CLASS SYLLABUS FALL 2022

Course Title: ART 1300C / Drawing I / CRN 18089

Credit Hours: 3

Day/Time: Monday 4:00 pm – 6:45 pm

Course Description:

Introduction to basic skills, concepts, methods, and tools. Emphasis on increasing powers of visual observation and drawing from life.

We will cover the following approaches to drawing: gesture, contour, organizational line, linear perspective, measuring techniques, planar analysis, negative shape rendering, and value mapping. Each class will include hands on project(s) and homework as well as online assignments that heighten the students' ability to accurately create the illusion of three-dimensional forms in space on a two-dimensional picture plane. You will work on drawing from the still life, using a combination of dry and wet materials. Slide presentations will be used to exemplify and reinforce the basic concepts of this course. This course is considered a studio-structured course. This means that students are expected to attend class regularly and fully participate in classroom exercise(s) that will encourage the growth of their drawing skills. Students will also be expected to complete assignments outside of class for the purpose of reinforcing classroom skills and fostering a personal studio practice in their sketchbook. The sketchbook will function as your space for working ideas for projects, collection of notes and images, homework, sketches, thought recording, etc. Keep this book with you at all class periods.

Course Objectives:

Demonstrate:

- 1. Familiarity with basic drawing materials such as paper, pencil, charcoal, eraser and etc.
- 2. The ability to draw accurately in regard to proportion and perspective.
- 3. The use of proportional devises such as measuring, angling, viewfinder, perceptual grid (organizational line), triangulation, etc.
- 4. Use of linear perspective by accurately conveying three-dimensional space/objects from life as well as sketch three-dimensional ideas from their head and onto the paper.
- 5. Sensitive and descriptive use of line and value in creating the illusion of three-dimensional forms in space on a picture plane.
- 6. The use of gesture to compose page, quickly describe form, and relate ideas.

- 7. Inventiveness and creativity through image choice, compositional decisions, looking at something in a fresh way, unusual connections, instead of being satisfied with the most common and safe answer.
- 8. Through conversation and artwork how design principles and elements can relay ideas about content. Acknowledge the conceptual implications of choices in style, materials, composition, and imagery.
- 9. Use visual vocabulary to discuss artwork of your own and others.
- 10. Strong work ethic that will help propel future studies.
- 11. Understanding of techniques to generate ideas.
- 12. Good craftsmanship skills.

Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. The student will have a basic knowledge of the range of drawing tools and supports.
 - Recognize a range of appropriate drawing papers (supports) and identify their characteristics.
 - Identify characteristics and use to advantage the abrasive drawing media such as charcoal.
 - Identify and use to advantage absorbent drawing media such as ink and ink washes.
 - Identify other appropriate tools such as, pencils, erasers, paper stomps and their proper use in drawing.
 - Understand methods of preservation and presentation of works on paper.
- 2. The student will be able to draw objects accurately using line.
 - Describe objects in detail, indicating both interior and exterior edges of forms using blind contour.
 - Recognize both negative and positive shapes and define each with contour lines.
 - Utilize line in the techniques of cross contour to describe the topographical characteristics of objects.
 - Employ line contrasts, using weight and value, to introduce a sense of light, space, and dynamics to line drawing.
 - Utilize line in gesture drawing to emphasize structure, volume, and mass.
- 3. The student will render in convincing fashion the three-dimensional aspects of form.
 - Define the various subdivisions of planes within a given object.
 - Articulate the underlying structure of a given object stripped of its surface details.
 - Demonstrate the ability to do gesture drawings emphasizing mass and volume.
- 4. The student will observe and accurately render light and its resultant shadow on objects.
 - Recognize and render in appropriate tone the effect of directional light, including the
 difference between highlight, quarter tone, half tone, base tone, cast shadow, and
 reflected light.

- Employ a range of tones from one hundred percent black to one hundred percent white to describe objects.
- Understand the terminology used to discuss light effects, including directional light, ambient light, local tone, optical gray, and chiaroscuro, and be able to achieve the effects implied by them.
- 5. The student will understand the various concepts and terminology regarding shape, and be able to apply them appropriately.
 - Recognize the difference between positive and negative shapes and draw them accurately.
 - Understand and characterize the difference between organic and geometric shapes.
 - Recognize and describe the underlying geometrical structure of most objects, and utilize this knowledge in defining objects.
- 6. The student will be able to demonstrate competence in one and two point perspective.
 - Understand the terminology of linear perspective, including eye level, plane of vision, horizon line, and vanishing points.
 - Construct a drawing of a interior space using one point perspective.
 - Construct a drawing of an interior space or building exterior using two point perspective.
 - Apply principles of perspective to construct a drawing of a complex grouping of objects.
- 7. The student will be able to recognize the range of tones apparent in the visual world and represent them coherently on paper.
 - Recognize the local tone of a given object and represent it correctly on paper.
 - Utilize the technique of chiaroscuro to model form.
 - Utilize tonal range and value contrast to create the illusion of depth on the paper.

This course seeks to reinforce the following Valencia Student Competencies:

- Think clearly, critically and creatively by analyzing, synthesizing, integrating and evaluating cognitive, aesthetic and visual knowledge.
- Understand, empathize and evaluate your own and others' values from individual, cultural and global perspectives.
- Communicate ideas visually and verbally. Use your listening and writing skills to analyze and critique.
- Act purposely, reflectively and responsibly by implementing effective problem solving and decision-making strategies.

Course Policies:

1. We will have a cleanup period five minutes before the end of each class. You will be totally responsible for cleaning your work area, to prepare the room for the following class.

- 2. I encourage talking in this class, but keep volume down and discussion related to class only. Please feel free to walk around, observe and discuss with your peers their work.
- 3. You are allowed to listen to music during work periods only and you must use your headphones to do so. You are not permitted to listen to any music during critiques or presentations. Obviously, other types of disruptive or dangerous behavior are prohibited. I reserve the right to remove any student from my class if I feel that they are disturbing the work environment of the class.
- 4. If you are having any problems or questions, come to me, before your problem or question gets larger.

Grading:

Grades for your studio projects are based on a 4-point system with (A 4.00; B 3.00; C 2.00; D 1.00; F 0.00). In order to figure your approximate grade throughout the semester, keep a total amount of the points you earn and divide them by the number of completed assignments.

Quality of work: I will make clear the criteria for grading each of your projects, and will grade only on those criteria. You will be allowed to rework any graded onsite project if you wish, for presentation at the semester's end. Any student wishing to see his/her project grades should request to do so. All late work will receive a failing grade and will not be accepted. There are no redo opportunities for late work.

NOTE: Students are expected to spend approximately 3-5 hours a week on assignments outside of class. You must demonstrate sufficient skills and grasp of concepts in order to pass this class; if not, you will handicap yourself and your teacher when you attempt to take a higher-level drawing course.

Attendance Policies:

Attendance will be taken by a sign-up sheet at the beginning of every onsite class. A student will be marked absent if their name does not appear on the sign-in sheet for that day. It is the attendance records of the instructor, not the recollections of the student, which will be consulted for proof of attendance/absences. The final grade may be affected by attendance, good attendance will not help your grade, but poor attendance will hurt your grade. All information missed as the result of an absence must be obtained from another student. The student fails the course on the 4th absence regardless of circumstances. One absence (excused or unexcused) is allowed; any thereafter will affect the final grade. Two tardies will equal one absence.

The following counts as one tardy:

- 1. Arriving late to class.
- 2. Leaving early from class
- 3. Late return from a break
- 4. Failing to arrive with the assigned materials needed for the class

Your final grade will be affected in the following way by absences:

1 ½ -2 ½ absences: overall grade drop by 1 grade

- 3 3 ½ absences: overall grade drop by 2 grades
- 4 absences or above--automatic failure of course--you should drop if you can

You cannot make up an absence or a tardy!

<u>Withdrawal deadline: October 28th, 2022</u> – Any student who does not withdraw by this date will receive a letter grade for the course. I do not withdraw students. It is the student's responsibility to exercise this option if they wish.

"No Show" Status:

If you are withdrawn as a "no show," you will be financially responsible for the class and a final grade of "WN" will appear on your transcript for the course.

You MUST give credit to your sources- this includes internet resources. Failure to do so is considered illegal and is considered plagiarism.

Plagiarism:

Plagiarism is the act of taking another individual's writings or ideas and passing them off as your own. This includes directly copying even a small portion of the text, indirectly taking thoughts by paraphrasing ideas without correctly attributing to the source (meaning both with signal phrases and in-text parenthetical citations), using papers written in previous courses (self-plagiarism), and using another individual's research without the correct attribution. Any act of plagiarism or academic dishonesty will result in an automatic failing grade on the assignment, no matter how small the infraction; to clarify, this means the assignment will receive no points. Additional action may be taken with the college's administrative offices. Do not endanger your academic career: If there is a

severe issue, you are confused about what constitutes plagiarism, or you feel dishonesty is your only solution, contact me immediately and we will discuss the matter. Remember, once the assignment has been submitted, there is no distinction between unintentional plagiarism and intentional plagiarism – it's just intentional in my eyes. Students' work will be submitted through Canvas's Unicheck system.
