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Required Text:

The text *Janson's History of Art, volume 1, reissued eighth edition by Penelope J. E. Davies, Walter B. Denny, Frima Fox Hofrichter, Joseph Jacobs, Ann M. Roberts, and David L. Simon* is required for this course.

Course Description:

This course is an integrated study of the main developments of the visual art forms (architecture, sculpture, and painting) from Paleolithic man to the Early Renaissance. World art will be integrated into the content.

Course Objectives:

1. Introduce students to a historical examination of the early development of Western and non-related non-Western art concentrating on painting, sculpture, and architecture.
2. Introduce the principles of visual communication and visual literacy.
3. Examine the function of art, the perception of art, and the historical effect of religion, technology and other developments in art.
4. Provide examples of early art that indicate a foundation for our contemporary culture (behavior, institutions, professions, etc)
5. Evaluate art by viewing, making verbal and written comments and reactions, as well as the thought processes related to making judgments about art.

Expected Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

1. Identify and appreciate the various themes and developments in the visual arts from Paleolithic man to the Early Renaissance.
2. Study works of art through visual analysis.
3. Critique a work of art by applying the elements and principles of design.
4. Study the classification of art through place of origin, sequence, chronology, and historical significance.
5. Examine the relationship of art, history, and culture.
6. Develop an appreciation of the visual arts and architecture produced by different cultures.
7. Employ research and writing skills to successfully satisfy writing requirements.

This course seeks to reinforce the following Valencia Student Competencies:

- Think clearly, critically and creatively by analyzing, synthesizing, integrating and evaluating cognitive, aesthetic and visual knowledge.
- Understand, empathize and evaluate your own and others' values from individual, cultural and global perspectives.
- Communicate ideas visually and verbally. Use your listening and writing skills to analyze and critique.
- Act purposely, reflectively and responsibly by implementing effective problem solving and decision-making strategies.

Methods of Instruction:

May include but are not limited to: lectures, group discussions, films and videos, art critiques, individual researches, writing essay and reaction papers, quizzes, and a gallery/museum visit (independently).

Quizzes:

Students are required to complete thirteen multiple choice quizzes. Every quiz will include fifteen questions. You will be awarded 3 points per each correct answer. Each quiz is worth forty-five points. No late quizzes will be accepted!

Essay assignments:

Students are required to complete six short answer assignments. You are required to use Microsoft Word to complete this work. Each assignment will include two questions (20 points each question – 40 points per assignment). Students will be awarded full credit if correct and clarifying answers are provided on all of the assigned questions. All provided answers must be based on the assigned textbook reading and must include references to the presented artworks within the chapters. Additional guidelines are presented in the modules that include essay assignments. No late assignments will be accepted!

Reaction Paper/Museum Visit:

This paper will be a reaction to a DIRECT ENCOUNTER with a work of art! You will be required to provide proof that you actually visited the museum/gallery (ticket, receipt, etc.). The paper will be assessed based on use of course terminology, a description of the selected artwork, discussion of the subject matter, and personal critique. A separate handout for this assignment is provided in the module for week 8. The paper is worth 85 points.

Discussions:

A successful student in online education is one who takes an active role in the learning process. You are, therefore, encouraged to participate in the discussion area to enhance your learning experience. The assessment rubric and additional guidelines are provided for each discussion in this course. The information can be found in modules that include discussions.

Evaluation Plan:

Grades will be assessed in ARH 2050 upon the successful completion of the required course components. Each component of the final grades will be weighted in the following manner:
