators, and/or Al technology.

This course only allows content that pertains to the class.

If it is suspected that you are using an online translator or AI technology, or that a native or heritage speaker is doing your work for you, you will receive a **zero** on your assignment. It is worthwhile to mention that it is evident to the Professor when you are not doing your work. This is especially true in your writing assignments and short-answer assignments. The use of verb tenses that we are not learning, sentence structure that we are not learning, slang, and advanced vocabulary are **prohibited**. Only use what we are doing in class. In doing so, the Professor can be fairly certain that you are doing your work. The aforementioned statement refers to exams and other assessments as well.

Regarding Al technology:

The use of Al-generated responses and essays is strictly prohibited in this course unless otherwise explicitly approved by your instructor. All includes "any kind of artificial computational system that employs complex behavior used to satisfy the Learning Outcomes of a course or lesson" (Vincent C. Muller). ChatGPT, for instance, is an Al. Any assignment in violation of this policy will receive the punishments as specified in the Academic Dishonesty/Plagiarism policy.

In this course, you are required to do your own work. There are many resources at your disposal that can assist you such as AI. AI is a powerful new tool that can benefit society in a great deal of ways, however representing work that you did not produce as your own, including work generated or materially modified by AI, constitutes academic dishonesty. Use of generative AI in a way that violates an instructor's articulated policy or using it to

complete coursework in a way not expressly permitted by the faculty member will be considered a violation of the Honor Code.

I reserve the right to challenge <u>any material</u> you have submitted that I may believe is AI generated and actions will be as follows: 1. Warning and no credit given. 2. Second offense, no credit given, issued final notice of misconduct. 3. Third offense grounds for failure of course and dismissal.

Should the work that you submit is questionable, you will be asked to meet with the professor and will be given the opportunity to demonstrate that you did the work.
